TWO MAYORS SEEK TO RULE SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Jun 18.—The city of San Francisco appears to have two mayors today. One, Eugene E. Schmitz, occupied a suite in the city and county jail and offered to attend to all municipal matters there. The other, James L. Gallagher, president pro tempore of the board of supervisors, and by vote of that body created acting mayor, proposes to perform the duties of his new office. Schmitz refuses to recognize the official existence of Gallagher and to that end has instructed Police Sergeant Peter Fanning to use force if necessary to prevent Gallagher from taking possession of the mayor's office. The district attorney says the possession of the mayor's office is not necessary to the conduct of the office itself, and legal developments are expected. Gallagher made no effort to get possession of the mayor's office up to two o'clock, but made a statement to the effect that he would perform the duties of mayor whether he gets into the building or not, and that possession of the office may be obtained

by threatening the owner with a revocation of his lease.

SCHMITZ ALLOWED TO VISIT ATTORNEYS

San Francisco, June 18.—Mayor Schmitz was given permission by Judge Lawlor this morning to make another visit to the offices of his attorneys, but failed in an effort to have the court extend the scope of his absence from the county jail, so as to permit him to attend to other private business.

BISHOP PROPOSES HOME FOR GIRLS IN EUGENE

Bishop Seadding, in his address at the nineteenth annual convention of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon, at Portland, yesterday, declared that Oregon became a diocese too soon, and that it embraces entirely too large a territory. He recommended that the fault be remedied by cutting off all the territory in the state lying east of the Cascade mountains, at the next general convention of the church which will meet in Richmond, Va., in 1908. The bishop also urged the imperative need of a quiet home for girls, at Eugene, under the supervision of a house mother. He proposed that a cottage be rented temporarily, and that a home be built later, to be known as the Mary E. Rodney Memorial Home. Crane & Bushnell today sold the Bushnell ranch west of the city to V. S. Camp, of Hood River. The consideration is not given out for publication. Joseph Bowlsby, mentioned in the Guard's Associated Press dispatch yesterday as killing Cleve Jennings at Astoria, formerly lived in Eugene and is a brother of Bob Bowlsby, of this city. Paul Paschelle, a native of Switzerland, took out his final United States citizenship papers today and Neils Peter Jensen, a native of Denmark, filed his declaration of intention to become a citizen of Uncle Sam's domain.

CLEAN SHEEP NEED NOT BE DIPPED

Judge Charles E. Wolverton issued a temporary restraining order this afternoon against the Oregon sheep commission for requiring members of the Wenaha Sheepgrowers' Association of Washington to dip their sheep or from quarantining them after entering the state on their way to the Wenaha forest reserve for summer pasturage. This is in the nature of a compromise verdict, for Judge Wolverton made the ruling on the showing made in the present cases instituted by the Washington sheepmen and did not rule against the state law requiring dipping and quarantining where a careful inspection would show the sheep infected with disease. In other words, Washington sheep will have to be handled exactly as Oregon sheep. It is probable that Attorneys Bryson and Cain, of Walla Walla, representing the Washington sheepmen, will move to make the injunction permanent on the ground that an answer was filed to the complaint. The suit will probably be appealed and carried to the supreme court.—Portland Journal.

O. A. C. FOOTBALL SCHEDULE ARRANGED

The O. A. C. football prospects for the coming season are very favorable. A schedule of about eight games has been arranged by Max Greenhaw, including a Thanksgiving trip to Los Angeles. F. C. Norcross will be in Corvallis by the opening of the term in September, and will take charge of the squad. He will be assisted by others, and the college will have one of the best coaching staffs in the Northwest. A large part of the 1906 team, including Pendergrass, Wolff and Bennett, will be back. The team will be captained by Frank Pendergrass.

CIRCUIT COURT GRINDS AWAY ON CIVIL CASES

REMAINING LOCAL OPTION CASES ARE DISMISSED, AS NO CONVICTION COULD BE HAD WITH TESTIMONY AT HAND

Sam. L. Handsaker and Harold Pearce, Confessed Robbers of Old Man Garl, Arraigned This Morning and Will Plead Tomorrow—Damages of \$25 Awarded Keeney et al in Condemnation Suit.

The jury in the local option case of the state vs. Chas. Mayhew last night, after being out several hours, returned a verdict of not guilty. The evidence given against the defendant was that of two transients, one of them claiming to be a detective and both in the employ of the state anti-saloon league, who testified that they secured two drinks of liquor at Mayhew's place. The jury took the defendant's word in preference to their's and returned a verdict accordingly.

The case of the state vs. W. Wadde and Jack Morris, charged with violating the local option law, was tried this morning before the following jury: R. N. Weatherston, August Tunnell, S. A. Sage, Fred Krueger, E. O. Tobey, John Belshaw, Welby Stevens, Hugh Hampton, J. S. Conger, B. F. Cleek, R. F. Scott and F. M. Jackson.

The same witnesses that testified in the Mayhew case were introduced by the state. The jury, after being out some time, returned a verdict of not guilty.

Plead Not Guilty. Charles Rath, charged with burglary at Florence, and Bert Kelsay, charged with the larceny of John Tunnell's \$240 check at Creswell, pleaded not guilty to the respective charges this forenoon.

Liquor Cases Dismissed. Since no conviction could be obtained in the local option cases already tried, the district attorney thought it best to dismiss the others, and Judge Harris acted accordingly. The other men indicted were William L. Ford and Elmer Renshaw.

Non-Suit in Houston Case.

In the case of M. J. Houston vs. Fred Flisk to recover personal property, a motion for non-suit was allowed and the jury that had been chosen to try the case was discharged.

Condemnation Case. The case of the Oregon Eastern Railway Co. against James M. Keeney et al, condemnation for right-of-way, came up this morning and the following jury chosen: B. F. Cleek, S. A. Butler, Ed. L. Ayers, David Link, R. F. Scott, J. N. Edwards, F. M. Jackson, J. L. Oxley, G. F. Hurd, Fred Krueger, Hugh Hampton, F. P. Close. A verdict for damages in the sum of \$25 was returned.

Douglas Pleads Guilty.

Martin Douglas, of Florence, charged with burglary and who had previously pleaded not guilty, withdrew his plea and entered a plea of guilty. He will be sentenced Friday. The case against Charles Rath, on the same charge, was dismissed.
