BRICK PLANT FOR COTTAGE GROVE

E. A. Gleason has bought of Alex Cooley ground upon which he will install a plant for the manufacture of brick. Mr. Gleason states that after thorough tests of the clay soil he is certain that he can supply the best of building brick and the ground acquired by him contains material enough to employ many men nine months each year for twenty years. Mr. Gleason is familiar with the manufacturing and handling of brick, and selected Cottage Grove as the most favorable location along the valley towns as a point from which to ship both ways as well as the prospects of a heavy demand for local building.

Mill Accident.

An accident occurred at the Chambers Lumber Company's mill above Dorana on Tuesday, in which Wm. Pierce, the victim, had a narrow escape from death, and as it is he will be laid up for some time to come. He was struck by a wild log that unexpectedly shot down the chute, catching his leg just above the ankle, crushing it so badly that the bones protruded. Dr. Job, who happened to be in the vicinity, was called and reduced the fracture, and made the young man as comfortable as possible, and thinks, although the wound is a serious one, that there is a good chance for recovery without resorting to amputation.—Leader.

FULTON WILLING TO STAY SENATOR

United States Senator C. W. Fulton will be a candidate for re-election in 1908, according to the statement made by him this morning at the Hotel Imperial, but by the same token he will make no strenuous campaign, will spend no money for advertising, and will not leave

his post of duty at Washington to come home and boom his own interests, says the Portland Journal. He will allow the Republican voters of the state to decide upon the ground of his record in the senate whether they wish him to represent them for another term and will make no effort to influence the result one way or the other.

"Yes," said the senator this morning at the Imperial when he was asked whether or not he intended to make an effort to succeed himself in office. "Yes, I intend to be a candidate whether or not he intended to enter the primary race, but I do not intend to make any canvass for the place. I do not intend to spend any money for advertising or campaigning or for postage. I do not intend to return to Oregon from Washington to plead my cause. Congress will be in session at that time and I will remain there to attend to the duties which I have been elected to perform."

"My record in the senate stands where any one who wishes can read," continued the senator. "Any person who has any interest in the matter already knows what I have done and what I tried to do for the state. If in the opinion of these people, then, they conclude that I on my record merit another term in the senate I will be grateful for their support. If not I will return to the practice of my profession and to private life."

"I have not the money to make an extended campaign for re-election. Besides, I would be compelled to leave Washington in the middle of a session of congress should I return for the campaign. I have determined, therefore, to place my name before the people and allow them to judge without any attempt to influence them by a personal campaign."

WOMAN UNDER ARREST FOR GRAND LARCENY

Mrs. Annie James, formerly of Creswell, is in the custody of the officers here, charged with grand larceny. She was arrested in Portland Saturday evening by the officers there on a telegraphic warrant sent from Justice of the Peace Bryson's court in this city. She was taken to police headquarters in the metropolis, where she spent the night in custody of the matron of the city jail. Constable Plank went down to Portland on the early train Sunday morning and brought the woman to Eugene on the local last night.

Mrs. James is charged with being connected with the larceny of a check for \$240, for which a warrant for the arrest of Bert Kelsay, a young man of this city, has been issued. Guard readers will remember that a week or two ago John Funnell, a resident of Creswell, missed the check, which was drawn on a Cottage Grove bank. When he went to the bank to stop payment on the check he found that it had already been cashed by young Kelsay, and a warrant was at once issued for his arrest, but he could not be found. It developed later that Mrs. James, who was working at the Funnell residence, admitted to some one that she stole the check and gave it to Kelsay.

ELI BANGS PURCHASES HENDERSON PROPERTY

Eli Bangs, the pioneer Eugene liveyman who has been residing in Eastern Oregon for the past several months, has purchased the residence property belonging to the Henderson estate at the corner of East Eighth and Pearl streets. He is now on his way here with a car load of horses, and it is probable that he will go into the horse dealing business, erecting a stable on the rear portion of the lot he has just purchased. The price paid for the property is not given out.

