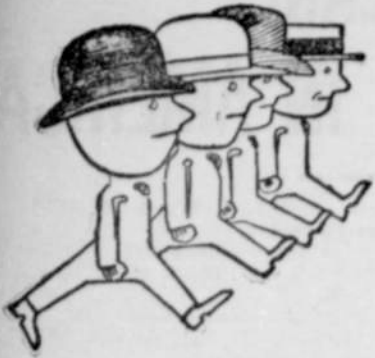

CAPTAIN BEN
D. BOSWELL
IS DEAD

Drain, Or., May 20.—Captain Benjamin D. Boswell died at 4 o'clock yesterday morning at his home at Boswell Springs, two miles south of Drain. He was born in Indiana September 29, 1837. He was appointed captain in the army from Iowa and served with distinction throughout the civil war. He drew a pension of \$160 per month and was retired on April 23, 1904 on account of the age limit. The burial will take place at 5 p. m. today at Boswell Springs. The body will be removed later to the National cemetery at Presidio, Cal. The captain leaves an aged widow only.

Captain Boswell was well-known in Eugene, where he had hosts of friends. Hundreds of people of this city have enjoyed his hospitality at the hotel at Boswell Springs which he conducted for many years.

MRS. MACPHERSON TELLS
STORY OF CRUELTY

Wants Divorce From Her Husband, Walter MacPherson, and \$35 a Month Alimony, Besides \$100 Attorney's Fees and \$25 Costs.

Today in the circuit court Mrs. Bertha MacPherson filed a petition for a divorce against her husband, Walter MacPherson, who, her allegations are true, takes the bun for cruelty. They were married in Portland on September 11, 1902, and have the following minor children: Floyd Alexander, aged three years and nine months; Robert Calvin, aged two years; and Leonard O'Neill, who was born on March 30, 1907.

Mrs. MacPherson alleges that her husband, ever since their marriage, has spent his earnings in drink and has been intoxicated a greater part of the time. She says that at different times he has called her vile and indecent names, has threatened to kill her; that before her last child was born he heaped abuse upon her, and the child since its birth has been in a delicate state of health as a result of such treatment; that after the birth of the second child the defendant slapped it, causing blue finger prints to remain on its face for a long time, and that he threw a cup at one of the children, cutting a big gash on its forehead.

These and various other alleged acts of cruelty are recited to show that the plaintiff is entitled to the divorce and the custody of the children, \$35 a month alimony, \$100 attorney's fees and \$25 for the costs of the suit. Frank Schlegel is the attorney for Mrs. MacPherson.

POHEIM TELLS STORY THAT WILL CONVICT SCHMITZ

San Francisco, May 17.—Dr. Joseph Poheim, former police commissioner, in a remarkable confession details Mayor Schmitz's action compelling him to vote the French restaurant licenses in order that Ruef might extort thousands of dollars in fees.

Detective Burns relies on Dr. Poheim's confession to convict Mayor Schmitz on the five charges of extortion upon which he was jointly indicted with Ruef.

Has Schmitz Abducted?
The statement that Mayor Schmitz has assigned in writing his official powers to a committee of seven citizens is not generally credited. The fact that such a committee held a conference yesterday with Rudolph Spreckels and Francis J. Heney probably gave rise to the rumor.

Detective Burns says he expects Schmitz to confess, but the mayor has given no indication of it if such is his plan of conduct. He declines to see any one except his attorneys, and in appointing a citizens' committee of fifty a few days ago the mayor said he would be guided by their advice in matters of municipal interest.

There seems to be a general demand for the removal of Chief of Police Dinan, whom Governor Gillett has declared incompetent to direct the police department.

Officials Not Worried.
President Calhoun, Tiley L. Ford and Thornwall Mulally, of the United Railroads Company, are apparently but little disturbed by Ruef's charge that they paid \$200,000 for trolley franchises. They simply deny they paid the money and are devoting all their attention to breaking the street car strike.

