RAILROAD INTERESTS CONTROL AT SALEM

Guard Special Service.

Salem, Or., Feb. 11.—Jockeying with the railroad commission bill commenced in the house this morning when the session opened.

The Chapin bill, which was lost Friday, was made a special order for this afternoon at 3 o'clock, but there is a decided sentiment in the house to delay action on this bill in the house until the fate of Bingham's bill in the senate is decided.

The railroad forces were busy on the floor of the house all morning, lobbying for delay, and by noon Chapin and the backers of the bill were plainly worried.

House Passes Bills Today.
A number of important bills were passed by the house today, and a number more were favorably reported on by the committees and will later pass.

After a long debate house bill No. 293, creating cheese and dairy inspectors, was passed.

House bill No. 165, providing for conventions of district school superintendents once a year in each county, was also passed.

Fright was caused by the bill to place the money received from the forest reserves into the school fund of each county. This money now goes to the general county fund and many members opposed the bill because it would increase the taxes of the counties by taking away money now received for general purposes from the forest reserve funds. The measure would especially hit country districts in the forest reserve counties hard. It was referred to the judiciary committee again.

Dye's house bill No. 128, forcing street car companies to supply seats for all passengers, or refund half the fare paid, was lost by a large majority.

House bill No. 97, providing that United States flags shall be displayed on or near every school house during fair weather was passed.

House bill No. 252, providing for \$100,000 to reimburse the Indian war veterans for horses in old campaigns, was referred back to the ways and means committee amended to appropriate \$50,000 for this purpose and will likely pass in this form.

Game Bill Reported.
A comprehensive game bill was reported back by the game committee and will most likely be passed tomorrow. The closed season for buck is made from November 1 to July 15, September 1. No one shall kill more than five deer in a season, and hunting with dogs is prohibited.

Night hunting is prohibited, as is the sale of deer meat. In Coos and Curry counties all killing of female deer is prohibited by the new bill, and Harney and Malheur are excepted from the provisions of the measure.

Hermann Trial On.
Salem, Or., Feb. 12.—Senate bill No. 129, by Bingham, creating a railroad commission, passed the senate this afternoon by a vote of 17 to 12. This measure differs from the amended Chapin bill, as passed by the house, inasmuch as it gives the appointing power of the commission to the governor. The Bingham bill now goes to the house.

PETITION FOR WRIT OF REVIEW IN BERGER CASE

The petition for writ of review in the Jake Berger case, which was tried in the recorder's court a few days ago, resulting in Berger's conviction, was filed in the circuit court today. The grounds on which the writ of review are based are as follows:

That section 8 of the city ordinance under which the conviction was made is void for the reason that the charter of the city does not authorize or empower the city to regulate the storage of liquor, or to provide a penalty for the same, or to declare the same a nuisance, or to establish rules of evidence for trials, and therefore said conviction and sentence are void.

That the recorder committed an error in overruling the plaintiff's demurrer to the complaint for the reason that the ordinance is in conflict with section 9, article 1, of the constitution of the state of Oregon; for the reason that the ordinance and section 8 thereof, is in conflict with the local option law of the state of Oregon.

That the recorder committed an error in passing sentence for the reason that under the charter of the city the council was not empowered to enact the ordinance and section 8 thereof.

The petition prays that the writ of review be issued out of the circuit court and that an order be issued directing the recorder to return a transcript of all the proceedings in the case, and all the papers filed therein, with a certified copy of the ordinance and a copy of all the journal entries in said cause; that the same be reviewed and that said city recorder and all officers acting under the order of the recorder desist from further proceedings in the matter to be reviewed.

Judge Harris has granted the order prayed for in the petition.

UNIVERSITY GETS \$125,000 YEARLY FROM STATE

Salem, Or., Feb. 12.—The house last night passed Representative Eaton's bill appropriating \$125,000 annually for the State University. The six opposing the bill were Campbell, Dye, Freeman, Jones, of Clackamas, Purdy and Upmeyer. In the afternoon the bill was debated in committee of the whole, Campbell endeavoring to reduce the amount to \$90,000, and Purdy aiding him. Eaton and Edwards, of Lane, made vigorous speeches in behalf of the bill.

During the consideration of the bill in committee of the whole at the afternoon session, McCue, Jackson, Washburne and Barrett, of Umatilla, spoke in advocacy of the enlarged appropriation. Purdy supported Campbell's amendment in the interest of keeping the tax levy down.

SUES FOR COMMISSION OF FIVE HUNDRED

J. J. Johnson Wants That Amount for Sale of Shares of Stock in Wildwood Lumber Company.

J. J. Johnson has begun suit in the circuit court for \$500 commission on the sale of 1002 shares of stock in the Wildwood Lumber Company, of Cottage Grove. The suit is against A. B. Wood, manager of the Oregon & Southeastern railroad, and interested in the Oregon Securities Co., the big concern operating in the Bohemia district. Johnson alleges in his complaint that in March, 1906, Wood engaged him to sell the shares of stock aforesaid, and that between March 1st and September 1st, 1906, he found a purchaser and the sale was made for \$12,000, but that the defendant had failed and neglected to pay the \$500 commission or any part thereof. U'ren & Schaefer are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

WILL DIVIDE OREGON INTO TWO DISTRICTS

Washington, Feb. 11.—The senate committee on judiciary ordered a favorable report on Fulton's bill dividing Oregon into two judicial districts. The bill as reported makes the Cascade mountains the dividing line, creating one district east of the mountains and the other west. The present judge and officials are assigned to the western district and the appointment of another judge and officers is authorized. The court of the eastern district is Baker City. It may be amended to provide for sessions at Pendleton. The committee also reported the bill providing for a term of court at Bellingham, Washington.

The committee on commerce today unanimously adopted Fulton's amendment providing for two harbor dredges, one in Oregon and one in Washington. The house bill authorized one dredge in both states. The amendment carries one hundred thousand dollars for each dredge.
