Portland Market Report.

Portland, Or., March 28.—Beet sugar shows an advance of 10 cents per hundred pounds today, making the differential between that grade and the cane product 10 cents instead of 20 cents per hundred pounds, as heretofore. The reason for this is given as the greater demand for beet sugar. Of late on account of the materially lower prices the trade has taken more kindly to the beet product, and has not become acquainted with its quality. Therefore it does not reason now why it should pay higher values, even so small an amount as 20 cents per hundred pounds, to get the cane product when to all intents and purposes the beet is fully as good as the cane. The name beet, the only thing that has kept the trade from buying more heavily of this product previously.

Every year shows an increase in the production of beet sugar in the United States, and the year 1907 promises at this time to break all previous records. Beet sugar refiners, instead of becoming discouraged by the recently ruling low values, are much elated because it has created a larger demand for their product and they are now offering more encouragement than ever for farmers to grow the sugar beets.

Salt Prices Show Another Rise

This morning another rise was shown in salt values. California manufacturers quoting an advance of \$1 a ton on fine and 50 cents a ton on coarse grades in car lots. This means that the salt market has advanced \$1 per ton all around during the past four or five days. Less than carload prices are unchanged as yet.

but the trade expects an advance all along the line in the near future.

Country Produce.

Arrivals of poultry continue to be light and all receipts are picked up promptly at quoted prices. Light veal is in very good demand with light receipts. Block hogs are very scarce, the arrivals for the past week being lighter than at any previous time during the present year. Price remains unchanged.

The egg market shows an advance over the past few weeks and perhaps will continue to advance up to Easter, when it is expected there will be a slight break. Receipts for the last few days have been light, owing to the shippers holding for higher prices.

Brief Notes of the Trade.

Trading in hops remains with a fair volume at former values.

Asparagus is higher with inadequate supplies.

Potato market is very firm, but prices are nominal. For one car of fancy select—said to be the best in the state—two dealers bid against each other and offered as high as \$1.75, Portland. The general market for fancy is around \$1.60.

Onions are firmer with good stock hard to obtain and prices doing better.

Several cars of bananas arrived in this morning in good shape.

So scarce are supplies of creamery butter that city manufacturers camp daily along Front street to pick up any stray lots that might come.

Cheese market is in good shape, with supplies low today, but better stocks are expected tomorrow.

All dressed meats continue in better demand than supply at unchanged prices.

Wheat and flour remain firm, with a slight improvement in the demand from China.
