

SALE OF M'CLUNG BLOCK HAS BEEN MADE

Brick Building at Eighth and Willamette Streets Has Changed Hands

Deal for Sale of Property to Other Parties Fell Through and Cockerline & Wetherbee Now Occupying Building Snapped up, Good Bargain

(From Thursday's Guard.)
The McClung block at Eighth and Willamette streets, has been sold to A. T. Cockerline and F. R. Wetherbee, comprising the firm of Cockerline & Wetherbee, who occupy the building with their dry goods store. The deal was completed yesterday afternoon, and the new owners are now in possession of the building.

A report of the sale of the building to other parties was published a few days ago, but the announcement was premature, the deal not having been completed, and the Guard at the time stated that it might not be, as the owner of the building, J. H. McClung, and the persons contemplating purchasing it could not agree on certain conditions. The Guard was right, and the deal was called off yesterday, whereupon Cockerline & Wetherbee, who have wanted the building for some time past, began negotiations with Mr. McClung, with the result that they secured the property at a good figure. The purchase price is not given out for publication, but it is understood to be in the neighborhood of \$25,000.

The building is a two-story brick, 55x114 feet in dimensions, and is one of the finest business blocks in the city and splendidly located. It is the only steam-heated business building in Eugene, and is modern in every detail. It was erected by Mr. McClung about five years ago, and took the place of an old brick and stone building which stood so long on that corner.

Cockerline and Wetherbee occupy the corner store room in the building, and plan some time in the future to occupy the whole ground floor, but this action will not be taken for a while yet, as Hull, the druggist, has a lease on the other portion which does not expire very soon.

The new owners of the building are among Eugene's youngest and most enterprising business firms and have built up a splendid trade since they opened their store, shortly after the building was completed. Their many friends are glad to see them secure the building.

Midgely and Pratt Surprised.
Geo. Midgely and Robert Pratt, the other parties with whom Mr. McClung had been dealing, in speaking of the sale of the building to Cockerline & Wetherbee, this afternoon stated to a Guard representative that they had paid Mr. McClung \$1000 to bind the bargain, but in making an abstract of the property a slight flaw in the title was found, which delayed the deal. They say that Mr. McClung agreed to make the title good under the Torrens system, and they were waiting for that to be done when they were surprised to hear that the building had been sold to Cockerline & Wetherbee.

May Sell Other Block.
It is said that Mr. McClung has a deal on for the sale of his Seventh and Willamette street block, a well-known business man of this city being the prospective purchaser.

PRINEVILLE 35 DEGREES COLDER THAN EUGENE

Prineville is only 125 miles from Eugene, but the temperature is from 30 to 35 degrees colder there than it is here. The following is a press dispatch from that city:

"It looks as if the Crook county cold snap was here to stay. Following yesterday's early morning temperature of 20 below zero, the weather continues clear with conditions all good for stock feeding, both for butcher stock and stock cattle and sheep.

"At Bend there is 18 inches of snow; at Prineville 2 inches; at Sam Smith's ranch on the Ochow, 2 inches of erusted snow; at Howard, 10 inches; at Hay Creek, 2 inches; at Culver, 3 inches. Wood has advanced. The ice crop is not yet good."

Salem, Or., Jan. 17.—Both houses of the Oregon legislature opened with a red-hot fight on graft propositions in general.

In the Senate.
The committee on resolutions reported in favor of 41 clerks for the senate, exclusive of desk clerks, joint investigating committee clerks, and such other clerks as may be provided for by resolution. The compensation is to be from \$3 to \$6 per day. It was stated that this would reduce the cost of clerk hire to about one-half that of last session.

The committee on resolutions reported against a committee to investigate the state treasurer's office.

Proceedings Summarized.
Both senate and house adopted a

concurrent resolution to adjourn until 2 o'clock Monday afternoon. A majority of the senators left for Portland yesterday morning on a special train.

The senate committee on resolutions is considering a plan not to allow mileage to members using passes on trips. When passes are not used senators will be required to make vouchers for mileage before they can collect the money. The resolution providing that joint committees examine the treasurer's books of public institutions was reported unfavorably. Such a resolution will not be adopted.

All Want Economy.
Joint committees will visit all state institutions, but will not be allowed clerks to accompany them. This eliminates 24 clerkships. The resolutions committee combined the messenger to the house and to the printer in one. Frank Rogers was appointed senate messenger.

Senators believe auditing state accounts by the committees is a waste of time and money and a farce that should be stopped. They favor a measure like the Newell house bill. Booth reintroduced senate bill 56 from last session, providing a state examiner for public offices.

Clerks Get Out.
Each senator will be allowed one clerk. Eleven clerks for important committees are provided, making a total of 41 clerks. At the last session there were 56 senate clerks and 34 joint committee clerks. The Kay resolution is estimated to cause a saving in clerkships of \$7000.

The Duniway form of Calendar was adopted by both senate and house, effecting a saving of over \$10,000 during the session.

Marion Morris, the deputy log scaler of Lane county, scaled 1500 logs on the north and south spits of the river. It is thought as many more went to sea. The Hurd Lumber and Navigation Company are the heaviest losers, over half of what was found on the spit belonging to them. The large pond of water which stands on the picnic grounds west of town is frozen over, and a large number of people are enjoying themselves skating. It has been eight years since this pond froze over.

Washington, Jan. 18.—By a vote of 132 to 92 the house of representatives voted to increase their salaries to \$7500 per year.

KITTERIDGE FLAYS LUMBER TRUST IN SENATE

Washington, Jan. 18.—Addressing the senate today on the lumber trust Senator Kittredge declared it to be the "king of trusts in restraint of trade." Continuing he said:

"In its far reaching effects there is none to compare with it. The consumer not only bears the burden of its aggressive policy of advancing prices, but also of the profits of intervening agencies. For him there is no escape from the avarice of this monopoly. When he sees these advancing prices without reference to increased cost of production he needs no argument to convince him that the government to which he contributes his support and renders due allegiance is derelict in its duty unless it employs all the resources at its command to relieve him of these oppressions.

The people demand this as a right, not as a favor.

Mr. Kittredge said that "it costs \$10 to manufacture the lumber at the mills and yields to the trust a profit of at least two hundred per cent. According to the last census of the United States the value of the timber products in 1900 was \$566,000,000.

"The methods by which this trust has obtained control of the lumber business of this country are no longer necessarily a secret. It not only arbitrarily advances the price of lumber, but resorts to drastic and unscrupulous methods to crush competitors.

"The mill men as well as retailers are also subject to like domination and like discipline."

As to the effect on the price of lumber he said:

"Within the past five years the price of lumber and timber products have been arbitrarily advanced from one hundred to five hundred per cent. There is nothing but robbery and it is, in fact, the plunder of a commercial outlaw.

"Had the existence of the trust been known to the framers of the tariff act of either 1890 or 1897, it is not probable that it would have been thought necessary to foster the lumber industry by a protective duty. There is no longer either any necessity or excuse for its continuance. It is not the policy of this government to foster monopolies, and while it must be apparent that the present duties are not solely responsible for the exorbitant prices of lumber, I am unqualifiedly in favor of their repeal."
