

RADER WILL BE ASKED TO QUIT

Portland, Jan. 29.—Rev. Paul Rader, superintendent of the Oregon Anti-Saloon League, will be asked to resign at a special meeting of the board of trustees, which will be held the latter part of this week. The ground upon which he will be asked to resign is the general management of the financial affairs of the organization.

The movement to oust Rader is backed by Dr. Clarence True Wilson, Dr. J. Whitcomb Brongher, Rev. E. S. Munkley, secretary of the league; Rev. T. H. Ford, Rev. A. D. Waters, Rev. William H. Hegge and Rev. F. L. Young, all of whom have signed a petition asking President Joseph R. Wilson to call a special meeting of the trustees for the purpose of going into the financial affairs of the organization and to ask Mr. Rader to lay down the duties of the office and retire.

the petition for a special meeting to investigate and force Rader to resign. Several of those who have signed the petition have also, heretofore, affirmed their signatures to notes, to finance Rader's crusade against saloons, and which, it is declared, remains unpaid, both as to principal and interest.

Mr. Rader, who is at Medford, promoting anti-saloon work, says he will return to the city Wednesday, and that he will then be ready to meet his accusers. He says he has no fear of an investigation of the affairs of the organization of which he is the managing and financial head.

OREGON PIONEER DIED AT HOME NEAR ROSEBURG

This county has suffered the loss of one more of its pioneer residents in the death of Narcissus La Raut, Sr., who passed away at his home in Garden Valley Sunday afternoon, January 27, 1907, after an illness of about ten days of pneumonia and heart trouble, says the Roseburg Review. Had he lived until next May he would have been 82 years of age.

Deceased came to California via the isthmus of Panama in 1849, and to Oregon the following year, locating with several companions in what was thereafter known as French settlement, about eight miles northwest of Roseburg, in 1851. Some years later he moved across the Umpqua river into Garden Valley, where he ever since resided. There he built up one of the most substantial and comfortable homes in the county.

Mr. La Raut is survived by his wife, two sons and five daughters. The sons are: Stephen La Raut, of Baginaw, Oregon; and Narcissus La Raut, Jr., of Garden Valley. The daughters are: Mrs. L. A. Marsters, Roseburg; Mrs. R. A. Booth, Mrs. L. L. Lewis, Eugene; Mrs. H. G. Smith, Grants Pass; Miss Lucy La Raut, of Garden Valley.

Funeral services were held at the family home in Garden Valley this morning, and interment occurred at 2 p. m. in the Masonic cemetery near Roseburg. The ceremonies were conducted by Laurel lodge No. 11, A. F. & A. M., of which the deceased was an honored member.

Mr. La Raut was of that sturdy pioneer stock which did so much for establishing the standards of civilization in what was then a wilderness. His high personal worth and unquestioned integrity won for him the confidence and esteem of all who knew him, and at an advanced age his passing to the great beyond is the occasion of profound regret, for it is men like him who constitute the sterling citizenship of the community.

BAD ACCIDENT TO LOGGER ON WINBERRY

William Dunlap Falls on Rocks, Breaking His Jaw—No More Dead-ends on Telephone.

FOR CLEANER ORCHARDS

Oregon State Inspectors Map Out Season's Campaign

Corvallis, Or., Jan. 28.—Plans are perfected for a vigorous and uniform campaign in cleaning up old orchards and generally improving conditions throughout the fruit districts of Oregon during the coming season. Most of the fruit inspectors and two of the commissioners have been here a week attending short course lectures at the college and conferring with Professor Cordley for methods to be used in the coming work. The lectures were attended during the day and each evening there were conference sessions with Professor Cordley at which methods and plans were discussed.

Among those in attendance were Commissioner J. H. Reid, of the first district, manager of the well-known Wallace orchard at Salem; Inspector Castner, of Hood River; Inspector Lewis, of Clackamas county; Inspector Goodrich, Yamhill; Inspector Nan, Polk county; Inspector Armstrong, Marion county; Inspector Roberts, Linn county; Inspector Meserve, Josephine county, and the following prominent orchardists: Mr. Pankey, manager of the Olwell orchard at Central Point; Mr. Harris, manager of the Lewis orchard, Table Rock; Mr. Holloway, who is planting a large orchard near Lebanon, and many others.

As a result of the conferences, an attempt will be made to get all the inspectors in the state to attend the lectures next year. For the present year an enthusiastic spirit is aroused and an energetic movement is afoot to bring order out of a chaotic orchard conditions. The inspectors have requested Professor Cordley to determine the treatment to be applied to trees and he is to prepare printed literature covering the requirements and giving directions, to be distributed among orchardists in the various localities.

DEATH VALLEY IS COVERED WITH SNOW

San Francisco, Jan. 29.—W. T. Parker, arriving from Goldfield, brought the news that a blizzard is raging in Death Valley, accompanied by an unprecedented fall of snow. Several inches of snow is reported at the bottom of Death Valley, a thing never before heard of.

Last night the mission was abandoned entirely, and the worshippers met at the residence of S. W. Moore, where it was rumored customary seances were held.

WILL SURVEY NEW ROUTE TO SPRINGFIELD

(From Tuesday's Guard.)

Simon Klov Dahl, the well known local civil engineer, has been employed by the Willamette Valley Co. to have charge of the work of surveying for the street railway line, the Eugene-Springfield line and the line which the company intends to build up the McKenzie to the Blue River mines. General Manager Welch, who is up from Portland today, informed a Guard reporter this morning that Mr. Klov Dahl will at once begin the work of running another preliminary line between Eugene and Springfield, this time going over and around the Fairmount heights and as near to the new city park as possible. If this route is found to be feasible the line will be constructed that way, as it is desired to have car service for the park. No park is a success without it. The company has a line surveyed on each side of the river and with the line over the heights there will certainly be a variety of routes to choose from.

It is probable that a decision as to the route to be taken will be arrived at within a few days, or just as soon as the last named is surveyed.

The McKenzie Railway.

Mr. Welch said that as soon as this piece of surveying is completed Engineer Klov Dahl will be put to work on the preliminary survey for the line up the McKenzie, and as soon as it is completed right-of-way agents will be placed in the field. It is desired that the line be completed as soon as possible, and it may be that cars will be operating between Eugene and the watering places on the upper river by the summer of 1908.

Headquarters Here.

As soon as the actual construction work on the street railway line begins Mr. Welch will move his headquarters to Eugene and maintain them until this piece of work, as well as the Springfield line and the McKenzie line, are completed. It is the company's intention to rush this work to completion, and it will not be many more weeks until operations on an extensive scale will have commenced.

Eugene Street Railway.

In regard to the street railway, Mr. Welch said that there might be some delay in getting the rails, all depending upon the kind of paving material for the streets decided upon by the city council. If asphaltum is laid the common "T" rails will be used, but if bitulithic a special rail will have to be ordered. The first shipment of the "T" rails is expected to arrive here about the 1st of March, but if it is necessary to use any other it will be several weeks later before they can get here.
