

FOUR EUGENE MEN AND TWO MARCOLA WOMEN ARRESTED

(From Thursday's Guard.)
After a period of apparent inactivity of several months' duration the prosecution of alleged violators of the local option law has again been taken up by the officers. Today four proprietors or employees of alleged "blind pigs" in Eugene and the proprietor and an inmate of a house of ill fame at Marcola were arrested by Constable Plank charged with selling liquor in violation of the state law.

Those arrested in Eugene were: Elmer Renshaw, employed at the Hotel Smeede bar, Jake Berger, who conducts a "soft drink" parlor, formerly the reception saloon; Charles Mayhew, who conducts the old Hodes place, and George Lill, owner of the cigar store formerly conducted by Charles Barthe. Those at Marcola are Mrs. Allie Cruzan, of Fairmount fame, and Mrs. Pinchott, one of the inmates of her house. There have been many complaints to Deputy District Attorney Skippworth in regard to Mrs. Cruzan's house at Marcola, and her arrest has been contemplated for some time past, but it has been difficult to secure the consent of any one to appear as witness against the place. Besides the sale of liquor at

house, it is said there are nightly carousals there which greatly disturb the peace of the community. The deputy district attorney is determined to secure a conviction in all these cases if possible, and intends to keep hammering away at any others that may come up until the law is obeyed or it is found that it is impossible to enforce it.

Trials Next Week.
The men arrested appeared before Justice of the Peace Bryson for arraignment this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock and pleaded not guilty. They were placed under bonds in the sum of \$250 each and their trials were set as follows: Mayhew's Tuesday morning of next week at 10 o'clock; Berger's at 4 in the afternoon of the same day; Renshaw's at 3 in the afternoon Wednesday, and Lill's at 10 in the morning on Thursday. The two women arrested at Marcola will be brought down from there by Constable Plank on this evening's train.

There are two cases each against the Cruzan and Pinchott women, three against Renshaw, three against Mayhew, three against Berger, and one against Lill.

YOUNG HORSE THIEVES ARRESTED AT SISTERS

Sheriff Flisk this morning received a telegram from Sheriff Elkins, of Crook county, stating that the latter had captured H. Armstrong and H. W. Haines, the young men who ran away with two of Komp Bros' lively horses at Junction last Sunday. The Crook county sheriff had been notified by Sheriff Flisk that the boys were headed for Prineville by way of the Santiam road. Sheriff Elkins started out to meet them and found them at Sisters, which is just beyond the summit of the Cascade mountains. He took them to Prineville and wired that he had caught them. Deputy Sheriffs Bown and Jenkins will start tomorrow for Prineville to bring the prisoners back to Eugene for trial. The young men were riding the horses they stole when placed under arrest.

NEW REAL ESTATE COMPANY FORMED

D. L. Cartmell and C. W. Bell have formed a partnership and are now in the real estate business together under the name of the Pacific Land Company. They have fitted up fine offices over the Chambers-Bristow bank, Mr. Bell removing his office fixtures from the Beckwith block. Mr. Cartmell until recently was associated with H. F. Hollenbeck and Geo. Fisher in the real estate business and Mr. Bell has been conducting his office alone. They both understand the real estate business thoroughly and make a strong pair. Besides real estate they will handle timber, fire, accident and life insurance, and negotiate loans.

JAPANESE GENEROUS TO THE BRITISHERS

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 12.—The unusual generosity of Japanese officials in viewing the Vancouver riots is causing Americans here to see the situation in a new light. Instead of showing displeasure all the Japanese officials show only chagrin. They would much prefer to have the riots occur in the United States. Americans here theorize, and with some degree of justification, in view of all the facts. It is pointed out that the brawls of four intoxicated teamsters in San Francisco, who only damaged two small buildings, the Horseshoe restaurant and the Polson street bath house, brought forth drastic comments from the Japanese diplomats and almost precipitated war. In the Vancouver riots 7000 Britishers demolished 57 buildings, yet the Japanese officials say "it is not at all serious." Said Consul Morioka today:

"Japan would not think of allowing the incident here to interfere with her high and ideal friendship for Great Britain."

