SIUSLAW STAGE TEAM GOES OVER PRECIPICE

Horses Plunge Into Roaring River at Tilden Rock

One Killed Outright But Other Succumbs in Swimming Across Ragging Torrent - Driver Taylor Has Narrow Escape - L. E. Bean and Jos. Fellman Passengers

One of the stage teams of Barnard & West's Eugene-Mapleton line went over the grade at Tilden Rock, about ten o'clock last night and one of the horses was killed. The news of the accident was received here this morning when Lester Ogden, one of the drivers on the western terminus of the line, telephoned from Hale to Barnard & West, asking them to send out another team.

By telephoning to Hale the Guard learned the particulars of the accident substantially as follows: The stage, driven by Frank Taylor, reached Tilden Rock shortly before ten o'clock and as the grade there is always a dangerous one, the driver slowed the team up and proceeded with great caution, as the road was very slippery. As they reached the point where the water pours down the mountain and across the road the horses slipped and fell and were unable to rise. The driver and the passengers, Attorney Louis E. Bean and Jos. Fellman, of this city, got out and unshipped the team, and as they were struggling to regain their feet both horses slipped on the ice which covered the road and fell over the precipice to the river, 30 or 40 feet below. One of the horses was killed instantly, and it was thought

the other one met a similar fate, but as the outstanding stage came along this morning it was seen across the river, in apparent good shape and none the worse for its fall and plunge into the icy waters of the Siuslaw. The river is a roaring torrent at that place, and it is remarkable that the horse succeeded in swimming across it.

Driver Taylor had a very narrow escape from going over the precipice with the horses. In some manner he became tangled up in the harness and was dragged to the very edge of the grade, but by almost superhuman effort succeeded in freeing himself just in time.

The horse which was killed was a very good stage animal, worth over \$100. It has not been learned whether or not the horse that swam the river was injured by its fall, as it had not been brought back across at the time the Guard telephoned to Hale this morning. The horses belonged to Captain A. F. Hurd, of Florence, who owns the stage line, Barnard & West being the lessees.

Tilden Rock, where the accident occurred, is about ten miles from Mapleton coming this way. The road along there is very narrow, it having been blasted out of the solid rock for several hundred yards. Teams are unable to pass for quite a distance, and on that account many bad accidents have been lately averted and several minor ones have occurred.
