

LOGS PILED UP ON BEACH NORTH OF SIUSLAW

Loss Estimated as High as \$12,000.

Towns of Wapiniton and Acme
Flooded on Thursday of Last
Week - 16,000,000 Feet of
Logs Passed Wapiniton

(Special Correspondence.)
Poulsbo, Jan. 6.—The river boom
of the Siuslaw Lumber Company
burst Thursday evening, letting
between 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 feet
of logs go to sea. Those logs were
retained at between \$1000 and \$125,
000. They are now piled up on the
beach north of the mouth of the
Siuslaw river, scattered up the coast
for 5 miles. It will be impossible
to get them into the river. The
boom owner will be the Oregon &
California Lumber Company and the
Siuslaw Lumber Company.

The Flood at Wapiniton.
Wapiniton, Jan. 6.—The heavy rain
last Wednesday and Thursday raised
the river the highest it has been this
season. Thursday morning by eight
o'clock the river was full of logs and
continued to swell dark, and some
were still running Friday morning.
It is thought that nearly 16,000,000
feet passed Wapiniton Thursday.
About 1400 logs were lost at the
Acme boom by the failure of the boom
boom to work properly. This will be
a heavy loss to the boom company or
the mills.

The high water flooded Acme and
Wapiniton, boats were in demand and
from twelve at night until noon Fri-
day that was the only mode of trans-
ferring in Wapiniton, as the streets were
flooded so deep that sidewalks were
either under water or washed away.
There was but little loss aside from
the washing away of walks and fence-
sides. We hear of some ranchers who
have lost some stock by drowning,
but no heavy loss of this kind has
been reported.

and that Arlington is only 40 miles
from Seattle.

RANK REFUSED LOAN WREAKS DUE VENGEANCE

Philadelphia, Jan. 6.—Demanding
a loan of \$1000 and failing to get it,
a man, not yet identified, dropped a
bomb in the Fourth street National
Bank today, blowing himself to
pieces, instantly killing Cashier W.
Z. McLean and injuring six others,
one or two of whom may die. The
only clue to the identity of the bomb
thrower was a bunch of keys found
in the clothing, attached to one of
which is a plate inscribed "R. Steele,
Garner, Iowa."

The Fourth Street National Bank
is the largest financial institution in
the city, and occupies the greater
portion of the first floor of the Bu-
ilding is the heart of the financial
district. The explosion was terrific,
and caused tremendous excitement in
the crowded building.

The man entered the bank and
asked to be shown to the office of
President Rushton.

"I was very busy," said Presi-
dent Rushton, "when the man en-
tered and I asked him to be seated
a moment. He was poorly dressed,
with patches on his shoes, and his
entire appearance made me a bit su-
sicious. While he was waiting for me
to finish the business I had in hand
I happened to notice he looked at me
very curiously. I asked him his busi-
ness and he gave me his name as
G. E. Williams, and said he wanted a
loan of \$1000. I asked him for col-
lateral security and he said some-
thing about an insurance policy and
that it would mature in from one to
five years. I was convinced that the
man was a crank, and decided to dis-
miss him at once, not for a moment
thinking there was any harm in him.
I told him he would have to see the
cashier and directed him out into the
banking department, and at the same
time called my colored messenger,
William Crump, to see that the man
was quickly taken out of the build-
ing. As I turned to my work a
terrible explosion occurred, and I
thought the building was coming
down. The man had not time to
reach the cashier, the explosion came
so soon."

Details of what happened after
the man left the president's office are
not known. But it is believed that he
dropped the bomb between the presi-
dent's room and Cashier McLean's
department. McLean was sitting at
his desk and was badly mangled.
The explosion blew every one in the
banking room to the floor and de-
vasted the interior of the building.
At least six persons, all clerks, are
hurt, two probably fatally.

The explosion caused a panic on
the upper floors of the building, and
there was a rush for the exits. The
fire alarm sounded, but as there was
no fire the police and firemen were
utilized to guard the bank's treasure
and books, a strong guard being
thrown about the building.

Search for the bomb thrower was
made and it was at first supposed
that he had not been killed, but in
removing the body of McLean and
looking for others, portions of his
body were found, which plainly indi-
cated that the man had been blown
to pieces. Later the head and shoul-
ders of the bomb thrower and his over-
coat were found in the wreckage of
President Rushton's office.

William Crump, the messenger,
was terribly injured. Both his eyes
were blown out and he was other-

wise horribly injured. The police
learned from him that he saw the
man attempt to throw something and
he made a jump for him, but too late.
Crump will die.

Identity Established.

Des Moines, Jan. 6.—Robert Steele,
a man who bears a name identical
with that found upon one of the
Philadelphia bomb thrower's
key ring, left Garner six years ago.
Upon his removal to Garner ten years
ago he was engaged in drilling wells.
Later he established a machine shop
and incidentally sold patent medi-
cines, going over the country in an
open wagon with his wares. He was
elected to the town council of Gar-
ner in 1918, and the following year
was married. Three children were
born to him. Steele failed in 1919,
and removed with his family to Chi-
cago and later to some Eastern city,
supposedly to Boston or Philadel-
phia. While in Chicago he was a
member of the police force. Steele
was known as fairly well balanced
when he left Garner. He was 30
years of age at that time.