Ruef, now that he has confessed, is improving in health and spirits. His former associates do not believe that he has confessed, but is working a clever scheme to clear his own skirts.

Schmitz Will Not Talk.
Mayor Schmitz declined to see any one today in relation to the confession of Abraham Ruef that he had given the mayor \$50,000 as his share of the money alleged to have been paid by the United Railroads Company to secure trolley franchises.

From Special Agent Burns it is learned that the only matter on which Ruef was questioned before the grand jury yesterday was the alleged bribing of Mayor Schmitz and 18 supervisors by the United Railroads to grant that corporation permission to electrify its 250 miles of street railway system.

If Burns' understanding of Ruef's testimony is correct the fallen boss told the grand jury that President Calhoun, Assistant President Mulally, Chief Counsel Ford and Assistant Counsel Abbott of the United Railroads paid or caused to be paid the sum of \$200,000 for the privileges named; that \$61,000 of this amount was Ruef's "fee"; that \$50,000 went to Schmitz, and the remaining \$89,000 was handed to the 18 supervisors, 16 of whom received \$4,000 each and another \$10,000, and Chairman Gallagher, of the finance committee, \$15,000.

ORCHARD INTERVIEW CAUSE OF TROUBLE

Boise, May 17.—With the opening of the Haywood trial today Judge Wood directed that the prosecuting attorney of Ada county to investigate the circumstances under which Harry Orchard was interviewed for publication yesterday, with a view to ascertaining if there has been any attempt to influence jurors in the case, and to take such steps as he found the circumstances warrant. In drawing attention to the matter Judge Wood asked the counsel if they could offer any suggestions as to the duty of the court, and Attorney Richardson vigorously denounced the incident as a deliberate attempt to influence prospective jurors and suggested that the disclosure of prejudice against Harry Orchard and his testimony was inspired by Governor Gooding. Attorney Darrow took the same ground and suggested Gooding be cited for contempt. Both Richardson and Darrow protested that the

publication of the Orchard interviews had grievously injured the defense. They also drew attention to the widespread newspaper campaign in behalf of the prosecution.

Mr. Hawley, leading counsel for the state, deplored the incident but maintained that it will injure the prosecution more than it will the defense. He drew attention also to the widespread newspaper campaign in behalf of the defense and the misstatements circulated about Orchard and said he could see no harm in permitting newspapermen to interview Orchard on general lines.

Senator Borah said he could dispose of the misapprehension of counsel for the defense that the interview was part of a plan to give credence to Orchard's story because an effort on the part of the newspapermen to see Orchard had been in progress for three weeks. He spiritedly defended Gooding and the newspapermen on the charge that they had tried to influence the jury.

The trial was interrupted for an hour, prospective jurors and talesmen being excluded from the room during the discussion.

George Gribble was peremptorily challenged by the defense today, after he had been passed by both sides.

Boise, May 16.—Harry Orchard, the prisoner-witness upon whom the state of Idaho chiefly relies to prove its charges that the inner circle of the Western Federation of Miners planned the conspiracy for the murder of Governor Steunenberg, broke his long silence today and for more than half an hour discussed himself and his imprisonment with the representative of the Associated Press whom he had expressed a desire to see.

Orchard said he had not been given any mistreatment during his confinement, denied that any force had been used to secure the statements made by him, and denied that Detective McParland and officers of the state have promised him immunity for his confession of crime, or a reward for his alleged confession.

Orchard's manner and conversation during the interview tended strongly to confirm the assertion he had been converted to and is deep in the seal of the Christian religion. Two illustrations used by him to explain the kind of books he reads were Christian-like in character and religious in tone.

Orchard is perfectly sound and healthy in body, clear and quick of brain. If there was anything in the reports that he was breaking down in health and mind there is nothing now in his appearance or manner to give them a shadow of the truth.

CLAIMS LOVELACE SECURED LAND THROUGH FRAUD

John Hostettler Bought Right to Sell Patent Trap Gun and Now Claims It Was Fraudulent Transaction.

