LUMBER KING IS WORTH BUT HALF BILLION

DEFENDED BY MCCORMICK, HIS WESTERN MANAGER—ALL HIS TRANSACTIONS HAVE BEEN HONEST AND LEGITIMATE—IS WHOLESOME AND GENUINE GENTLEMAN.

Tacoma, Dec. 26.—Robert L. McCormick, coast manager for Frederick Weyerhaeuser, has issued a reply to the attack upon the timber king in the January Cosmopolitan by C. P. Norcross. He describes Norcross' article as a "mixture of facts and fiction, which would convey to the average reader the belief that Mr. Weyerhaeuser had acquired his present wealth through dishonest chicanery. Had Norcross stopped to secure a knowledge of the subject upon which he has attempted to inform the public, and had he verified the statements he made, he would have been more successful, and his article would have lost none of its interest for the readers."

Is Not a Recluse. McCormick states that Weyerhaeuser is not a recluse, does not shun society, and on the contrary is most democratic, "genial, warm-hearted and sincere. In St. Paul he takes part in politics, attends church regularly, belongs to two clubs, and in turn the host and guest at numerous social affairs after the manner of any well-to-do man of his age.

Only Worth Half Billion.

"The estimate of Mr. Weyerhaeuser's holdings is absurd. While it is a fact that, compared with any other single man's holdings his timber acreage is very large, when compared to the entire available supply of timber it is very small. Again, in all his purchases Mr. Weyerhaeuser has permitted other people to benefit as well as himself.

"If Mr. Weyerhaeuser and his associates own one-tenth of 30,000,000 acres, that probably represents the limit. His associates are some people in one place and another set of people in another locality. In the United States there are 1,200,000,000 acres of timber. Mr. Weyerhaeuser would have to own more than one-fourth of that amount to be the billionaire Mr. Norcross represents him to be. That also is absurd. Five hundred million dollars would be a much closer estimate, and that would probably be too high."

WHITES MY ATTEND SCHOOLS FOR INDIANS

Washington, Dec. 28.—Commissioner Leupp, of the Indian office, will ask congress to legalize the practice of the department in permitting white children to enter Indian schools on the same basis as Indian children are permitted to enter white schools. It is the policy of the Indian office to break up Indian reservations wherever possible and allot the lands owned by the Indians and put the wards of the government on a self-supporting basis. To do this effectively the old barriers are being broken down and Indians in many sections of the country are attending district schools the Indian board paying into the county or state treasury the cost per capita of the Indian's education as assessed against the white children, which amounts to about \$2 per quarter. In many localities of the West and Northwest Indian schools are the only schools in widely separated areas.
