Portland Market Report.

Portland, Or., Jan. 17.—The severe weather along the coasts of Oregon and Washington has caused a temporary suspension of the oyster shipments to this market. At the sites of the oyster beds there has been an unusually low tide for the past few days, and freezing weather did more or less damage to the exposed bivalves, but so far as the local trade was advised this morning the loss is not great.

Change in Provision List.

A new price list issued to the trade this morning shows an advance of 1/2 c in picnic and cottage roll hams to 14 1/2 c and 12c respectively; an advance of 1/2 c in all size packages of compound lard, and \$1.50 a barrel in pickled pigs' feet. Some changes are also made in beef cuts and dressed hogs. Beef brains are also up to 10c.

California Vegetables Nipped.

Vegetables arriving on the steamer Columbia last night are reported to be somewhat frosted, but the dealers say most of the stuff can be handled, as the receipts were mostly of hardy stuff. Cauliflower and celery suffered the most.

A car lot of California mixed vegetables also came in this morning and was in good shape, so far as could be learned by the consignee on its arrival. Cabbage rules higher in the California markets.

Commission houses were again closed in against the cold today, but trade was reported as somewhat better than yesterday.

Moderate receipts of poultry and eggs found the market low, especially for poultry, there being but little inquiry for any line of either live or dressed.

Eggs were quoted on a range of 32 1/2 c to 35c, a few sales at the higher price mentioned being of fancy quality.

Livestock Receipts.

Four loads of good grade cattle were unloaded at the local yards this morning from Echo, en route to the sound, and will pass on this evening.

Three loads from Eastern Oregon and Idaho arrived for this market and moved readily at about quotations, though best shaded off slightly. Market, however, is fairly steady.

Sheep and lambs remain strong, and the receipts this morning were promptly disposed of at quoted prices.

Hogs are very strong and while no advance was noted today there is every indication that on both sheep and hogs the market will improve before the end of the week.