Before leaving for Ottawa Baron Ishii, Japanese special commissioner, said:

"Nothing will come of the Vancouver incident save the adjustment of the damage done to the property of the Japanese and Chinese."

American in British Columbia believe that Japan does not wish to see the United States and England occupy a common diplomatic relation against Japan."

OUTLOOK BRIGHT FOR INCREASED ATTENDANCE

INDICATIONS OF GAIN IN ENROLLMENT AT UNIVERSITY OF OREGON ABOUT TWENTY-FIVE PER CENT OVER LAST YEAR

The indications are that the gain in enrollment at the University of Oregon over last year will be about 25 per cent. This does not include the department of music, nor the departments of law and medicine, all of which promise to make a notable gain in numbers. The applications that are already on file for freshmen standing almost every county in the state is represented. Nearly every high school has sent in applications, and, of course, leading all others. The Portland Academy, Hill Military Academy, the Allen Preparatory School, St. Helen's Hall and St. Mary's Academy follow the high school in number of students. The gain from Portland is especially strong.

Football Outlook Good.
As to student activities for the year, the outlook is exceptionally good. A very strong corps of student officers and managers were elected last spring. With the exception of those who graduated in June, practically the whole student body will return. Football of course will be the center of interest during the fall, and with the addition of the new men who it is known will attend the team will equal the very strong team of last year, when an unbroken series of victories was secured. Coach Frost will arrive about September 20.

The debaters will begin work at once after the beginning of the session, as one of the most important contests of the year comes off in December. The teams have already been chosen, and have done considerable work. Although the university will lose Veatch and Galloway, the leaders of last year's teams, there are a number of excellent men in college who failed to make the team last year only because of the abundance of experienced material.

Glee Club to Make Tour.
The Glee and Mandolin Clubs will give their annual concert in Portland on the evening of the Multnomah-Oregon football game, and make a tour through Eastern Oregon during the Christmas holidays, possibly covering the Willamette valley and the West Side, from Portland to Corvallis. Most of last year's track men will be in college again this year, and will do light work during the fall and winter under the direction of Trainer Hayward. Taken as a whole, the prospects are excellent that the successes of last year will be duplicated again this year.

The university campus and buildings present a scene of bustle and activity preparatory to the opening of the session. Windows and rooms are being cleaned and put in order, and necessary repairs and improvements made. The work of moving into the new library will probably begin in a few days.

HARRIMAN WILL DOUBLE TRACK ROAD

Chicago, Sept. 13.—As a result of his trip throughout the West and owing to his unbounded faith in the continued prosperity of the country, E. H. Harriman has approved plans for spending between \$75,000,000 and \$100,000,000 to complete what he believes will be the best double track transcontinental railway system in the country.

His plan contemplates the construction of a low-grade double-track railway from Chicago to the Pacific coast at San Francisco, Portland and Seattle, and its operation over the mountain sections by electricity, generated by water power from the Rockies and the Sierras. The completion of this enterprise will have the effect of adding three single track roads, so far as capacity to handle tonnage is concerned, to the trans-continental system.

NEWS NOTES

The Salem Hop Warehouse Company is the title of a new corporation which has leased the Southern Pacific storage sheds upon the freight depot site, in that city, and will utilize it as a storage house for hops grown in that district until they are sold and ready for shipment.

Portland's new postoffice building, as contemplated in the \$2,000,000 appropriation bill to come up at the next session of congress, may be located on the Falling block, bounded by Fifth, Sixth, Taylor and Salmon streets, according to persistent rumor in Portland real estate and building circles.

