

# EMPLOYERS' LIABILITY ACT IS VALID

Washington, March 14.—The interstate commerce commission has been advised of the decision of Judge Trieber, of the United States district court for the eastern district of Arkansas, sustaining the constitutionality of the employers' liability act. Judge Trieber agrees with Judge Hanford, of the western district of Washington, in holding that such enactment is within the powers of congress. Judges Evans and McCall recently denied that the law was constitutional.

It is announced that the president has taken steps to have the decisions of those judges reviewed by the supreme court.

# THOUGHT HE WAS TO GET MILLIONS

San Francisco, March 14.—Though he is heir to an estate valued at nearly \$2,000,000, Jesse Sheldon Lux Potter, grandson of the widow of Charles Lux, one of the founders of the firm of Miller & Lux, is a poor man. His attorneys, Peck and Boynton, assert that should the claim of the trustees of the estate be allowed young Potter will receive only \$1200 a year for nine years for his share of the Miller & Lux Company.

The story that Potter's attorneys tell reads like a chapter from Dickens' "Bleak House." Potter, a young man of 24, brought up with the notion that he was to inherit millions, finds out that he will receive only \$1200 a year. The sole surviving trustee of the estate of Miranda Lux, the widow of one of the founders of the big cattle firm, is Arrow N. Lewis.

When an accounting was demanded before Judge Seawall, Lewis declared that the gross income of the estate since it was turned over to the trustees in 1897 was \$194,906. Against this there are attorney's fees of \$81,215, and trustee's fees of \$79,437. This will leave a balance of about \$40,000, of which one-third belongs to young Potter.

By the terms of his grandmother's will Potter is to receive one-half of the estate when he is 30, and the rest when he is 40. Until then it is to remain in the care of the trustees. Potter is now 24. The indications are that little will be left at the end of the stipulated time.

# JAP LABORERS CANNOT ENTER UNITED STATES

Washington, March 14.—Complying with the provisions of the immigration act approved on February 20 last, the president today issued an executive order that such citizens of Japan, to-wit: Japanese or Korean laborers, skilled or unskilled, who have received passports to go to Mexico, Canada or Hawaii, and come therefrom, be refused permission to enter the continental territory of the United States.

# BAPTISTS MINISTER MAY BE MURDERER

Spokane, Wash., March 14.—Was the murderer of Reno Hutchinson, the Y. M. C. A. secretary killed here last fall, a short, dark man with a very nervous manner, who is now representing himself as a Baptist minister?  
This is the latest clue that the detectives here have received of the mystery. Several days ago the widow of the murdered man sent the local police several letters that had been written to her by some one now in Tennessee. The letters were signed variously, "Jno. J. Masten," "John K. Masten," and "Rev. Jno. J. Masten." The epistles were mailed at Harriman, Lansing and Mayland, Tenn.  
Mrs. Hutchinson states that her husband did not have an acquaintance named Masten. Suspicious circumstances connected with the letters themselves strengthen Mrs. Hutchinson's belief that the writer may know something of the murder. In writing the name of Reno Hutchinson she has first written the name "Robert" and "Rob." which has been erased. This is the name which a neighbor heard cried out about the time of the assassination.
