SENTENCE WILL BE PASSED ON OIL TRUST AUG. 3

Chicago, July 8.—The at-
torneys for the Standard Oil
Company today declined to
submit further evidence in
the investigation held on Sat-
urday by Judge Landis, of the
United States District court.
Judge Landis then announced
that sentence would be passed
upon the Standard Oil Com-
pany of Indiana, which was
convicted of using illegal rail-
road rates, on August 3.

BRADLEY'S AFFIDAVITS CONTRADICT TESTIMONY

Boise, July 5.—When court opened
this morning Mr. Darrow of counsel
for Haywood, announced that Frank
Schmeizer, a member of the execu-
tive board of the Western Federation
of Miners, was killed on the train
while on his way to Boise Sunday,
and that the defense might be com-
pelled to ask a little delay in order
to secure from other sources the tes-
timony expected from Schmeizer.

Marion W. Moor, a member of the
executive board of the Western Fed-
eration of Miners, was the first wit-
ness today. Moor testified that in
1905, while in Denver, Orchard in-
troduced himself to Moor. He met
Orchard several times after that, and
at one meeting told Orchard he was
going to Alaska. Later the same day
Orchard came to him with a letter
addressed "Mrs. Harry Orchard" and
asked Moor to mail it when he got
to Alaska, as Orchard said he wished
to get rid of "that woman." Moor
mailed the letter from Nome two
days after arriving there.

Mrs. Mike Fallon, formerly wife of
Harry (Kid) Waters, who died in
1905, testified that Waters was em-
ployed as a detective by the Mine
Owners' Association, and that Or-
chard visited her husband at their
home.

Owen, known as "Oweney," Barnes
denied that he ever helped Orchard
to manufacture bombs.

Darrow asked:
"Did you ever commit of plan to
commit any act of violence with Har-
ry Orchard?"
"In that district?" Inquired the
witness.

"Yes."
"No sir."

Barnes next denied he ever planned
to commit any act of violence any-
where.

Jacob Wolfe, former clerk for Pet-
tibone, in the latter's store in Den-
ver, testified to registering a letter
to Orchard for Pettibone, while Or-
chard was in California. He said
the registered letter contained a
union card and a Masonic charm.

The defense claims Orchard asked
Pettibone to keep his union card, Ma-
sonic charm and some money for him
when he started west in 1904, fol-
lowing the deportations from Cripple
Creek district.

Archie L. Harper, a young man
just admitted to the bar in Denver,
told of being arrested in Victor, Colo.,
the day following the Independence
depot explosion. Harper said he was
told he was arrested for "talking too
much" in a college debate
at Boulder. The question debated
was:

"Resolved, that the calling out of
the militia in Cripple Creek was un-
called for and unwarranted." Harper
said he was on the affirmative.
Harper said he was taken into cus-
tody by two "white cappers." Major
Naylor, of the militia, whom the wit-
ness knew happened along and or-
dered is release, but refused to have
the masked men arrested. Witness
then told of his father's deportation
to Canon City, where young Harper
found him, his head cut and bleeding.

Defense Hearing End.

Court adjourned this afternoon un-
til Monday at the request of the de-
fense and Darrow announced that
with the exception of a few witnesses
and the testimony of Moyer and Hay-
wood the case of the defense was all
in.

Boise, July 10.—The Haywood tri-
al was resumed at 10 o'clock this
morning. Depositions made by Frank
Bradley, of San Francisco, were cal-
led up as evidence and read. Brad-
ley in these swears the explosion at
his residence in 1905 was caused by
accumulated gas, and not by a dy-
namite bomb, as Orchard had testi-
fied.

The testimony of Bradley was taken
by a commission, and was taken
in question and answer form.
The testimony of several other
witnesses, bearing upon the Bradley
explosion, was obtained in like man-
ner. All expressed their belief that
the explosion was due to gas and not
dynamite, as sworn to by Orchard.
In the basement of the house there
were seven gas meters, and the
plumbers found a hole back of one of
the meters. The building was a frame
structure and gas escaping in the
cellar could rise between the walls
to the vestibule, where the explosion
occurred.

