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## PARASITE BEES! TO FIGHT GREEN BUGS IN KANSAS

Lawrence, Kansas, May 14.—Professor F. S. Hunter, of the State University, who for several months past has been sending free to the farmers of the Southwest parasite bees to kill the green bugs that are destroying the wheat, has received a telegram from Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, asking for full particulars. Professor Hunter replied that he had distributed 2000 boxes of parasites to Kansas farmers, with uniform good results, but that a larger fund was necessary in order to make the work comprehensive and decisive. A report was current last night that in Central Kansas the green bugs had attacked the newly sprouted corn.

## UNEARLY PLOT TO KILL HARRY ORCHARD IN BOISE

LeWiston, May 14.—It is stated that last winter detectives unearthed a plot to shoot Harry Orchard down at Boise as he exercised within the walls that surround the penitentiary. According to the story, which comes from a source so reliable that it might be termed official, men supposed to have been in the employ of the re-education, or friends of that body, had secured a position which overlooked the walls of the penitentiary. The distance was so great that spyglasses had to be used to watch what was going on within the walls, learn the habits of the guards and prisoners and ascertain just what hours of the morning or afternoon Orchard was in the habit of taking his customary out-of-door practice.

The position selected by those suspected of desiring to kill Orchard was such that they could shoot and kill the man with ease. The distance was not so far but that a rifle could probably sufficiently far to prevent the report of the gun being heard within the walls of the penitentiary. It was probably hoped that when the time was propitious Orchard would be shot, would drop in his tracks and no one would know from which direction the bullet came.

The afternoon was occupied with the discussion of matters pertaining to the work of the order and the election of three representatives to the head camp session to be held at Seattle in July.

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## O. A. C. DEFEATED VISITING TEAM IN TRACK MEET

Corvallis, Or., May 13.—The Washington State College track team was defeated here this afternoon by the Oregon Agricultural men by a score of 64 1/2 to 52 1/2. It was a closely contested meet, with the result undetermined and interest at high pitch until the end of the last event.  
Two college records were broken. In an exhibition hammer throw, after winning that event, Hall, O. A. C., beat the state record, tossing the weight 134 feet 6 inches. Wolf, the Portland freshman, broke the college record by putting the shot 41 feet, and Hall broke the college hammer record in his official throw of 133 feet 1 inch.

One of the surprises of the day was the defeat of DeVolt, the hitherto undefeated mile man of the O. A. C., who was bested both in the half and the mile. In the half he was beaten only two feet, but in the mile he was shut out of a place, due to poor condition and his strength run out in the half, which was run under 2:02.

## GOULD'S WESTERN PACIFIC HEADED THIS WAY

Mark T. Fleming, a Eugene capitalist, has just returned from a trip of several weeks through southeastern Oregon and northern Nevada. While in that country he made a small investment in land. He thinks that country is a comer, and when irrigation is established there he says it will be the richest section of the Pacific Coast.  
Mr. Fleming says that while he was at Winnemucca, Nevada, several hundred laborers and 125 or 150 head of horses and mules were unloaded there for construction work on Gould's Western Pacific railroad from that point north into Oregon. He says the men in charge of the work told him that the road is headed for Portland and that it is coming via the Willamette or McKenzie pass over the Cascade mountains, which means that it will be built through Eugene. Gould surveys have been in the Cascade mountains and southeastern Oregon for several years past and it is said have a good route picked out for the Western Pacific.  
The Guard from time to time has given publicity to reports that the Western Pacific will build through Eugene to Portland, and it is to be hoped that the present activity in Northern Nevada means that the reports were not all "hot air."

**Flocking Into Harney.**  
Mr. Fleming told the reporter that thousands of people from all over the United States are now flocking into Harney county and taking up homesteads with the prospect of the establishment of irrigation systems in that country. At present the most of the land is barren and worthless, but just as finest in it is irrigated it will be the finest in the world.
