DAMAGE CASE AGAINST S. P. CO IN COURT

(From Tuesday's Guard.) The case of S. A. Scharen, W. J. Scharen and J. A. Scharen against the Southern Pacific Company for damages for the killing of several cattle by the company's gravel trains near Creswell last summer, was the first jury trial to come up in the circuit court this morning. The following jury was chosen: E. F. Judkins, Jas. Lebow, Ed. Hanson, T. A. Evans, S. R. Mosher, G. F. Warner, T. J. Kirk, H. B. Dunlap, Geo. W. Allen, J. A. Hileman, Jas. Higgins and G. H. Roberts.

The case went to the jury late this afternoon.

Andrews and Mrs. Chezem Win. In the case of W. B. Andrews vs. Mrs. Edith B. Linton, to recover money on a bill of lading, the jury last night returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$167.33. Mrs. Mary E. Chezem secured a verdict against Henry Chezem in the case tried yesterday for the recovery of a piano.

Indictment Against Ellis.

The grand jury is hard at work on criminal cases, bringing in an indictment this morning against Raymond Ellis, who is now in the county jail charged with the crime of incest, alleged to have been committed against his niece, Miss McGraw, residing at Mabel. The jury is investigating other alleged infractions of the law, and it is said a number of arrests that will surprise the public may be made as a result of the investigations.

RAY ELLIS PLEADS GUILTY TO INCEST CHARGE

The several cases in the circuit court against Eugene, Springfield and Florence men, charged with violating the local option law by the alleged sale of liquor, which have gone through several terms, have again been continued to await the decision of the supreme court on one of the cases that was appealed from the circuit court.

Ellis Pleads Guilty.

Raymond Ellis, the man charged with the crime of incest, was arraigned in court yesterday afternoon and the time for entering a plea was set for 10 o'clock this morning. At that hour he appeared and pleaded guilty. He will be sentenced Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

Scharen Bros. Get Verdict.

The jury in the case of the Scharen Brothers, of Creswell, against the Southern Pacific company, for damages for the killing of several head of cattle by one of the company's gravel trains last fall, returned a verdict last night, awarding the plaintiffs \$225.

LOOKING FOR BRIDGE SITE ON THE RIVER

E. W. Hall, of the Willamette Valley Company, accompanied by A. Duchamp, consulting engineer, arrived up from Portland last night and returned to that city today. The purpose of their trip to this city was to view out a suitable site for the construction of a bridge across the Willamette river for the Eugene-Springfield electric railway. They viewed three different sites, two at Eugene and one at Springfield. Engineer Duchamp will report to the company within a few days and whichever site he decides to be the most feasible will be chosen by the company, and it is probable that construction work will begin very soon after the decision is made.

One of the sites in Eugene examined by the engineer is above the butte, in the vicinity of the wagon bridge, and the other is below the butte.

May Use the Wagon Bridge.

The wagon bridge at Springfield was thoroughly examined and it is probable that the company will interview the county court at its next session in regard to strengthening and widening the bridge so that cars can cross it, and if satisfactory arrangements can be made the structure can be utilized, thus saving thousands of dollars for the company.

NEW SYSTEM FAVORED BY PRUNE GROWERS

Salem, Or., March 3.—The movement for a change in the grading of prunes for market received a new impetus at the meeting of the Marion County Horticultural Society yesterday when the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, By the Marion County Horticultural Society, that the present method of grading prunes is arbitrary and is the cause of constant loss to the growers.

"Resolved, That the growers of Marion and Polk counties favor a change by which the two largest sizes of any season's output (as at present graded) be known as first, of fancy sizes; the succeeding two sizes as second, or medium, and the smaller size as third grade, or small prunes.

"That copies of these resolutions be given the daily papers, and also our agricultural papers of Oregon and California, that a copy of the above be presented to the managers of the Oregon packing houses, asking their co-operation to bring about the desired results, and that they be asked to enlist the aid of the California growers and packers in this movement."
