SAMUEL NEWTON HOWARD, PIONEER

Samuel Newton Howard, who died at his home north of Eugene Friday, December 28, was born in Henry county, Indiana, October 26, 1839. When he was four years of age he moved with his parents to Missouri, and later to Iowa. The family started across the plains for Oregon in April, 1863, and after experiencing all the hardships incident to such a trip in those days, reached Lane county in October of the same year. They settled on a farm near the old town of Lancaster, north of Junction. They resided there till 1878, when they purchased a farm three miles north of Eugene, where the subject of this sketch lived until the time of his death. His father died at the old place at Lancaster, but the place has always remained in the hands of the Howards, Floyd, a brother of Samuel, now owning it and residing there.

The deceased was married in 1878 to Miss Cinderella Kays, of Howell county, Marion county, who survives him. Six children were born to them as follows: Emmitt, D. C., D. M., Jessie Frances, Jessie and Nellie. The following brothers and sisters are living: James M., R. H., F. B., all of Junction, and Mrs. Ollie Roberts, of Tacoma.

The deceased was at one time an Odd Fellow, being a charter member of the Junction City lodge, but after he moved to the farm near Eugene he allowed his membership to drop. He was an honorable and upright citizen, well-liked by all who knew him. The funeral will be held Sunday, with interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

SHIPPING SUFFERS FROM OCEAN STORMS
