GRANT LANDS TO TIMBER BARONS

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 5.—The much sought railroad land, for which people have made applications at the price of .250 per acre, is rapidly going into the hands of the big timber grabbers. Another instance that includes thousands of acres that applications have been made for at this grant price is the sale of 8485 acres of railroad land in township 31 south, ranges 9 and 10 w. This land was sold by the Oregon & California Railroad Company to the C. A. Smith Timber Company, for \$36,935. The deed was made through the Union Trust Company, of New York, to Chas. A. Smith, of Minneapolis.

The C. A. Smith Timber Company already has possession of the greater portion of the timber on the waters of the Coos river and the Coquille.

HERO OF SANTIAGO DEAD BY DROWNING

Arklow, Ireland, Aug. 5.—Thomas Myler, who claims to have hoisted the stars and stripes over Santiago de Cuba, during the Spanish-American war, was drowned off Courtoon yesterday, while practicing for an attempt to swim St. George's channel.

At the state insane asylum, Salem, Oregon, August 3, 1907, Nelson Byron Carpenter, aged 82 years, of senile exhaustion. The remains were shipped to Eugene last evening from A. M. Clough's undertaking parlors. Later, Clough will be made at Natron, near Eugene, the former home of the deceased, and where a son still resides.—Salem Statesman.

Dr. J. Christie reports a peculiar case in a colt of John S. Conger, who lives two miles west of Eugene. One of his colts died, and a two quart jar of worms were taken from the small intestines. They averaged in length from twelve to sixteen inches, and were matted together. The colt was a suckling yet, being only two months old. The case is quite unusual. The jar of worms is on exhibition in the window of Linn's drug store, and will no doubt prove interesting to farmers and stock raisers.

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SPRINGFIELD WINS AT LAST FROM EUGENE COLTS

In Rather Poor Game Springfield Wins from Eugene—Colts Drop First Game in Lane County League But Almost Make Garrison Finish

In a game in which every class of playing was mixed, the errors predominating, the Springfield Blues won Sunday afternoon from the Colts by the score of 7 to 6. The locals rallied in the ninth and brought three tallies over the rubber, narrowly missing tying the score when Palme, by a long throw from centre field, cut off Johnson at home. Some innings were of the one, two, three kind, but others were of the balloon type. Tallafero pitched a good game, though he weakened at the last, but DeNeffe was pounded badly throughout the whole contest, the first time this year.

In the nine chapter performance the Blues made a good entry in the third act, for Palme, first up, landed on the first cushion on a bunt mishandled by one of the amateurs backing the chief actor, DeNeffe, of Eugene. Two wild throws, one by Weed to second and one by Rube Saunders, the dark imported garden hose, in the centre of the stage, let Palme in. The curtain fell again with two strike outs.

Eugene followed in their inning with a similar trick, made possible by a mistake on the part of Peret and a safe hit by Johnson for two bags. Manager Smith, who holds down the sack at second, in the next act got to third on a bunt and a miscue by Whitaker. Peret flew out by sending the wrong kind of a ball to Moshberger, and Tallafero made three passes and walked behind the scenes. McClelland, however, by a lucky hit, brought in Smith.

With two men put back to the dressingrooms King and Marksberry hit two safe spots, and on one of Johnson's missteps, two more took the plate. Eugene, too, wanted some of the applause, and on an error, a sacrifice, a pass and a hit by Johnson, Whitaker landed safe on the plate before the audience. A mixup at first, at which Springfield hissed mightily, brought in Hobbs and Johnson, but the Sawmillers were not satisfied until the university man had been sent back to third. That ended Eugene's run annexing until the ninth.

In the sixth act on a hit, two errors, and a wild throw, Springfield made the Eugene fans sick by making two more tallies. In the eighth the lads from the river town annexed their seventh run. In the last half of the ninth the Colts tried hard for a Garrison finish, but a long throw to the plate cut off the run which would have tied the score. And thus ended what was touted to be a most illustrious performance, but which proved to be full of halts and odd turnings. The score:

TEN THOUSAND DOLLAR FIRE LOSS IN EUGENE

(From Monday's Guard.)

Fire burned and gutted almost completely this afternoon six business establishments, all in wooden buildings, between Sixth street and the Midway building, on the east side of Willamette street, entailing a loss of at least \$10,000, with very little insurance, probably less than \$500.

The fire started at the front corner of Murray & Cherry's paint shop and the Oregon hotel, above the ceiling, and from all the testimony and evidence, came from the kitchen chimney of the hotel, thus tracing the origin to a defective flue.

One man fell off the roof of Lake's marble shop, and was either knocked senseless or overcome by the heat. When he recovered he gave his name as Burton Powell. He stays at the Encore hotel, and besides being badly jarred and slightly bruised, received an injury to his right shoulder.

The fire was a hot one, and at first the excitement was great, so intense, in fact, that the firemen worked in each other's way. After the fire team arrived it took 25 minutes to get the first stream of water started, and it was twenty minutes before a second stream was played on the flames. By that time the fire had gained such headway that it could not be

confined to the paint shop of Murray and Cherry, and the north part of the hotel. In spite of every effort it broke into the dye works, and Leigh's assay office. Gradually the firemen settled down to work and did effective and heroic work. A heavy north wind threatened the business part of town, and a longer delay in getting action would have meant a much heavier loss; as it was several of the nearby houses caught fire from heat and sparks, and were put out by buckets and hand hose. In one hour the fire was under control and in two it was completely extinguished.

