

## RIGHT-OF-WAY WORK BEGINS IN FEW DAYS

(From Thursday's Guard.)

A. Welch, general manager of the Willamette Valley Company, accompanied by I. W. Anderson, of Spokane, J. H. Rhodes and S. D. Sinkler, all connected with the great syndicate which owns and controls many electric, gas and water plants in the Pacific Northwest, including those in Eugene, arrived here from the south last evening and spent this forenoon in looking over the company's properties in this city and Springfield. This is Mr. Rhodes' first visit to Eugene. He expressed himself today as being impressed with the appearance of the city and with the prospects for its future growth. The gentlemen were driven to the new city park site and all were struck with its advantageous location and beauty of its surroundings. It is probable that the company will build its street railway line to the foot of the hills on which the park is situated.

Speaking of the street railway system, Manager Welch stated that the first steel rails were due here by the first of March, but whether the railroad could deliver them by that time he did not know. The work of constructing the line will begin upon their arrival.

### Right-of-Way Work.

Mr. Welch informed a reporter that the work of securing the right-of-way for the line between Eugene and Springfield will begin within a few days. He expects to return here next week, at which time it is probable that operations in that line will be commenced. For obvious reasons he does not care at present to announce the route selected, but will give the information to the public within a short time.

WILLIAM JENNINGS BRYAN.

Wm. Jennings Bryan, the Nebraska commoner, arrived in Eugene on this afternoon's train from the north. The purpose of his visit to this city at this time is to deliver an address to the university tonight, but the loyal Democrats of Lane county and the citizens in general have taken advantage of the occasion to express their admiration for him as a statesman and citizen by tendering him a series of receptions and banquets. Mr. Bryan was accompanied by his wife and the committee of prominent state Democrats who have been with him during his trip through the state. Dr. Whitson, president of the Commercial Club, and the members of the Lane county reception committee, were also on the train and accompanied the distinguished visitor to the Hotel Smeede.

After his arrival at the hotel Mr. Bryan retired to his room, where he rested from his tiresome trip up from Salem for an hour, no one being allowed to disturb him, as he desired absolute quiet before attending the informal reception which is in progress at the Commercial Club.

Long before the train from the north arrived the people began to crowd about the depot platform, anxious to catch a glimpse of Mr. Bryan and his wife, and before its arrival the depot grounds and the platform of the warehouses in that vicinity were simply a mass of humanity. Perhaps 1500 people were there. Every one recognized Bryan as he alighted from the train and every one had a chance to see him as he was driven down town in an open cab.

At the reception this afternoon Mr. Bryan delivered an address. The rooms were crowded to their utmost capacity. The remaining time was spent in greeting Mr. and Mrs. Bryan. Hundreds thronged the rooms of the club all afternoon and among the crowds were a number who had known the visitors back East and who were readily recognized and given a cordial greeting.

After the lecture at the university tonight a 50-cent banquet will be given in the Paine building, directly beneath the Commercial Club rooms. Mr. Bryan will be called upon at this time to make a political speech, and several local speakers of note may be on the program. Covers will be laid for 300 persons and any one who wishes to participate may do so, 50 seats being reserved for members of the legislature, who will arrive up from Salem on the 9 o'clock train, and fifty more for members of the state and county central committees. J. M. Howe has charge of the sale of tickets.

### BRYAN SPEAKS TO OREGON LEGISLATURE

Salem, Jan. 24.—William J. Bryan today addressed the Oregon legislature in joint session. The Nebraska commoner urged the passage of railroad legislation with a commission appointed by the governor. Bryan said the best results were possible from giving the commission wide power and holding one man responsible to the people.

He also discussed the initiative and referendum, hours of labor, maximum dividends for corporations and short term franchises.

## HARRIMAN HAS THROTTLED OREGON INTERESTS

Portland, Jan. 24.—E. H. Harriman has throttled Central Oregon through his failure to extend the Columbia Southern from Shaniko to Bend, as he promised the shippers of Portland to do, and by limiting the number of branch lines constructed from the O. R. & N. Southern Pacific and O. S. L., has virtually isolated 50,000 square miles from railroad transportation facilities. Since the consolidation of the Southern Pacific with the Union Pacific in 1901, traffic has been routed to and from the East in a manner that would insure the system the most revenue.

These facts are the principal matters the interstate commerce commission gleaned from the testimony submitted to it this morning at the first session of the commission in this city.

### BERT SEELEY MADE SIX GOOD INDIANS

Denver, Jan. 24.—Single handed, according to a special dispatch from Douglas, Arizona, Bert Seeley, a famous Arizona cowboy, shot and killed six Yaqui Indians who attacked him with picks and shovels after a quarrel. The slaughter occurred at Beatty camp, on the Southern Pacific. Seeley, who bears an excellent reputation, escaped unharmed.
