ATTEMPT TO ROB SPRINGFIELD POSTOFFICE

Last Saturday morning about 1:30 some one broke a pane of glass out of the door in the rear end of the Springfield postoffice, took away the prop that fastens the door and turning the key entered the building. He at once made for the cash tills and pried them open, but as the money and stamps had been taken out and put in the safe his effort at burglary proved fruitless, for he was interrupted in his search before he had time to crack the safe.

Asst. Postmaster Grant Roberts was on his way home when he noticed a flash of light in the rear of the building. His curiosity was at once aroused so he made haste to enter the office to see what was doing. Upon entering he heard some one in the back end, but as odds were against him he retreated. However, he succeeded in frightening the bold thugs away, and upon later investigation found several sticks of dynamite, a sledge hammer and several other tools that would aid in safe cracking. As far as given out by the postmaster nothing of value was taken. There is no clue as to who the guilty parties are, but from all appearances it was some one familiar with the surroundings.
