## WHY ARE JAPS BUYING EXPLOSIVES AT THIS TIME?

New York, Jan. 3.—A cable dispatch to the American says that Japan has bought large quantities of cordite at London, which is being shipped to Japan as rapidly as manufacturers can deliver it. It is stated that Japan is actively replenishing her reserve of explosives, depleted by the Russo-Japanese war.

## CHINESE BOYCOTT SPREADING EVEN MORE

Shanghai, Jan. 3.—As a result of the revival of the boycott on American goods, due to the failure of the United States authorities to modify the Chinese exclusion act, the boycott which was recently revived at Canton is spreading over China. Efforts are being made to induce Chinese newspapers to reject the advertisements of American manufacturers.

## Japanese Are Favored.

New Chwang, Jan. 3.—Japanese shippers over the Manchurian railway receive one hundred per cent cheaper rates than those of other nationalities. They are rapidly capturing the trade of this district as the result of this discrimination.

## SOME GOOD ADVICE FROM OKLAHOMA

Guthrie, Okla., Jan. 4.—The constitutional convention has proposed two amendments to the federal constitution, one favoring a federal income tax and one a federal provision for the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people. The states' rights proposition occasioned a vigorous debate. Judge Ledbetter argued against delegating a power to the federal government that should be reserved by the state. The convention finally reversed its former act and did not sustain the states' rights doctrine.

## STANDARD OIL TRUST MUST STAND TRIAL

Chicago, Jan. 3.—Judge Landis, of the United States District Court, today overruled the demurrer of the Standard Oil Company to eight indictments pending against that corporation, but sustained the demurrer as to two other indictments, because of technical defects.

## FILES NOTICE THAT CONTEST IS PENDING

## W. W. STEVERS FILES ON WATERS OF M'KENZIE

W. W. Stevers, employed in Midgley's planing mill and sash and door factory in this city, yesterday afternoon filed with the county clerk a notice of appropriation of 88,000 cubic inches of the waters of the McKenzie river for the purpose of generating electric power. The name of the ditch, flume or canal shall be the Odaliques Electric Power Co. and shall be owned by the said W. W. Stevers, his assigns and successors. The point of diversion of the waters shall be on the north bank of the McKenzie on the southeast quarter of section 23, township 17, south of range one west, 150 yards south of the Potter residence. The general course of the canal is to be westerly along the north bank of the river and extend for a distance of about four miles. The canal is to be 60 feet wide at the bottom, sufficient to carry 88,000 cubic inches of water under a six-inch pressure.

## ROBERTS' CREDITORS GET TEN PER CENT

The bids for the bankrupt stock of goods of the Roberts Drug Co. were opened in the office of C. A. Wintermeier, referee in bankruptcy, at ten o'clock this forenoon. There were only two bids, that of Geo. T. Hall, of this city, and that of Woodward-Clark Co., a wholesale drug firm, of Portland.
