

HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY IS ORGANIZED

(From Saturday's Guard.)
About thirty-five local growers of the county met in the county court room at the courthouse this afternoon for the purpose of organizing a horticultural society. Dr. H. F. McCornack, county fruit inspector, called the meeting to order and he was chosen temporary chairman. A. C. Jennings was chosen temporary secretary. Dr. McCornack stated the object of the meeting and a form of constitution and a name for the organization was adopted. The name chosen is the "Lane County Horticultural Society." The membership fee was placed at \$1, and the annual dues at the same amount.

A permanent organization was then effected. Dr. McCornack being elected president, H. A. Bower vice president and A. C. Jennings secretary and treasurer. An executive committee was appointed as follows: W. G. Allen, Chas. S. Williams and Richard Bauer.

Resolutions Adopted.
Chas. S. Williams offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, by the Lane County Horticultural Society, That the fruit inspector of Lane county be and hereby is called upon by this association to strictly enforce the law for the extermination of fruit pests from the orchards of this county.

Thirty-one Paid In.

Thirty-one of the men present at the meetings that the membership fee and their names were enrolled as members. A great many more who were not present will hand in their names and it is expected that before long the membership will be three or four times as large as it is to begin with.

FREEZE KILLS WHEAT PESTS

Harrisburg, Feb. 1.—The wheat crop in this vicinity is reported badly damaged by the late hard freeze. However, it is claimed that the freezing of the ground, besides destroying a large proportion of grain pests, has improved its producing qualities, which will, to some extent, repair the apparent loss. Oats have fared much worse. It is estimated that on the average one-half the crop is killed, and many fields will have to be reseeded in the spring.

OPEN LETTER OF GRAND ARMY TO MR. EATON

Headquarters J. W. Geary Post No. 7, G. A. R.

Eugene, Or., Feb. 4, 1907.

Hon. Allen H. Eaton,

Dear Sir:—Senate bill No. 38, introduced by Hon. I. H. Bingham, is a measure which J. W. Geary Post No. 7, G. A. R., of this place, was instrumental in having brought before the legislature. As the bill has been amended by the senate it leaves it in a very unsatisfactory condition to the Grand Army of the Republic, in its amended form, as it falls entirely of the purpose intended. Many of the G. A. R. posts do not have their decoration service until the afternoon of Memorial day. The post at this place has services at the river in the afternoon, commencing at 2 o'clock and as this is one of the most beautiful and interesting services of the day, we very much desire that the day shall be protected from desecration throughout its entirety.

As you are the representative from this county, we desire that you take charge of the bill when it comes to the house. We ask you to use every honorable means to defeat the amendment to the bill in the house. Falling in this we authorize you to then have the bill withdrawn from further consideration. It seems to us that we are, as an organization, not asking anything unreasonable in this bill, and as the Grand Army of the Republic is not wealthy enough to maintain a lobby at the state capitol, even were it inclined to do so, we must rely entirely upon the patriotism of our representatives to see that we have justice in this matter. You will please make known to other representatives the contents of this communication. We further desire to inform you that of the 78 posts this post is numerically third strongest in the department.
