

BACCALAUREATE SERVICES AT UNIVERSITY

The baccalaureate services at the University of Oregon were held yesterday morning in Villard hall before an audience of between 1500 and 800 people. Wallace, of Detroit, Mich., was one of the best heard in Eugene for many a month. The service was chiefly a festival of music. An orchestra of twenty pieces accompanied a chorus of forty voices. The sermon was one of the most recent ever delivered before a baccalaureate class at the university. Dr. Mac H. Wallace took as his subject "Faith in the Spirit." He traced the history of faith in the Jew, nation, and graphically brought the success of our nation as due to the faith of its founders, our ancestors. Then he applied the subject to the individual. By reference, story, and wonderful word imagery he pointed out that every great deed of the world has worked with faith, that without faith in what he tried he would only have done what I have done before him. Lincoln, said, was a man of faith. With faith we must have some object, some eternal truth, for which work, and toward which to guide lives. He urged the graduates to go to go into life, to get hold of some truth and with faith to work it. It is that way only that any great and good has been done. He said that every one should be love with his profession, and he had faith that it was a great deed. The youth of today should scatter his attention over a dozen of work, but should aim for one mate end. In closing he forcefully pointed out the uselessness of going contrary to the laws of God, morally or morally, for man never breaks the laws of God but himself. eloquently brought out the old that we reap what we sow, and of the senior class to remember great earthly success is not the highest.

PAVING WORK WILL EMPLOY 75 MEN

Street Work Will Begin in About Ten Days—Crusher Turns Out About 125 Yards a Day.

There will be a big demand for laborers in Eugene this summer on account of the construction of the street railway and the paving work. The latter will employ 75 men alone. Of these about fifteen will be kept busy at the quarry and crusher, and the rest on the streets. About twenty teams will also be used.

The crusher has an output of 125 yards a day, but the demand when the street paving proper begins will be three times that much. That will be in about ten days, the exact date depending upon the progress in the quarry and at the crusher. At the present time, though the quarry is already a big hole in the ground, it is not large enough to supply the demands of the crusher. The rock is very hard and of a good quality.
