TRACK MEET

77 TO 45

The University of Oregon track team won from the O. A. C. track squad yesterday at Corvallis by the score of 77 to 45. In a number of events Oregon did not do herself justice or the score would have been larger than when Pullman met us. At the meet two Northwest records were smashed. Gordon Moores broke the record in the 220-yard dash in 25.2 seconds and Zacharias, the giant junior, took first place in the hammer throw with the great hurl of 151 feet 1 1/2 inches. Hug also threw the hammer 150 feet 8 inches. McKinney did not qualify in either the hammer or discus, and O. A. C. took third in the hammer and second in the discus.

In the half mile and quarter Oregon entered just one man, and the Agries, by clever boxing, kept Dodson and Reid from forging ahead, though they got seconds in spite of the clever work. Moores did not go into the 100-yard dash and Schroeder, the O. A. C. sprinter, beat Kiltz out for third. Moulton only got second in the pole vault, Swan going 11 feet, which is more than Fred can do in his present condition.

BETTER MAIL

SERVICE FOR

SPRINGFIELD

Postmaster Roberts authorized the News to state that he as at last received word that a mail route would be established between the Junction and Springfield, which will go into effect Monday, May 27. Heretofore the mail from both the south and north has been put off at Eugene, taken to the postoffice to sort, and then hauled by stage to Springfield. Under the new rule the mail will be pouched, and delivered to the Junction, giving from an hour to an hour and a half quicker delivery. The afternoon mail from Portland, for example, which usually arrives at Springfield at 4 o'clock, will now arrive at not later than 2:30 p. m. Then the outgoing mail will also give more time, for mail that now leaves for Portland at 10:15 a. m. will be held till about 11:30.

Will Soon Operate.

The Springfield sash and door factory will soon be ready to start the wheels rolling. We are informed that the machinery has all arrived, and is being placed in position, and that the only thing that now detains the operators is the electric motor which has not yet arrived but is expected on every train. It is understood that the factory will be ready for operation some time next week, and that several orders are now waiting.

Change in Pastors.

Rev. D. J. Goode, who has been pastor of the Free Methodist church at Springfield Junction during the past year, will go to Salem to take charge of the parish at that place for the coming year and Rev. F. I. Harrington will fill the place made vacant by Mr. Goode. Rev. H. J. Baker, who has held the appointments at Donna, Marcola and Parsons Creek, will go to Falls City.

EUGENE MEN WILL

ERECT MARCOLA HOTEL

The bids for the erection of C. Cole's three-story frame hotel at Marcola were opened at the office of the architect, John Hunzicker, in this city last evening. There were only two bidders, Carlson & Mumme, of Eugene, and John R. Chezem, of Springfield, although more were expected. The Eugene men were the lowest bidders, the figure being \$3,255, and they were awarded the contract. Mr. Chezem's bid was \$3300. The work of erecting the building will at once begin and it will be completed some time during the summer. Mr. Cole was in the city yesterday and was present when the bids were opened.