H. E. ANKENY LEFT PROPERTY TO HIS WIFE

A petition to probate the will of
Henry E. Ankeny, who died in Port-
land, Dec. 11, 1914, was filed with
County Clerk Lee today, but as the
witnesses to the will reside in Jack-
son county, the instrument will have
to be sent there to be certified to be-
fore it is filed here.

The petition sets forth the fact that
the deceased left personal property to
the probable value of \$10,000, real
property in Eugene—the residence on
North Pearl street—valued at \$10,000
and undivided interest in farm
lands in Klamath county valued at
\$10,000.

The heirs of the estate are as fol-
lows: Mrs. Cordelia L. Ankeny, wife
and the following children: Cora Belle
Crump, of Jackson county; Annie May
Cantrell, of Klamath Falls; Cordelia
R. Orth, of Medford; Frank Emile An-
keny, of Klamath Falls; Dolly A. Mil-
ler, of Medford, and Gladys Ankeny, of
Eugene.

While the provisions of the will
are not yet made public, the Guard is
informed that after small bequests to
the children are made the remainder
of the property is left to Mrs. Ankeny.
Besides the property mentioned, Mr.
Ankeny owned a large amount of stock
in the Chambers-Bristow Banking Co.
of this city and in a bank at Medford.
The will provides that Mrs. Ankeny
and Vincent Coker, brother-in-law
of the deceased, shall be appointed ex-
ecutors of the estate.

LARRY'S TRUST COMPANY BUSTED AT GOLDFIELD

San Francisco, Jan. 6.—The Ex-
aminer says that the L. M. Sullivan
Trust Company, of Goldfield, Nev-
ada, is financially embarrassed, and
that drafts drawn on the company by
San Francisco brokers have been pro-
tested.

Peter Grant, treasurer of the com-
pany, who is in the city, says the
embarrassment is only temporary, due
to the absence of L. M. Sullivan from
Goldfield on account of the Gans-
Herman fight and Graham Rice, who
is in San Francisco sick with brain
fever. Grant says that experts have
been at work on the books and found
that the company has more than \$1,
000,000 assets. All the trouble, ac-
cording to Grant, will be settled on
Sullivan's return from Goldfield. The
company does a big business in
Southern Nevada mining stocks, and
it is stated that in order to stimu-
late the market the company bought
and sold its own securities.

Larry Sullivan, head of the con-
cern, was formerly keeper of a no-
torious sailors' boarding house dive
in Portland, Oregon.

SENDING NEGROES TO PHILIPPINES

Washington, Jan. 5.—The Ninth
and Tenth Cavalry and Twenty-fifth
Infantry, including all the negro sol-
diers of the regular army of this
country, have been ordered to pre-

pare for service in the Philippines
and will sail at different times be-
tween March 1 and June 1 of this
year. It is stated that the negro sol-
diers are being sent to the Philip-
pines because it is their turn to go,
and not because of any desire to get
them out of the United States.

REGARDING THE WALNUT INDUSTRY IN OREGON

Editor Guard.—Oregon has proved
herself to be the ideal and natural
home of the walnut tree. Through
the efforts of broad-minded men this
fact has been thoroughly demon-
strated. The experimental stages of this
industry have been passed. And it
has been decided by these wise men
that the walnut industry is the great,
coming commercial success of today.

Numerous walnut trees, from
young ones to those that are fifty
years old, are located around Port-
land, Roseburg, Salem, McMinnville,
Forest Grove, Corvallis, Eugene and
many other places too numerous to
mention. One woman by the name of
Mrs. Cox, near Eugene, has a num-
ber of trees which bore four or five
hundred pounds of first-class nuts
last season. There is a woman in Mc-
Minnville who has a tree that bears
five each year. Many prominent men
in and around McMinnville have de-
cided to plant three or four hundred
acres. J. J. Cale and many other
prominent men in and around Cor-
vallis are setting several hundred
acres.

Walnut lumber is worth about \$10
per M. In times gone by you could
buy walnut furniture. But now you
get your furniture with walnut ve-
neering. If you would set 30 acres
to walnuts fifteen to twenty feet
apart, then when they begin to crowd
each other have every other one cut
out, you could sell the wood for \$15-
000 or \$25,000, the value of your
property at the time you planted your
orchard, and still have a valuable
piece of property left. Do not be
afraid to invest—if you are you will
always be busted. Perhaps you have
five, ten or fifteen acres lying idle; if
so you should buy a lot of walnut
trees and set them ten or fifteen feet
apart and let them grow for time and
be among the wise men.

Now California raises nearly all the
walnuts that are raised in the United
States, and they only raise about
\$300,000 worth each year, while the
nut eating public pays out annually
about \$10,000,000 for foreign grown
nuts. There are also many hundred
pounds made into oil. Now compare
the above figures together and see if
it looks reasonable that the walnut
industry will be overdone.

Brooks & Sons, some of the great-
est walnut specialists on the coast,
say that Oregon is the natural home
of the walnut tree, and it is known
that they can prove what they say.

A few facts—Any low growing fruit
or garden truck can be raised among
walnut trees. The can also be set
among hops. They have a very long
taproot—that is the reason. The
walnut tree bears when about six or
seven years old.