John Hostettler, a German residing in this city, has begun suit in the circuit court against Charles D. Lovelace to set aside the deed to a certain 21-acre tract of land in township 20, s. r. 3 w., which the plaintiff deeded to the defendant in consideration for the right to sell in Lane county a certain trap gun. Hostettler alleges that he agreed to buy the right to sell the gun in exchange for the land in question on May 14, 1907, and gave Lovelace a deed to the land, but afterward discovered that Lovelace did not own the patent and that the land was obtained through fraud and misrepresentation. He prays the court to set aside the deed on such grounds. Williams & Bean are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

NOTHING SHORT OF ABSOLUTE HOME RULE

Dublin, May 21.—The Nationalist convention, called to decide whether the government Irish bill introduced in the house May 7 is acceptable to the people of Ireland, met in the historic mansion house at noon. The advance resolutions prepared will probably be adopted, condemning any measure short of absolute self-government.

POSTAL ROBBER GETS LONG TERM

Portland, May 16.—Frank Wayne, the postoffice robber, was sentenced to nine years at hard labor at McNell's Island, and William Carter, another member of the gang, to ten months' imprisonment.

CLAIM MOVER'S IDENTITY FULLY ESTABLISHED

Boise, May 20.—So vigorous have been the denials of Charles H. Moyer that he was sent to the Joliet penitentiary for burglary from Chicago in 1887 that counsel for the prosecution this morning showed several newspaper reporters documentary evidence in their possession. In addition to the facts already published in the newspapers the documents include a certified copy of the marriage certificate filed by Moyer at the time he was married, two months after leaving the penitentiary. The woman the Joliet convict wedded is positively known, according to the prosecution, to be the woman the president of the Western Federation acknowledges as his wife.

RECORD OF HARRY ORCHARD'S PAST LIFE
Boise, May 20.—When Harry Orchard takes the witness stand for the prosecution in the Haywood case, the defense will confront him with what purports to be a record of his life from the cradle to the Idaho penitentiary. Ever since he made the confession after the murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg, implicating the officials of the Western Federation of Miners, it is said, Mooney's Detective Agency, of Chicago, has been trying to discover the identity of the assassin, and its efforts are reported to have been crowned with success.

According to E. F. Richardson, of counsel for the defense, the real name of the man using the alias of Harry Orchard and Thomas Hogan is Harry Moore. He was born in Canada, and about 15 years ago went to Syracuse, N. Y., with his parents, who are believed to be living there now. Later Harry, so it is said, went to a small town near Port Huron, Mich., and worked in a cheese factory.

While in Michigan, it is alleged, Moore, alias Orchard, alias Hogan, became a member of the Maximalist lodge of Detroit and his name still appears on the records of the fraternity as Harry Moore. Up to this time his life is said to have been exemplary.

When he came to the Western mining camp Moore is alleged to have assumed the name of Orchard and gradually to have become a reckless and dissolute character, finally disregarding early precepts and fraternal obligations, and joining the ranks of active criminals.

His parents are admitted to be not only respectable but of a religious nature, especially his mother. Orchard in an interview with newspaper men Thursday gave Canada as his birthplace, and said his mother is a devout Christian. Detectives in the employ

of the defense are now trying to find the parents.
"Of course I did not like him. That was only natural. And I liked him less for looking so well fed and well dressed, and shining and sleek and self-satisfied. I think I rather resented all that."

"He was a self-confessed assassin; he had done a brave and honorable gentlemanly deed to death; he ought to have been hung out of hand and long ago."

"And it is one of the distinct weaknesses of the prosecution that it depends for its success upon the evidence of an assassin, who should be dead and done with. And the fact that Orchard, instead of being held as a criminal in duress, was so well dressed and such an honored guest, struck me as incongruous."

"I have no friendship at all for Moyer or Haywood or Pettibone, but I confess to liking Orchard a great deal less. And I am no party to his conversation. And I do not think his conversion material to this murder trial. And God only knows when this murder trial will begin. No body else does."