COUNCIL DEFERS LETTING OF NEW PAVING CONTRACT

BID OF WARREN CONSTRUCTION COMPANY CONSIDERED TOO HIGH—ORDINANCE FORBIDDING SETTING OF FIRES ON PAVEMENT PASSED—GAYLORD CEMENT SIDEWALK DISCUSSED

(From Thursday's Guard.)
At the adjourned meeting of the city council last night the matter of letting the contract for the paving of Seventh, Eighth and Ninth streets was again taken up, but the contract was not let because the council thought the bid of the Warren Construction Company was too high. It is about 11 per cent higher than the work of paving Willamette street, but W. L. Archambeau, representing the company, explained that the increased cost of labor and material made it necessary to charge more for the work hereafter. He also stated that the company is losing money on the present contract. The council, after discussion pro and con, decided to offer the work to the company at the same price per yard as the Willamette street contract.

Protect the Pavement.
An ordinance to protect the pavement was passed, and it reads as follows:

An Ordinance for the protection of Street pavements and sidewalks. The city council of Eugene does ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to throw, sweep or otherwise place upon any pavement or sidewalk within the city of Eugene and dirt, sweepings, refuse matter, or other like substance. Any person convicted of a breach of this section shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$50, or be imprisoned in the city jail for a period not exceeding thirty days.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to build or feed any fire of leaves, wood, refuse matter, or other substance whatever, or to throw any live coals or burning substance, upon any pavement or sidewalk within the city of Eugene. Any person convicted of a breach of this section shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$200, or be imprisoned in the city jail for a period not exceeding 60 days.

Sec. 3. There being in the city of Eugene pavements and sidewalks of combustible material, and the season being at hand when it is customary to burn leaves and other refuse matter, an emergency is hereby declared to exist requiring that this ordinance should have immediate effect, and this ordinance shall be in force from and after its approval by the mayor.

Street Sweeper Ordered.
It was voted to purchase a street sweeper and employ the fire team to operate it. The sweeper was ordered today by telegram from New York, and is expected to be here in about a month. It will cost, freight included, about \$325.

The Gaylord Walk.
The Gaylord cement walk matter was brought up by Councilman Fisher, of the street committee, who reported that the walk was not being laid according to city ordinance. The street committee and city engineer were empowered to investigate the matter and take whatever action they thought best. The walk will probably have to be rebuilt.

Petition for an arched light at West Tenth and Olive streets was referred to the fire and water committee. An ordinance levying the assessment for improvement of Moss avenue from East Thirteenth to East Fifteenth and East Fifteenth from University avenue to Walnut avenue was passed.

NO COAL FOR BATTLESHIP FLEET ON LONG VOYAGE

New York, Sept. 14.—The situation in regard to the proposals issued by the bureau of equipment of the navy department for supplying coal for the battleship fleet on its voyage to the Pacific, says the Journal of Commerce, has assumed rather an interesting shape here by the statements of several agents of the larger coal mining concerns that they will not present bids. The reasons given are that they have not the necessary quantity of coal on hand, aside from the quantity demanded by private contracts already entered into. The companies claim they have no reserve stocks on hand to amount to anything, and the labor situation is

such that they cannot increase their mining capacity.

Coal, it is stated, can be obtained in England if it is necessary to go there, but prices there will undoubtedly be what might be classed as "fancy."

Rio Janeiro, Sept. 14.—Juan Espinosa, an expert Chilean marksman, in attempting to shoot an apple from a man's head in a circus, killed the man. He narrowly escaped lynching.

OLD FOLKS' HOME WILL OPEN ON OCTOBER 1

Rev. J. S. McCallum, pastor of the First Christian church, has received a letter from Secretary Mohr of the National Evident Society of the Christian church at St. Louis, stating that the society had agreed to accept the old people's home in this city and that it will be operated under the supervision of the national board. The board was to have held a meeting this week, at which time official action was to have been taken upon the matter. No report of the meeting has been received here, however.

It was stated by Secretary Mohr that the home will open about October 1. For a year only the smaller residence of the two recently bought for the purpose from Dr. Loomis will be used, as the larger one will be occupied by the Kiosche Thillum sorority girls during the coming term at the University of Oregon, they having a lease on the property for another year.

