

THE LANE-LINN COUNTY LINE CONTROVERSY

Albany Commercial Club Appoints Committee to Meet With Eugene Committee.

The Albany Herald, in its account of the meeting of the Commercial Club of that city, Tuesday night, has the following concerning the Lane-Linn county line controversy: The county division line was discussed in extenso. The history of the present boundary line established in 1887, was given by Senator-elect Frank Miller. Mr. Miller explained that what Linn county is now asking is only a part of what was cut off from Lane and annexed to Lane through error. County Judge Stewart also earnestly favored the readjustment. President Ellis explained the correspondence that had passed between himself and Dr. Whitson, president of the Eugene Commercial Club, and the chair was authorized to appoint a committee of five to meet a committee of five to be appointed from the Eugene Commercial Club to arrive, if possible, at an agreement whereby a fight on the floor of the legislature may be avoided. Senator-elect Frank Stewart, of Albany, and A. A. Tusing and P. M. Brown, of Brownsville.
