Portland Market Report. Portland, Or., Aug. 29.—Weakness continues in the poultry market, especially in the spring chicken line, and it is quite probable that low prices will rule all the week. Receipts for some days have been too heavy. Hens are in fair supply, but the demand is sufficient to take most of the offerings daily. Ducks continue to drag, only young stock moving at all. Eggs are firm at current quotations.

Creamery Butter Lower. With the exception of two cream-

eries manufacturers are today quoting a decline of 2 1/2 cents a pound or 5 cents a square on the price of both best and second grade butter. Two creameries are still quoting the market firm at 37 1/2 cents, the former price, but all others are selling their best product today at 35 cents. The latter say the market is not any too firm at the lower figure.

While the supplies of cream show a fractional increase during the past few days, there has not been time enough for the rates to cause any few days, there has not been time ago it was mentioned in this report that the market would advance and then decline, the latest move of the creameries fully confirming this statement.

Along Front street the butter trade reports that supplies and demand are now equal and sales are readily made at 35 cents for the best outside product. Country butter is in very firm request from the outside, with arrivals small.

Egg Market in Fine Shape. Locally the egg market is in fine shape. Receipts are rather small and the trade is taking all that comes at the values quoted. Eastern eggs are likewise showing a good demand, but stocks from that direction are not so good as those from home points.

Generally speaking the poultry market is in good shape. Demands for hens and mixed lots is good at the values listed, but there is some slight difficulty encountered in getting the top for springs. In any event demand for springs is not so healthy as for hens.

Tomatoes Sell at Lower Figure. Lower figures are ranging in the tomato market. Receipts from outside are enormous, and all sorts of quality are shown. Some overripe stock sold as low as 15c a box today, but the best stock ranged between 40 and 50 cents, with most sales at the former figure.

The peach market is in good shape for fancy stocks, but the larger ar-

vals had the effect of bringing a fractional decline in former values. Over ripe stocks of peaches from dry-rot sections are hard to move at any price.

Three cars of watermelons came in from Fresno this morning. Found the market in good shape and unimpaired of excellent quality. A small lot of cantaloupes, the first of the season, came in with the watermelons.

The pear market remains in fine shape for fancy stocks, but there is much overripe fruit in the various houses which is being moved at materially lower figures.

The grape market showed a healthier tone, especially for tokays, which are selling from \$2 to \$2.50 for fancy stock. Ordinary grapes are selling at \$1 @ \$1.50 a crate.

Ground cherries are beginning to arrive in the Front street markets. Some came from Mosier this morning.

Sweet potatoes are lower with larger supplies. Quality is improving, too.

Potato Demand is Good. For selected stock the potato market is in excellent shape today. Too liberal supplies of green and unmarketable spuds caused lower prices in the latter, but for fancy stock the market is in better shape than ever. Alaska demand is still quite liberal, and practically all the buying for the outside at this time is for the northern market. For this reason dealers are very eager to secure only the best potatoes than can be bought and in some instances they are paying a fractional advance over the prices quoted in order to get something better than ordinary quality.

Along with the Alaska potato demand there is a call for a small amount of onions. This keeps the latter market in fine shape.

Dressed meats of all kinds are still hard to obtain. Prices same.

THREE QUARERS OF AN HOUR IN ICY WATERS

TOM WOLFE, OF FLORENCE, HAS MIRACULOUS ESCAPE FROM DROWNING IN PACIFIC—WASHED OVERBOARD FROM TUG ROBERTS BY HUGE WAVE—GASOLINE LAUNCH LOST

Tom Wolfe, a well-known resident of Florence, arrived in Eugene on last night's stage on business, expecting to remain in the city a week or more. Mr. Wolfe on last Monday had a very narrow and almost miraculous escape from drowning in the cold waters of the Pacific ocean. He was washed off the deck of the tug Roberts by a huge wave as the tug was crossing the bar at Coos Bay, and he remained in the water three-quarters of an hour before he was rescued.

To a Guard reported this morning Mr. Wolfe told the story of the affair substantially as follows: The tug Roberts had in tow a gasoline launch owned by two Columbia river fishermen who were on their way from Coos Bay to the Siuslaw river. Just as the vessel had passed the whistling buoy on the bar the line parted and the launch was cast adrift. Efforts were at once made to secure the launch, but as the bar was very rough it was impossible to do so. The vessel was placed in such a position that the swell struck her broadside, and many of them washed over her deck.

One especially large one was seen coming, and Mr. Wolfe, who with one of the fishermen was standing in the stern of the tug, was struck and carried overboard. Mr. Wolfe frantically tried to regain the vessel, but he found himself being gradually carried to sea by the ebb tide. It was impossible to see the tug, and a life boat in such a sea, but the crew of the vessel tried to throw a line so that the apparently drowning man could reach it, but without success. In the meantime Mr. Wolfe kept himself afloat by holding to some slab wood which had been washed overboard by the wave. Finally, however, another wave carried the wood away from him and he was about to give up all hope when his hand accidentally struck against a rope that had been cast out by the vessel's crew for his assistance. With all his remaining strength he held to the rope while he was pulled aboard. Mr. Wolfe was in the cold water more than three-quarters of an hour, and he was numb and fatigued that it took the crew some little time to revive him. The fisherman who was also washed overboard was more easily rescued.

It is said that this is the first case ever known in that vicinity where a man was rescued after being so long in the water. Mr. Wolfe says that he does not want to repeat the experience very soon.

The gasoline launch was lost, as well as the entire deck load on the tug, besides the grub box and other deck fixtures.