Bradley sued the gas company and
was awarded \$10,000 damages.
The company has appealed the case
on the strength of Orchard's tes-
timony.

The Present Program

Following the Bradley matter ad-
ditional testimony will be introduced
to show that before he fled from the
Coeur d'Alenes in 1899 Orchard at-
tempted to sell the Hercules mine
and it will be shown that Orchard af-
fected to Denver in the fall of 1905 af-
ter he parted with Orchard in Cald-
well. This will practically conclude
the case with the exception of the
testimony of Moyer and Haywood.

Steve Adams will not be called by
the defense. To call him would open
the way for the state to get his re-

CROWD CHEERS WHEN SCHMITZ IS SENT UP FOR FIVE YEARS

San Francisco, July 8.—Mayor Eu-
gene E. Schmitz was today sentenced
to five years in the penitentiary for
extortion. When sentence was pro-
nounced there was a remarkable out-
burst of applause from the hundreds

who crowded Judge Dunne's court
room.

Schmitz was convicted June 13th
of extorting \$1175 from the French
restaurant keepers of San Francisco.
The cheering following the pro-

nouncement of sentence was so great
that an attempt was made to clear
the courtroom, several hundred per-
sons being hustled out into the cor-
ridors. During the proceedings Mayor
Schmitz interrupted Judge Dunne
half a dozen times and accused the
court of unnecessarily humiliating
him, and giving opportunity for fur-
ther humiliation by the reporting of
his remarks in the newspapers. Once,
replying to the prisoner, Judge
Dunne said:

"Such brazen effrontery is proba-
bly no more than should be expect-
ed."

Attorney Metzger, who protested in
Schmitz's behalf, was admonished that
another interruption would provoke
a jail sentence for contempt of court.

Before sentence was pronounced
Attorney Fairall, for Schmitz, made
a motion for a new trial, which was
denied.

Schmitz showed very little feeling
when sentence was pronounced, and
immediately began a statement to the
newspaper men.
Schmitz dictated a statement to the
Associated Press charging Judge
Dunne with prejudice and that it was
impossible to secure a fair trial. He
asked that the public withhold judg-
ment until proceedings are brought
before the highest court. He declar-
ed he will fight the case step by step;
that his own conscience is free and
that he expects a successful outcome
of his appeal. Further, he said he
would be a candidate for re-election
at the mayoralty election this fall and
will abide by the verdict expressed at
the polls.

Judge Dunne will hear arguments
for application for bail tomorrow.

TEACHERS MEET IN LOS ANGELES FOR FIVE DAYS

Los Angeles, July 8.—The fiftieth
annual convention of the National Ed-
ucational Association convened at Los
Angeles today for a five day ses-
sion. The meeting will be the most
important in the history of the orga-
nization, and matters of the highest
consequence to educational work, in-
cluding reorganization and the adop-
tion of a new constitution and bylaws
and election of officers, will come be-
fore it.

More than two hundred speakers
are scheduled to address the meet-
ings, among whom are the most prom-
inent educators of the country.

COUNTY BRIDGE ACROSS UPPER WILLAMETTE

The county commissioners' court
has finally decided to erect a bridge
across the Willamette river where
the old ferry is now located, in the vi-
cinity of the Hyland farm at Lowell.
A notice to contractors for bids on
the structure is published in today's
Guard. The bridge will be of the
 Howe truss design, with cover, the
same as the majority of the county
bridges in lane. It will have a 210-
foot span and with approaches each
about 190 feet long, making the
floor 400 feet in length. It will
have a wooden crib pier at each end
of the span resting on bed rock. The
bridge will be 22 feet above low wa-
ter. It will be located about a mile
south of Hyland's place and a little
above the ferry. The cost will be
in the neighborhood of \$6000.

NEW BUSINESS BUILDINGS ARE IN PROSPECT

to provide like accommodations for
negroes who have purchased first-
class tickets.
