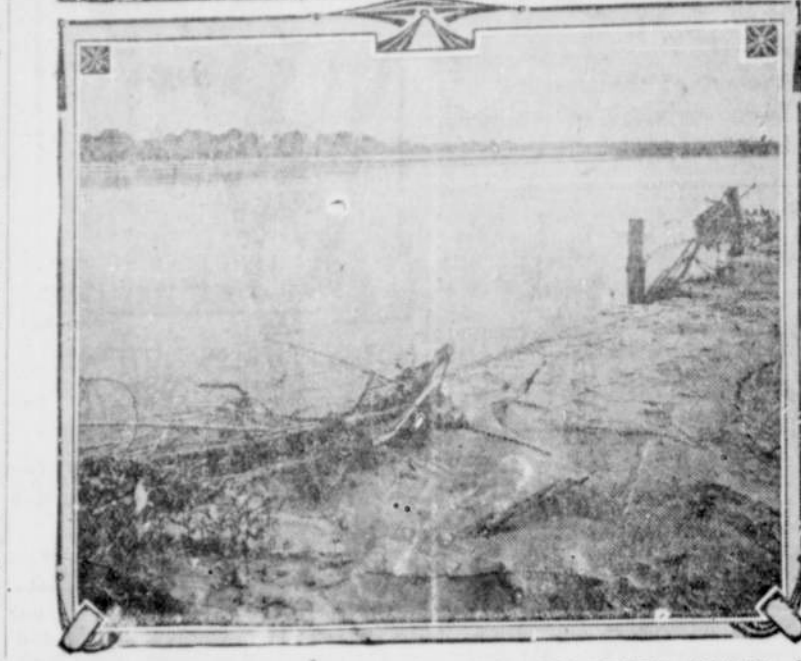
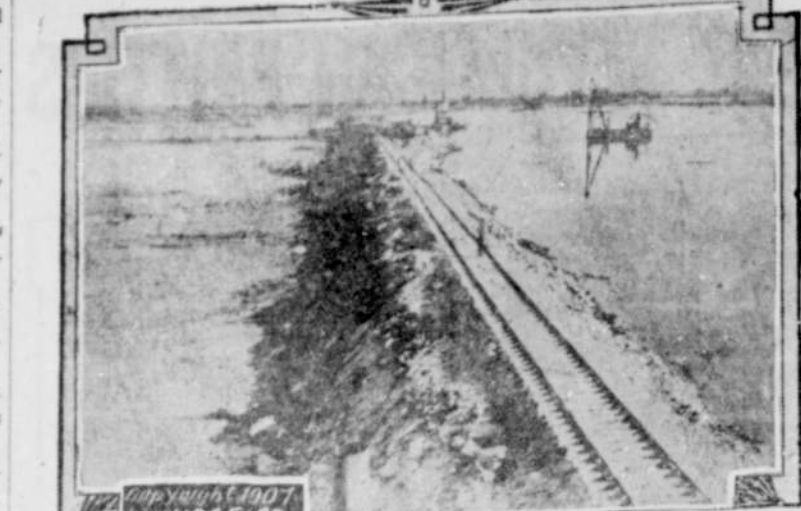

REHABILITATION OF SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, April 18.—One year ago today San Francisco was all but wiped out of existence by a fire succeeding the terrific earthquake shock. Nearly a quarter of a million people were rendered homeless, and the financial loss amounted to \$400,000,000. The city was left a mass of smoking ruins and rehabilitation seemed a matter of many years.

Today the sun rose on a cloudless sky over a busy metropolis in which the volume of business more than equals that of a year ago, and whose population is fast approaching its former figure. Such a record is said to be without parallel.

During the year \$75,000,000 has been expended in the work of reconstruction, one-third of which has been furnished by the savings bank, which, in common with all financial institutions, withstood the disaster without a sign of weakness. Over \$30,000,000 has been paid out for labor and fifty thousand men are now engaged in the rebuilding industry, while before the fire only twenty thousand were at work. Temperate construction has ceased, and permits for first-class fire-proof structures to cost over \$50,000,000 have been granted. The restoration of old buildings which survived the flames will require the expenditure of many millions more.

About two hundred miles of street railways rendered useless, are now in running order.

The bank clearings for March exceeded by \$2,500,000 the figures of the same month last year, just preceding the catastrophe.

In recognition and celebration of what has been done, services were held today in the various churches and while not a legal holiday was observed, the city was suspended. To night the Merchants' Association, a prominent factor in the labor of reconstruction, will fittingly commemorate the uprising of the new San Francisco by a banquet in the splendid new Fairmount hotel, many prominent citizens being among the invited guests.

GEO. A. DORRIS SHIPS ASPARAGUS TO PORTLAND

Former Eugene Politician and Labor Making a Success of Farming Has 16 Acres of Asparagus.

Geo. A. Dorris, who withdrew from politics and the practice of law a few years ago and is devoting himself to the pursuits of agriculture and horticulture, has one of the best fruit farms in Oregon on the north bank of the Willamette river about four miles above Eugene and just above the city of Portland. It is one of the most productive hop fields in Oregon, a fine orchard of various kinds of fruit, an English walnut orchard, and he has recently planted 16 acres in asparagus. He sends most of his asparagus to Portland, and sells it for 15 cents a pound. It is a fine quality than any we have seen in the grocery stores in Eugene this season. He brings \$15 worth at a time to the buggies to Eugene and sends it to Portland. It is one of the most profitable crops raised in Oregon, and there is an almost unlimited demand for it at good prices. From his Dorris fruit, nuts and asparagus Mr. Dorris will soon have a large income, much larger than any lawyer in this part of Oregon.—State Journal.
