

THREATEN WILHELM & SONS WITH DYNAMITE

Corvallis, Or., June 25.—A. Wilhelm, the well known Monroe merchant, received through the mails yesterday a letter warning him that he and his sons, Matthew and Adam, have been marked for death and that the last of August is the limit of their allotted time. Their taking off is declared to be by the Orchard method, with a bomb planted in the yard gate, as was done in the case of ex-Governor Steenbergen of Idaho. The letter is signed "A Farmer," and relates that six men who believe the Wilhelms have wronged them have sworn to visit death on the well known business men. Five hundred dollars is to be given to the member of the gang that will assassinate the first Wilhelm, and instant death is to be the portion of any member who "peaches" on the others.

What tends to lend gravity to the incident is that several weeks ago what seemed to be a deliberate attempt to burn the big store of the firm at Monroe was made. Kerosene oil was placed at several points about the building and a match was applied but for some reason the conflagration miscarried. Now comes the letter saying that "the kid" who was to burn the building became frightened and put out the fire after he had lighted it. The letter also says that the plan at that time was for the Wilhelms to be picked off one by one, as they came out to the fire, which by the way, was scheduled for a late hour at night.

NOTICE TO SHEEP OWNERS

The new sheep inspection law requires that all sheep in Oregon shall be dipped by August 1, 1907. Any sheep not dipped at that date must be seized and dipped at the owner's risk.

Owners can save expense by clubbing together and using the same vats and corals. Any standard sulphur and lime or sulphur, lime and tobacco dip may be used, but must be prepared and used under the supervision of a state or federal officer, and no other dipping will be recognized. Where tobacco dip is used, 16 pounds of sulphur must be added to 100 gallons of prepared dip.

After the vat is sufficiently filled, one-half gallon of dip will be required for each sheep—that is, with good drainage. Lambs must be dipped.

Any persons who hinder or obstruct a deputy in the performance of his duty subjects himself to a fine of from \$100 to \$500.

All deputies are under bonds and are instructed to enforce the law to the letter.

Any owner or owners wishing to arrange a test case should communicate with Dr. W. H. Lytle, Pendleton, Oregon. Such tests have been won by other states.

Portland Market Review.

Portland, Or., June 27.—The local egg market shows improvement, and unless there should be a material increase in receipts from Valley points there is a possibility of better prices this week than now prevail. Quotations today are 28 cents for current receipts and 24 cents for choice candied stock. Arrivals were light yesterday and reports from Front street are that there are no accumulations of stock on hand anywhere.

It is now a race between new and old potatoes for the favor of the consuming public, and the new crop tubers appear now to have the better of the situation. In California, where the crop this year is short, on account of early spring floods, Garret Chiles a re quoted at 50 cents a hundred higher than yesterday, and this fixes the price in the local market.

Loganberries Are Getting Down.

Supplies of loganberries are liberal today and sales were made along the street as low as \$1.35 during the day. This was for fair quality. Some good fruit sold fractionally higher than this. It is believed by the trade that this is the time for grocers to notify their trade that canning time is about at hand for it is unlikely that the price will be cut under the present figure for good fruit.

Raspberries are very much more free and the price has dropped to \$1.60 and \$1.75 for 24's.

Strawberries are very firm although receipts were fractionally larger.

Cherries are coming in better shape. Some fancy blings were received this morning from J. R. Shepard at Salem. They were packed in cartons. Kentish cherries are coming in more freely. The ordinary run of cherries today finds a demand at 6@7c.

Still another car of naval oranges was received this morning. Fine shape, too.

Hothouse cucumbers are in very large supply and are selling at 50c to \$1 a dozen. Outdoor grown sells at \$1.50@1.75 per dozen.

Brief Notes of the Trade.

Chicken market duller with prices unchanged. Spring ducks neglected. Creamery butter situation remains mixed with the larger creameries talking of weaker tone as per their forecasts in this report yesterday.

Compound lard was sharply advanced 1/2c a pound owing to material increase in the cost of cotton seed oil which enters into its manufacture.

Demand for dressed veal remains heavy while dressed hogs are slow sellers. Prices unchanged.

Small amount of shad being refishermen who a re said to be contesting the interpretation placed on the law by Master Fish Warden Van Dusen of Astoria.
