TIMBER NEARLY ALL TAKEN UP

Lane county timbermen, who are representing big corporations, or at least have some connection with them, state that a great deal of money is being spent by various concerns in picking out timber claims, but that all of the available good land is nearly gone. In one instance a company kept a couple of high-priced cruisers at work for two months in Southern Oregon, and then only succeeded in getting two claims.

All of the old ten and sixteen million foot claims are taken up, and the man who gets one with four million on it may consider himself in luck, according to these authorities.

The large companies greedily take up quarter sections with two and three million feet, and where they are reasonably well situated it is said that there is some money in the proposition.

The best claims that are found today are those which are "jumped," or which have been relinquished. These are watched for carefully, and

that there are many such may be seen by watching the contents filed in the Roseburg land office.

If the high lumber rates go into effect this fall it may have the effect of making some of the small holders, who hoped to realize on their land, relinquish, and in that case it is likely that some large corporation will get their claim. Thus it may be reasoned that the railroads are working for their own interests, or at least those of allied organizations, who are engaged in the timber business.

DURING JULY MORE DEATHS THAN BIRTHS

COUNTY'S HEALTH IS VERY GOOD—FIFTEEN CONTAGIOUS DISEASES DURING JULY—SIX OF DIPHTHERIA, ONE FATAL—FOUR OF MEASLES, ONE FATAL—NINE DIED AT COTTAGE GROVE

The deaths in Lane county during July numbered twenty-two, while the births were only twenty, according to Dr. J. W. Harris, the county health officer. There were during the month fifteen cases of contagious disease.

Of the births the total was exactly divided between male and female. In the way the stock proportioned the little tots Springfield tied with Eugene, with seven, for first place. No other place in the county was given more than one. Those which were favored were Pleasant Hill, Natron, Lancaster, Junction, Florence, and one to the county at large.

Of the fifteen causes of disease there was just one case of typhoid, and that in Eugene. Of diphtheria, there were six, two at Cottage Grove, and four seven miles west of Cottage Grove, in a family by the name of Grapp. One of these cases, a boy by the name of Alexander, died. Junction City had three cases of measles, one of which was fatal. Another case was also reported. There were two cases of membranous croup, one of scarlet fever and one of tuberculosis.

In the record of deaths Cottage Grove and vicinity stood highest, with nine. Eugene had four, Junction City three, Lorane two and the county in general two, Glendale one and London one.

PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

Portland, Or., Aug. 8.—Reports from Hood River are that the apple crop in that district this year, while fully up to the average in quality, will be but 50 or 60 per cent of a full yield. Growers, in view of the large crop harvested last year, are disposed to regard this as an off year in the apple industry, and do not hold the weather or other conditions responsible for the shortage.

Late frosts in some parts of the district are said to have done some damage, but on the whole it is believed that but little harm was done in this way. For a time last week it was feared that the hot weather had injured the growing fruit, but it now appears to have done no appreciable harm. There seems to be no satisfactory explanation of the short crop this year except the heavy bearing of the trees last season.

FORECAST OF HOP CROP IN NORTHWEST

Portland, Or., Aug. 8.—From information received from correspondents in the hopgrowing sections of the state the yield this year is figured at approximately the same as it was last year. In only one report, that from Hillsboro, is there any shortage indicated.

Washington also reports that the hop crop will be equal to that of last year's, say 45,000 bales.

The next 30 days may bring somewhat of a change in crop conditions, but from present indications the yield will run from some where between 145,000 and 150,000 bales in Oregon. The following are the reports received up to last night:

Polk county—The hop crop in Polk county and especially about Dallas bids fair to be at least an average output. The vines are in excellent condition, and so far no vermin of consequence have appeared. Virtually no contracts have been made around Dallas. The growers feel sure of 10 cents as the counting price.

Gloomy at Gervais.—The condition of the hop crop in this section is decidedly problematical, and unless the price prospects brighten many growers say that they will not pick their crop. The vine is making a backward growth, owing to the season and because little or no cultivation has been given the yards. Lice and honey dew are abundant, and conditions for mould are ideal. Statistics indicate a shortage of more than 25 per cent over last year's output. Growers are very much discouraged and many assert emphatically that they will leave their hops on the vine unless price conditions show up a little, arguing that it will help the market if many of the yards are left on the row, not only this year, but next. Picking will be difficult.

Aurora Outlook Good.—The condition of the hop vines in this section since the extreme warm weather of last week has improved. The hot weather drove the lice off, and though the first few days of last week were hotter than has been experienced here in years, the growers say the vines were not damaged to any extent though in some yards the sun burned the arms considerably. The output this year will be up to the average, very few yards in this vicinity having been neglected or plowed up.