WILL IMPROVE FOLEY SPRINGS SUMMER RESORT

A. A. Haflinger, of Foley Springs summer resort is in the city, having arrived up from Portland on the local last night in company with Mrs. Haflinger. They are on the way to the springs, expecting to leave for there Saturday or Sunday or as soon as the weather gets better. Mr. Haflinger told a Guard reporter today of a number of improvements which they expect to make at the resort this summer. If it is possible to get the lumber in time a double-deck veranda will be built onto the front of the hotel. This improvement has been in contemplation since last summer, but heretofore it has been impossible to secure the lumber, the sawmill at Blue River being away behind with orders, and it would be too expensive to haul the lumber from the valley. Mr. Haflinger thinks he can get the lumber before the coming season is over, as a mill is to be erected at McKenzie Bridge and will be in operation within a few weeks.

An improvement that has long been in contemplation and will be made this year, if possible, is the piping of the hot water of the springs to the hotel, the office and the cottages for heating purposes. The early mornings and the evenings in that altitude are quite cold, even in the summer time, and the pleasure seekers hover close around the fires.

Mr. Haflinger has disposed of his restaurant business in Portland, and intends hereafter to make Foley Springs his permanent home. During the next few years other improvements not mentioned here will be made at the resort, and by the time the electric line up the McKenzie is completed they will be in shape to care for the much larger patronage they are bound to enjoy with the advent of the railway.

REFERENDUM AGAINST MONEY FOR ARMORIES

The Patrons of Husbandry of Oregon will submit the compulsory pass law and the \$100,000 appropriation for the establishment of eight armories in different towns in Oregon to a referendum vote. The annual appropriation of \$125,000 for the State University will not be submitted to the referendum; that matter will be held for future consideration in the form of an initiative in connection with the normal schools.

This decision was reached at a session of the executive committee of the state grange held yesterday at the rooms of Mrs. H. C. Waldo, the state grange lecturer, in the Sargent Hotel, Portland. State Master A. T. Buxton, B. J. Leedy and S. C. Spence compose the executive committee, and all were present to consider the matter of submitting the compulsory pass law and the armory appropriation

to the referendum. Delegates were present from Linn county to urge that the referendum be invoked upon the university appropriation, and a number of grangers attended in the capacity of an advisory committee, but the university had strong supporters, also.

W. S. U'Ren, father of the initiative and referendum system in Oregon, has a letter in today's Oregonian defending the university appropriation.

MISS BELLE VANDUYN WILL GO TO JAMESTOWN

Miss Belle VanDuyn, of this city, has been chosen as the Lane county representative in a company of young ladies who will be sent to the Jamestown exposition from McMinnville, the scheme being originated by Colonel J. C. Cooper.

The company will assemble at McMinnville about the 8th of July for a month's drill and training, which will consist of physical and military drill and manual of arms so far as the same may be exemplified with their six-foot spears, Indian dances and chants in rich Indian costume, fire and ghost dances at night around and through a blaze of colored fire. Several excellent musicians have enlisted and an orchestra will be organized to accompany the solos and recitations; the choruses and musical numbers will be a big feature of the program. Many of the girls are good riders, and where opportunity offers will show their ability to handle a horse and throw a lasso as their brothers do on the plains of Eastern Oregon.

On all occasions when not in their Indian drill the girls may be distinguished by their uniform dress and cowboy hat with "Oregon" printed in gold on a red leather band. Their drill costume will consist of light buckskin-colored broadcloth, or cravatette, richly trimmed with beads and buckskin fringe, with a beaver head design stitched on the pocket.

The city of McMinnville will entertain the girls free during their month's training and contribute liberally toward the expense of the enterprise. The company will start East early in August and will be absent from the state six or eight weeks, if the present program is carried out. The company will create great enthusiasm wherever they go.

FIRE NARROWLY AVERTED AT SPRINGFIELD

Shortly after 8 o'clock Tuesday morning smoke was discovered upstairs in the Nickerson building, and a hurried examination by Mrs. Nickerson and daughter, Mabel, showed that the building was on fire near the chimney. An alarm was at once given and the neighbors all responded to the call and succeeded in putting out the blaze before it had gained much headway. Had it been discovered a few minutes later it is almost certain that the building could not have been saved.

Change of Managers.

E. L. Strange, manager of the Wilamette Valley Company's electric plant at Springfield, received word from the head office that his resignation had been accepted and he informs us that he expects to start for Corvallis Saturday, where he will reside permanently.
