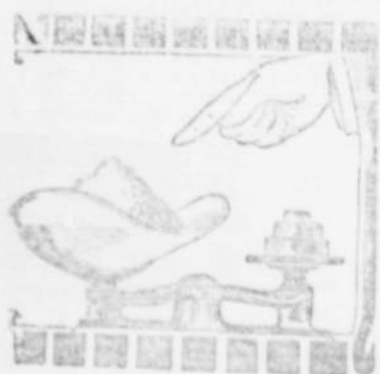

CONDEMNATION PROCEEDINGS FOR RIGHT-OF-WAY

The Oregon Eastern Railway this afternoon commenced condemnation proceedings in the circuit court against Stephen Smeed and wife for right-of-way through their land in section 6, township 19, s. r. 1 w., for the railroad proposed to be built from Natron into Eastern Oregon. The company asks the court to assess the damages which will result by reason of taking the property, and upon the payment of the sum assessed a judgment be given appropriating the right-of-way. representative Chapin, of Multnomah, because it provided for a term of six years' service for the members of the board, and the bill presented by Vawter, of Douglas and Jackson, providing for one State Board of Regents to control all the State Normal Schools, which also provides that the six appointive members shall serve for six years, which the ways and means committee of the house has decided to recommend favorably, will suffer a like fate, as will the bill introduced by Wilson, of Multnomah, providing for a Board of State Osteopathic Examination and Registration, the proposed five members of which shall serve for a period of five years.

WILL BUILD NEW BLOCK IN EUGENE

H. Gordon, of this city, who recently sold his large housefurnishing business to Campbell & Feilman, will probably erect a large business house where his residence now stands at Charnelton and West Ninth streets. The building as planned will occupy a ground space of 40x100 feet, and will necessitate the removal of the residence to another part of the block. The building, in case satisfactory arrangements are made with the prospective tenants, will be started in a short time and be completed by July 1st. It would be occupied at once.

Will Build in Portland.
Mr. Gordon has definitely decided to remove to Portland and enter the retail furniture business in that city and will commence the erection of a fine five-story building on his property there, which will be constructed of pressed brick and stone, with 150 feet of glass frontage and modern in all respects. John Hanzicker, of this city, is the architect, and Midgley's mill, of this city, will furnish the mill work on the building, which will be constructed by H. Snook, of Salem.

Mr. Gordon, who with Mr. Hanzicker is now in Portland, has also just bought a residence site in that city.

ARRESTED FOR VIOLATING BOOZE ORDINANCE

Jake Berger, owner of "The Reception," formerly a saloon, appeared in the municipal court this forenoon at 10 o'clock, having been arrested last night for violation of two sections of the "blue law" recently passed by the city council. The sections alleged to have been violated are those declaring any place where liquor is stored a public nuisance, and prohibiting the sale of liquor in the city.

Sheriff Fisk, Chief of Police Farrington and Night officers Croner and Purdy entered Purdy's place last night and made a search of the premises. They found two bottles of whiskey, a small keg of wine, and a demijohn, which they confiscated to be used as evidence. They cited Berger to appear in court this morning and he was released upon his own recognizance.

When Berger was arraigned in court he asked that the case be postponed until his attorneys, Chas. A. Hardy and A. C. Woodcock, could be in the city, and the time for entering a plea was set for Friday at 2 p. m.

Prosecute Only One Charge.
City Attorney Bean, after reading the complaint, stated that only one charge, that of maintaining a public nuisance, would be pushed and the other would be dismissed if the case was settled satisfactorily to the city. The section of the ordinance pertaining to public nuisances reads as follows:

"Section 6. The common council of the city of Eugene hereby declares all places within the city of Eugene, where intoxicating liquors are kept for storage, barter or sale, to be a public nuisance, and any person, firm company or corporation maintaining any such nuisance within the city of Eugene, upon refusal to abate the same on demand, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the city recorder shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$15 nor more than \$200."

The fine for the sale of liquor is from \$50 to \$200 and imprisonment in the city jail not less than 25 days nor more than 100 days.

SPRINGFIELD JUNCTION TO HAVE DEPOT

J. B. Eddy, right-of-way agent for the Southern Pacific Company, appeared before the county commissioners' court this forenoon and announced that the company intends to erect a depot at Springfield Junction, formerly known as Henderson station, but in order to do so it is necessary to encroach upon the county road. He made a proposition to the court that the company pay for a strip of land to widen the road at that place so that there would be room for the depot without making the road any narrower than it is at present.

It is proposed to build the depot 449 feet west of the box car that is a present doing duty for a depot, and it will be located south of the track. The road that will be affected by the building of the depot is the one leading up to the Laurel Grove cemetery. The proposed depot will extend into the road about ten feet and the length of the strip wanted by the company is 52 feet. It is proposed to purchase a strip of land that wide from Carrie Winter, the owner of the land adjoining the depot site, and use it in widening the road.

The court seems disposed to accommodate the railroad company in this regard, and as there will be no expense to the county it is probable that the order will be issued. Of course the usual red tape procedure will have to be gone through with and it will be some time before the transfer of the strip of land in question can be made to the county.

It is not known when the company intends to erect the depot, but it is thought it will be this summer.

Petitions Presented.
Mr. Eddy also presented a petition for a telephone line to be built along the county road between the company's sawmills Nos. 2 and 3 on the Mohawk, and for the privilege of building a lumber flume over certain county roads between Marcola and Mabel and Marcola and Wendling.
