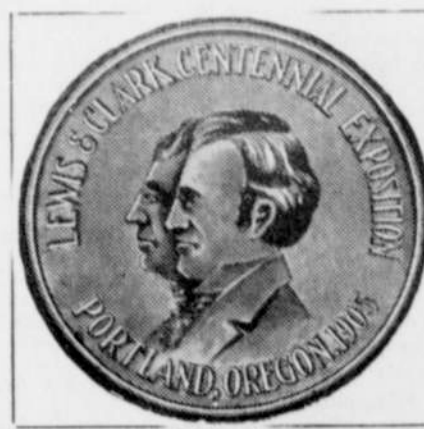

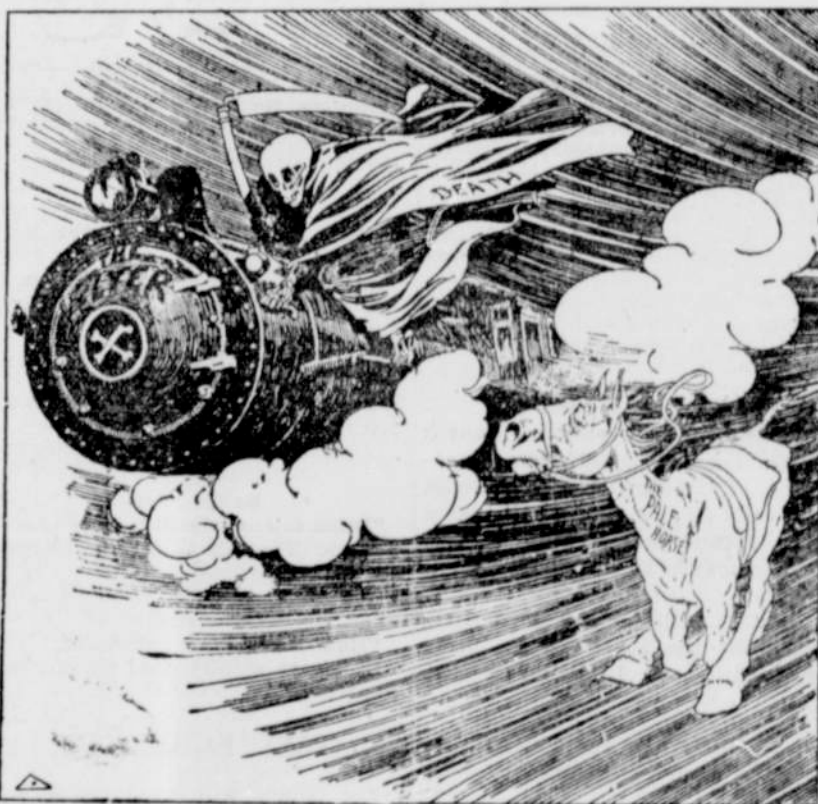

Providence, R. I., April 20.—Chief Yeoman Fred J. Buenzle, who was barred from a dance hall in Newport because, as he claims, he was wearing the uniform of the United States navy, can recover at law only the price of his admission ticket, according to a decision handed down by William H. Sweetland, chief presiding officer of the Rhode Island supreme court.

MANILA SWEEP BY GREAT FIRE SATURDAY

Manila, April 20.—Fire destroyed 1100 houses in the districts of Singalong, Paco and Bumbank in Manila this afternoon. The new American settlements at Ermita and Maleta escaped through the hard work of the firemen, citizens and soldiers. The flames were fanned by a heavy gale and swept one hundred acres clean. No casualties are reported. The damage is \$200,000 in gold.
