WILLIAM WILLS HAS SOME FINE STRAWBERRIES

Raises Mammoths and Magoons on His Place Southwest of the City to Perfection—Markets Them in Eugene.

No finer strawberries have ever been grown in the most favored spots in Oregon than those grown by William Wills on his place southwest of the city, in the Bailey Hill neighborhood. Mr. Wills has a small patch of these berries which he is marketing in Eugene, W. A. Bell, successor to C. D. Combs & Co., handling them here in the city. He is an enthusiastic grower of the finer varieties of this delicious fruit. The two principal varieties grown by him are the Mammoth and the Magoon. Owing to the superior size of the berries each box contains only about 25 or 30 of the berries, which are hard to beat for flavor and are perfect in size and appearance.

Mr. Wills has a clearing in the hills surrounded by timber which keeps the frost off the fruit and shelters it from the winds, thereby insuring an excellent crop each year. This is the first year that his vines have borne.

**FURNITURE TRUST HAS BEEN SMASHED**

The furniture trust is bursted. In a set of resolutions passed by the Northwest Furniture Exchange, the members agreed to dissolve and terminate their relationship, and to that effect sixteen wholesalers and manufacturers, together with four retailers, appeared before Judge Wolvertson in the United States district court this morning, pleaded guilty and were fined \$25 and costs.

This is considered a great victory for the government, because it is believed that the wedge has been inserted that will make all of the defendants capitulate and enter pleas of guilty. Immediately after court a rumor was spread that the Oregon Retail Furniture Dealers' Association, the state association of retailers, had dissolved. This report could not be verified, but those who are on the inside say that such action will be taken either formally or by a general exodus of the members from the association.—Oregon Journal.

**MRS. GRIFFIN DIES AT AGE OF NINETY-FOUR**

Mother of Late G. P. Griffin Passes Away at Midnight After Long Illness — Funeral Held This Afternoon at 3 O'Clock.

Mrs. Elizabeth Griffin, grandmother of Drew and G. W. Griffin, died at the home of the latter, 498 Lawrence street, at 12 o'clock last night at the age of 94 years, 7 months and 13 days, after an illness of several years' duration. She had been an invalid for the past thirty years or more and had not been up from her bed for many months. The funeral was held at the residence this afternoon at 3 o'clock, and the remains interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mrs. Griffin was the daughter of William and Charity Skinner Potter, of English descent. She was born in the town of Middlefield, Otsego county, N. Y., October 29, 1812. In infancy her parents moved to Willink, Erie county, N. Y. On February 2, 1832, she was married to James Griffin, of Hamburg, Erie county, N. Y., where they lived until his death, April 12, 1868. After that Mrs. Griffin made her home with her son, Gilbert Potter Griffin, who came to Oregon in 1888. After his death in 1897 she lived with his widow in Eugene. She had seven children.

Mrs. Griffin retained her faculties till the last and seemed as bright as she ever did until a few moments before death came. She had a remarkable memory, and could recall events in her early childhood days as vividly as could any one many years younger. She was a member of the Methodist church and lived a beautiful Christian life.

**DOUBLING CAPACITY OF HURD SAWMILL**

Florence, June 10.—The Hurd Lumber and Navigation Company has a large force of men at work enlarging the capacity of its mill at this place. When finished the mill will have double its present capacity. This improvement has been made necessary owing to the increased demand for lumber in the past year.

The companies operating mills at Florence have experienced a great deal of trouble the past season in shipping their lumber, owing to the shoal condition of the bar at the mouth of the Siuslaw river. At present there are several thousand feet of lumber on the docks awaiting shipment on this account. Several vessels are bar bound there now. The timber values around Florence have doubled in the past year, and at the present prices Eastern firms are buying quite extensively in this district.
