

# CALIFORNIA IS SWEEPED BY WIND AND RAIN

San Francisco, March 22.—Another storm of wind and heavy rains is causing the rivers in the interior valleys to rise again and the area of flooded districts is rapidly extending. The damage is enormous. Telegraph communication is almost entirely suspended over a greater part of the state, and many levees are expected to give way under the pressure of waters. The outlook in the valley sections is for more rain, but clearing weather may soon be expected.

No regular trains are running out of this city and none are expected to arrive either on the Southern Pa-

cific or Santa Fe today. A large number of overland passengers are stalled at Sacramento, and will be brought to this city by steamer. It is reported that there has been some loss of life in the Sacramento valley, but this is not confirmed.

**Mail Carriers Drowned.**  
Sacramento, March 23.—Two mail carriers, whose boat was overturned in the flood, were drowned. The levees are breaking in many places, and great damage is being done, and it is believed that the worst is yet to come. The city is in fine condition, with not a weak spot in any of the levees.

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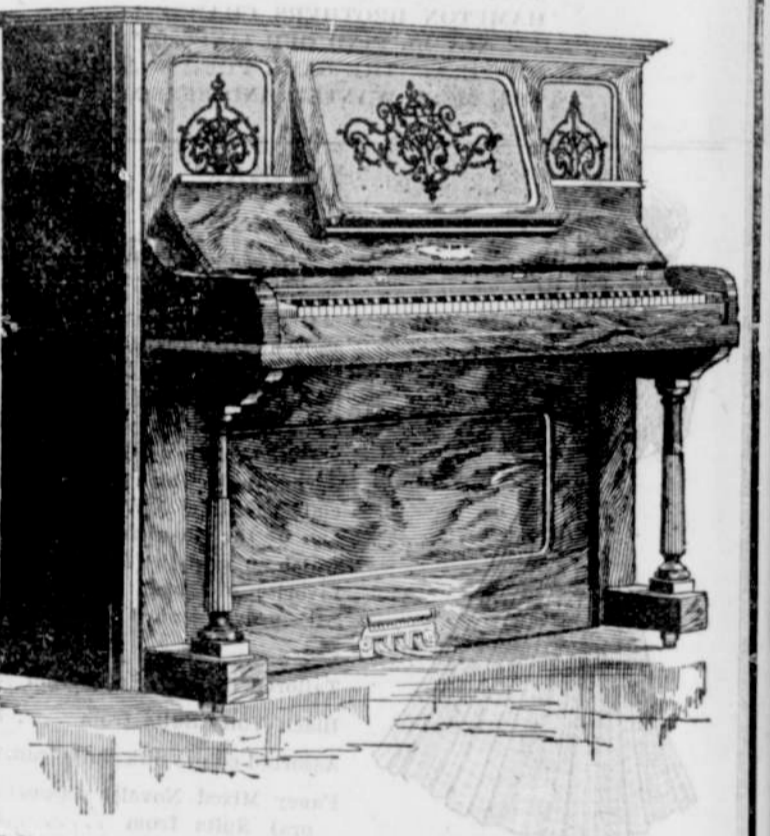
