

HOW THE SOLONS
GOT DOWN TO
WORK AT SALEM

Salem, Jan. 14.—Organized by the election on the first ballot in each house, of E. W. Haines, of Washington county, for president of the senate, and of Frank Davey, of Marion, for speaker of the house, the Oregon legislature made itself ready today for law-making. Committees will be announced Wednesday or Thursday.

Haines was elected over Hodgson, of Multnomah, by a vote of 17 to 7; four Democrats, Caldwell, of Yamhill, Smith, of Umatilla, Hedges, of Clackamas, and Mullt, of Jackson, joined the 13 supporters of Haines, and Haines voted for Bowerman, one of his followers. Hodgson voted for Bailey, and Miller, of Linn, for Coshaw, and Coshaw for Smith, of Umatilla.

This combination took the Hodgson followers by surprise. Their eight men had refused to go into caucus with a majority of the Republican senate members in Haines' camp, numbering 14, and expected to hold up the organization of the senate with a stubborn fight until the Haines forces might go to pieces and be made into new alliances. Hodgson's ninth supporter, Coke, of Coos, did not arrive to participate in the election.

In the house Davey received 59 votes and Rothschild, the lone Democrat of that body, who nominated himself, received one, each voting for the other. In the Republican nominating caucus Davey had 44 votes, one of his supporters, Raymond, being absent, and Vawter 14. There was no contest, and the voting was perfunctory, all knowing what the result would be.

Officials of Senate.

The Haines forces picked all the officers in caucus. Frank S. Grant, of Portland, won over S. L. Moorhead for chief clerk. John Hunt, of Marion, and Frank Motter, of Multnomah, were chosen assistant clerk and reading clerk respectively without opposition. F. K. Lovell won out over Frank Middleton, F. A. Turner and Elmer Robbins for calendar clerk. W. S. Myers was given the position of sergeant-at-arms without opposition, and G. G. Gans was made doorkeeper in the same manner. For mail clerk there was a close contest between Fred D. Gardner, of Baker county, and Frank Rogers, of Portland, the former winning out.

Officers of House.

W. Lair Thompson, of Albany, was chosen chief clerk, and the rest of the nominees are as follows:

Assistant chief clerk—W. F. Drager, of Marion.

Reading clerk—John Withycombe, brother of Dr. James Withycombe, of Corvallis.

Calendar clerk—W. M. Barry, of Portland.

Sergeant-at-arms—T. E. Hills, of Jackson.

Doorkeeper—Henry Ford, of Portland.

Mailing clerk—E. L. King, of Malheur.

Three pages will be appointed by the speaker.

CHAMBERLAIN TAKES

OATH OF OFFICE AGAIN

Salem, Jan. 15.—George E. Chamberlain's second inaugural as governor was held at 1:30 p. m. today. The two houses met in joint convention to canvas the vote for governor and as soon as the vote had been announced the oath of office was administered by one of the justices of the supreme court. Governor Chamberlain then read his message.

There will be no ballot on United States senator until Tuesday, January 22, when the formal election of F. W. Mulkey for the short term and Jonathan Bourne for the long term will take place. It is thought that the election of Mulkey would take place immediately, for the reason that the appointment of Gearin was only "until the next meeting of the legislature," but an investigation shows that even in filling a vacancy the election must be held on the second Tuesday after organization.
