EUGENE MUST RAISE AMOUNT BY SATURDAY

A conference was held by the members of the Sluslaw railroad soliciting committee and Mr. Carver this morning at which it was agreed to close up the work Saturday morning. If the lists foot up \$60,000 or more at that time Mr. Carver will go ahead with the construction of the railroad according to the terms of his proposition; if there still remains a deficiency in the amount the matter will be formally closed and the effort given up.

Mr. Carver expects his rails for the first fifteen miles of road to arrive in Portland in a few days, unless there is some unlooked for delay in transit, and feels that he can wait no longer for a decision. He has already spent nearly two months in Eugene and the people have had every opportunity to accept his proposition if they so desire. If the effort here fails he will quite likely build into the timber district, but will choose some place on the Southern Pacific nearer the objective point than Eugene.

The committee intends to put in the time until Saturday morning working harder than ever and ask the assistance of every loyal resident of this city. They feel that the case is urgent and every effort should be put forth to secure the amount necessary to bring the railroad to Eugene.

NO PRUNES GOING TO WASTE

High Prices Induce Careful Harvesting Among Oregon Growers.

Salem, Or., July 10.—Fruit dealers and packers predict for this year the largest pack of prunes in the history of the industry in the Willamette valley. This, however, does not necessarily mean that the yield will be the largest; on the contrary, the yield will not be equal to that of last year, but the prices are so high that every prune of a merchantable quality will be taken care of and the percentage of waste will be reduced to a minimum.

In other years, when prices were practically on a level with the cost of production, or a shade higher, the growers were not so particular, and great quantities of fruit were allowed to go to waste either on the trees or the ground. Early varieties of cherries and berries are also carefully harvested and marketed this year.

One instance of a case of this character is cited where a prominent cherry grower who has not heretofore taken the trouble to market the fruit because of the small profit realized over \$1000 from his crop this year.

Cherries, loganberries and phenomenons are moving from this point in large quantities and the season has proved the longest and most profitable to the growers of all fruits in many years. No estimate of the probable prune crop of this section of the state has as yet been ventured by either dealers or fruit association officials.

On the street, the poultry market in general shows an advance of about 1/2 a pound in price today. Hens are quoted up to 14c a pound and springs range around 16c and 17c.

The egg market continues mixed, with values showing a range of about 2 cents on account of quality. Most sales at 14c, although once in a while a case is sold fractionally higher and a large lot fractionally lower. Business in eggs, however, is generally dull, the market showing little movement on account of the Eastern arrivals.

Creamery butter and cheese are holding. Former is very firm. Dressed veal continues very scarce and prices are firmer, though unchanged.

Three Million Pounds of Wool Sold.
To date this year 3,000,000 pounds of wool have changed hands at the pool sales at Shaniko, about 1,000,000 pounds having been sold there yesterday. The highest price paid there this year was 21 1/2 cents. It is estimated that the wool men of the district about Shaniko have this year received approximately \$600,000 for their wool and \$125,000 for the sheep they have shipped to market.

Portland Livestock Market.
Livestock receipts at local yards today were: Cattle, 175; sheep, 60; calves, 75; lambs, 75. The market generally is steady at the ruling prices yesterday. Quotations are: Cattle—Best steers, \$2.85 @ \$4.10; medium, \$3.25 @ \$3.50; cows, \$2.75 @ \$3; fat rto medium cows, \$2 @ \$2.50; bulls, \$2 @ \$2.50; calves, \$4 @ \$5.

Sheep—Good sheared, \$4.25 @ \$4.50; lambs, \$5.75 @ \$6.

Hogs—Best, \$6.25 @ \$6.75; lights, fats and feeders, \$6.25 @ \$6.50.
