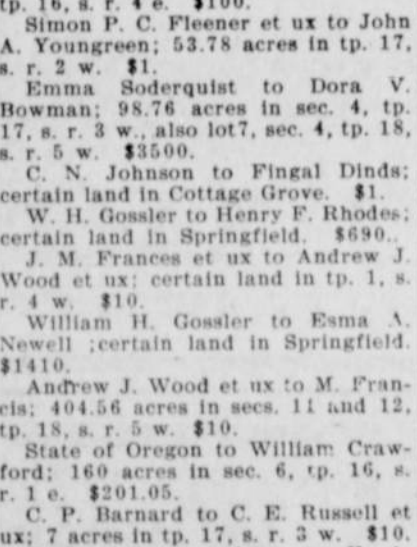

Kansas City, June 14.—When the case of the railroads was called before Judge McPherson in the United States district court he ordered postponement until tomorrow.

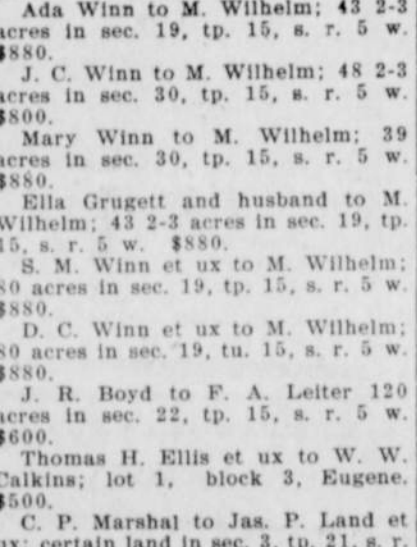

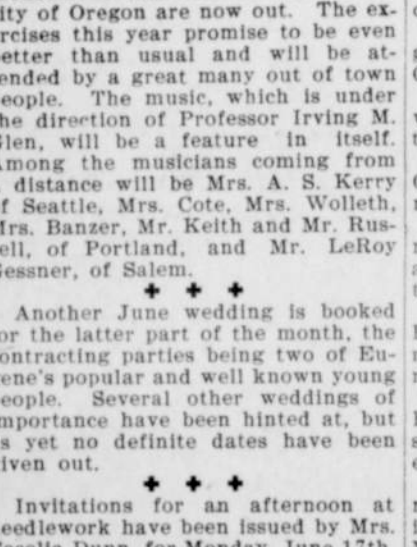

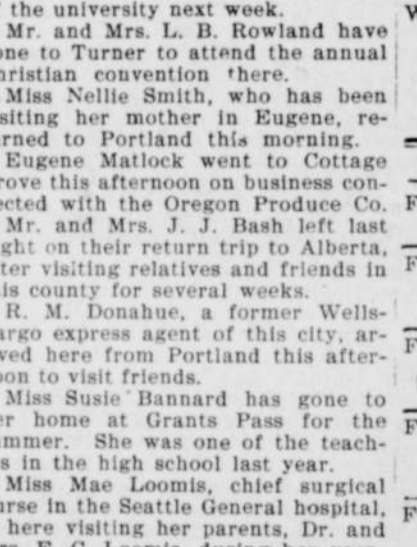
