Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 22.—Information has been received from St. Paul that R. L. McCormick, of Tacoma, of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, is there for the purpose of placing before the railroad his views and those of other coast lumbermen on the new freight schedule.

Mr. McCormick has had an interview with James J. Hill and conflicts with the Great Northern magnate on the proposition. Mr. McCormick made a decidedly vigorous statement outlining the side of the controversy opposed to the proposition of the railroads, with reference to the rates on lumber.

It is said that Mr. Hill gave Mr. McCormick to understand that it was useless to argue over the proposition, that the railroads had determined on their line of action and would not swerve from it.

## STARK LEASES SMEEDE HOTEL BUILDING

J. M. STARK LEASES SMEEDE BUILDING FOR FIVE YEARS—RENSHAW WILL RUN HIGH-PRICED ESTABLISHMENT—SMEEDE TO BE RAISED A STORY

J. M. Stark, of Independence, has leased the Smeede Hotel building for a term of five years from the date that the lease of Wm. Renshaw expires—October 1 of this year. He will change the plan of the hotel from a European, the present style, to that of American, making it one of the finest hotels in town.

Mr. Stark has conducted hotels in various parts of the state for over sixteen years, and in a practical sense at the business. The lease does not include the furnishings, which belong to Mr. Renshaw, who will dispose of them if possible, and if not store them until he is certain that the big Sanford hotel building will materialize. In case that plan is carried out successfully, Mr. Renshaw expects to have his hotel started in six or seven months.

His idea is to run a place on a much higher standard than any in the city at present. He wants to cater to the high-class tourist trade, which cares not for expense, and believes that such a hotel in Eugene will make money, for the reason that hundreds of wealthy people are now passing through the country who would prefer to stay at the highest-priced house possible, and that these people would be attracted to Eugene if such a place were provided. His establishment will be run on the European plan.

He also had an option on the Smeede building and could have leased again for five years.

Stephen Smeede announces that at the end of Renshaw's contract for the Smeede he will add another story to the hotel building and make it probably the first four-story building in Eugene. That will necessitate an elevator, and the structure is likely to be improved in other ways.

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—The reform administration this afternoon secured control of the police department by the inauguration of the new police commissioner, the resignation of Chief of Police Dinan, the election of Captain M. O. Anderson as acting chief, and the surrender of the old police commissioners.

The final proceedings were preceded by a meeting of the old board

this morning, at which it was decided to relinquish office to the new board. Dinan's final decision to resign was reached after consultation with the old board. It is understood that he will resume his old place as police sergeant. The preliminaries to the formal change were completed by the appointment by Mayor Taylor of A. D. Cutler to the remaining vacant seat on the new board.

All Done in a Minute.  
At 2:30 o'clock Commissioners Swigert, Kell, Leggett and Cutler filed into the board room, where a large crowd was collected, and took seats facing the five captains of departments and captains of detectives. W. D. Kollmeyer, Mayor Taylor's legal advisor, presented to Secretary Skelly the certificates of their appointment, and as their names were read by him in turn they took their official seats.

The first business to come before the new board was the resignation of Dinan. In a very brief and formal communication he relinquished the office without stating the cause, and thanked the members of the departments for their faithfulness.

Portland, Or., Aug. 24.—The Portland Commercial Club will conduct a whirlwind advertising campaign with the colonist rate to Oregon the special feature, beginning the campaign August 28th.

Four hundred thousand leaflets, giving condensed form the facts about the state and city will be put in the hands of the business houses, banks, real estate firms, and others having large correspondence, and these leaflets will be enclosed in letters going through the postoffice, whether addressed locally or otherwise.