COMMISSION ACTS FOR THE LUMBERMEN

Salem, Or., Sept. 12.—The railway commission yesterday sent a letter to the railway commissions of Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Wyoming and Kansas, asking for their co-operation against the proposed increase in rates on lumber from Oregon and Washington to Eastern points. This is in performance of the promise of the commission made at the meeting with the representatives of the Oregon and Washington Lumber Associations in Portland last Monday.

The letters are alike in character, giving the reasons urged against the proposed increase in almost the same words as in the lumbermen's petition presented Monday. The text of the telegram sent from Portland to the interstate commerce commission at Washington, D. C., at that time is given, and the other commissions are asked to send telegrams of like character.

In writing to the Nebraska commission the Oregon commission says: "Oregon and Washington have an abundance of fine timber of which the manufactured products have found a ready market in your state, where there is a great demand for such products. Should the proposed rate become effective, shipments of timber from points in Oregon and Washington must largely cease unless the consumers are willing to accept an advance in price to cover the advance in rates, which amounts to \$2.50 per thousand feet."

Then follow statistics taken largely from the petition presented Monday, showing the disastrous effect which the proposed rate would have on the lumber industry in the Northwest. As to the ability of the roads to pay at present rates the commission further says:

BUILDING COLLAPSED WITH LOSS OF LIFE

Cincinnati, Sept. 14.—A brick building on Central avenue, near Sixth, owned by J. N. Dohana as a store house, collapsed just before noon, carrying down the occupants of several apartments in the upper stories. One body has been recovered and it is believed that several others have perished. The building was being remodeled.

TWO CARS FOR EUGENE & EASTERN HAVE ARRIVED

Two electric cars for the Eugene & Eastern Railway Company, to be used on the line between Eugene and Springfield, arrived here last evening about 5 o'clock on two Southern Pacific flat cars, having been on the way from St. Louis ever since the 17th of August. The cars are beauties, and have been admired by large crowds of people during the day. They will at once be unloaded and placed on the company's tracks. The cars are each over 30 feet long and are modern in every way. They have seats in the regular passenger coach style, have vestibule doors and air brakes. On each side of the cars is painted the words, "Eugene & Eastern Railway." These are cars No. 1 and 3, No. 2 being expected to arrive this evening. Three others have been ordered and will be along in the course of two or three months.

BATTLESHIP INDIANA HAS NARROW ESCAPE

Washington, Sept. 12.—The navy department has made public the fact that through the fire in the coal bunkers September 5 the battleship Indiana, undergoing repairs at League Island navy yard, narrowly escaped destruction, the ammunition in the adjacent magazines being safely removed only by the true exhibition of the greatest courage on the part of the officers and crew.

STANFORD WILL RECEIVE GIFT OF \$12,000,000

Stanford University, Cal., Sept. 13.—Dr. Jordan has announced that Thomas Welton Stanford, Senator Stanford's brother, whom he visited in Australia, has decided to leave his entire fortune of \$12,000,000 to the university.

WELLMAN FAILS IN BALLOON TRIP

Tromsø, Norway, Sept. 14.—Walter Wellman, with Melvin Vanmar and Felix Reisenberg, started for the North Pole September 2, in the airship America. The America was towed by steamer two miles from Camp Wellman, and then headed northward.

Although the ascent was made in bad weather, the airship behaved admirably. She answered her helm well and the motors worked splendidly. Meeting a gale, however, the America was driven back over the land of Spitzbergen. It being impossible to battle against the storm, the valves were opened and the airship descended on a glacier and the occupants were rescued.

Wellman will postpone his attempt to reach the north pole for a year.

THREE HUNDRED LIVES WERE LOST IN GREAT FIRE

Victoria, Sept. 14.—The steamer Shawmut arrived last night from a port and brings the news that in a great fire at Hakodate recently three hundred lives were lost and thirteen hundred houses burned.

All the foreign consulates, administrative offices, banks, company's offices, schools, theatres, etc., were burned, with the exception of the American consulate, court house, railroad station and customs house.

J. M. Deeds, the accomplished Eugene artist, besides putting up a fine advertising drop curtain at the Chambers-Bristow bank, is also at work on a modern street scene and some new advertising space.—Democrat.