The heaviest losers were Murray & Cherry, Cherry Bros., C. Marx, Jr., and R. M. Marks, who owned the Eugene Dye Works.

The losses are estimated by their owners as follows: Cherry Brothers, on buildings from the corner of Sixth street to the Oregon Hotel, value, \$3000. All burned but Lake's marble shop building. No insurance.

Murray & Cherry, paint and wall paper store, \$2500; total loss. Insurance about \$400.

Eugene Dye Works, loss \$2500; no insurance. Most of the clothes being cleaned were gotten out.

Oregon Hotel, furnishings and business, bought a little over a week ago by Mrs. T. E. Linn, value \$1000; no insurance. Lodgers' effects lost, \$250. Oregon cigar store, in connection with the hotel, loss in stock, \$250.

Chambers & Santor, barber shop, \$400; total loss.

James Sanford owned the Oregon Hotel, and said this afternoon that his loss would amount to about \$1000 with no insurance.

Herbert Leigh probably did not suffer a loss of over \$250, while the marble works may have been damaged to the extent of \$100. Total loss, according to these figures, \$10,750.

Besides these a family named Davidson, who lived in the old building recently purchased by Garrett, Wells and Mitchell, was forced to move out, and the building was partly torn down, making a loss of perhaps \$100 more.

The feature of the fire was its intense heat, the buildings being all of wood and burning rapidly. It broke out at about twenty-two minutes to 1, and according to eye witnesses started from the Oregon hotel above the awning at the front corner, next to the Murray & Cherry store.

ALARM WAS NOT TURNED IN PROPERLY

C. F. Croner, driver of the fire team, states that the alarm turned in to him was a very poor one, and some time was lost on that account. The telephone rang while he was eating dinner. He arose and leisurely went to the receiver and said "hello." The person at the other end said: "Come down to the Oregon hotel." "Why, what's the matter?" Croner asked. "The hotel is afire." Perhaps a minute was lost right there.

Croner thinks that the run to the fire was made in a minute. One of the old hose broke five or six times. In unjoining the hose of the fire cart twice, three or four minutes were lost. No one person was to blame.

TWO FIRMS WILL RE-OPEN AT ONCE

The Eugene Dye Works will open up as soon as a location is found, and the proprietors, C. Marx and R. M. Marx, will try and make arrangements for taking care of their patrons until they are again established.

Chambers & Santor, the barbers, will also seek a new location and open up their business at once. Their loss is not nearly as much as at first estimated, part of their property being saved by being taken through the back end. Most of their loss was from damage.

Murray & Cherry do not know yet whether they will start their business up again or not. They are undecided. They had some insurance on their stock.

Notes of the Fire. In the back of the Oregon hotel are about two dozen broken beer bottles with a suspicious odor of Cincinnati or something else perhaps a little stronger.

Herbert Leigh mourns most of all the loss of some valuable plates in his mining properties in which he is interested. He also lost his assaying outfit. He will hunt a new location at once.

W. H. Brown, who was working on the street railway when the fire began, had his left hand seriously burned while operating the chemical engine in today's fire inside the Dye Works.

Amid the terror and fear there was considerable comedy. For instance one man when he dragged three mattresses out of the hotel, found under each a bottle of whiskey.

Charles F. Rath was pulled off the roof with Burton Powell when the latter was hurt. He was rendered unconscious, but soon came to. His home is in Florence, and he did good work during the fire.

The rapidity of the spread of the fire frightened many people and excited all. Several men with a small chemical hose narrowly missed being killed by having part of the building fall on them. In less than a minute by the watch after they had been dragged away the heavy board awning fell down.

Another instance of excitement was when Senator Bingham, at the head of a number of men carrying one of the big nozzles, was assaulted by a burly fellow, whom "Ike" shoved and knocked down. The man didn't know who struck him and his name was not learned. The citizens, especially many prominent ones, fought nobly, but cooler work might have saved the barber shop of Chambers & Santor, and H. Leigh's office. In many instances the effective work of the firemen was hampered by the crowd.

There is the usual curious crowd inspecting the burned district this afternoon, and discussing the catastrophe from all points of view. It is the unanimous opinion that a good supply of water in the reservoir and the

effective work of the firemen saved the city from a very serious loss. With a stiff breeze blowing things looked serious for a time, and several sheds and barns in the rear of the burning building caught fire again and again, only to be extinguished by watchful workers. Had the flames spread to these it is doubtful if they could have been controlled without very heavy loss. The firemen were handicapped badly by bursting hose, this being apparently the worst obstacle they were forced to overcome.

Five Murders Baffle Chicago Police Force

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Five mysterious assaults, in which four men were killed and another fatally injured, aroused the entire police force to action today. The victims were Fusario Rocco, found dead on the doorstep of his home with two stiletto wounds in his body, Edward Smith, a policeman, shot by an unknown man while walking a short distance from his home; John L. Barbour, found dead on the Illinois Central tracks, his head cut off by the train. He is believed to have committed suicide, but certain circumstances make this doubtful; John Naughton, died after being assaulted by three strangers at 37th and Lowe avenue; William Donovan, dying with a bullet in his abdomen. He says he was mobbed by three men, one of whom shot him because he resisted.

There are no clues to any of these crimes.

New York, Aug. 5.—There have been no further disorders as the outcome of outbreaks of the mob for vengeance upon the assailants of women and children reported today.
