POPULAR VICTORY ASSURES PURE WATER FOR EUGENE

A magnificent victory was won by the advocates of pure water at the election yesterday, the vote standing 602 for the issuance of the \$300,000 bonds and 176 against. Hastings and the Lynch woman are accused of attempting the girl's ruin in a room at a Cottage Grove hotel a few nights ago, the mother endeavoring to persuade her daughter to submit to the man's desires. A guest of the hotel in the next room heard them and went out and informed an officer, who broke into the room and found the trio in bed together. Hastings and the woman were brought to Eugene last evening and placed in the county jail.

J. S. Medley, of Cottage Grove, appeared as counsel for the defendants and Deputy District Attorney G. F. Skipworth for the prosecution. The examination was still in progress at the Guard's press time.

GREAT BRITISH FLEET ASSEMBLES FOR MANEUVERS

London, Oct. 14.—There is now assembling in the North Sea and English channel for maneuvers, under command of Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, a fleet of British warships representing an aggregation of naval power surpassing all the immediately available resources of any two other countries of Europe, and yet not a single ship in the fleet has been drawn from the reserves, the Mediterranean fleet or the Davenport or Portsmouth divisions. The fleet consists of 110 pennants, composed of battleships, armored cruisers, protected cruisers, torpedo vessels and various auxiliary ships.

COUNTY WINS CASE FROM LUCKY BOY COMPANY

BLUE RIVER ROAD CASE DISMISSED AT ROSEBURG ON ACCOUNT OF FAILURE OF MINING COMPANY TO PROSECUTE—COUNTY NOW OWNS ROAD TO MINES

The case of the Lucky Boy Mining Company vs. Lane County, in which the company claims \$7000 damages for the establishment of a county road over what the company claimed was its property between Blue River City and the mines, was dismissed yesterday morning in the circuit court at Roseburg on account of the failure of the company to appear and prosecute.

It will be remembered that about a year ago the county established a public road from Blue River City to the mines, and five miles of the road established was along the road claimed to be owned by the mining company. The county viewers in laying out the road allowed the company no damages and the latter appealed the case to the circuit court, claiming the sum of \$7000. A change of venue was taken to Douglas county and the case continued for two terms at the request of the mining company, but when it came up this term it was dismissed because the company's attorneys failed to appear.

The county's right to the road is now fully established, and there will be no future trouble with blockades, such as occurred at different times when the road was owned by the Lucky Boy company.

J. M. Williams was counsel for the county in the case, and Thompson & Hardy for the mining company.

OREGON PRODUCES \$1,200,000 OF PRUNES

"Oregon prunes will bring to growers this season \$1,200,000 approximately," says H. M. Williamson, secretary of the state board of horticulture, "according to figures gathered by Wilbur K. Newell, president of the state board. In round numbers the dried crop is estimated at 25,000,000 pounds, for which the growers will receive 4 to 5 cents and the shipper 1 to 2 cents. The shinner will receive more than \$1,600,000 for the crop he handles."

"The season has been a very favorable one for prunes," continued Mr. Williamson. "Practically the whole yield has been saved, which brings the estimate up to a high figure. Last year the crop was not worth more than \$800,000. Plenty of sunshine has put the quality into the fruit."

"In the counties in the northern part of the Willamette valley prunes did the best and the quality and yield has never been exceeded, perhaps. This includes Yamhill, Clackamas, Washington and Multnomah counties, but especially the two first named. Sales of fresh fruit in the Eastern part of the state were also large, amounting to more than \$100,000."

"Never has the grape crop been as good in every respect as it has this year. Not for years have we been favored with so much warm sunshine during the early part of October. And grapes must have sunshine to make them sweet. Oregon grapes will sell this year side by side with the best in the market."

"There has been some complaint regarding the quick ripening that is making it difficult to gather all the grapes when in the best possible condition, but otherwise the situation is ideal and could not be improved. I hope the people of the state will appreciate the favorable condition in the grape situation and take particular care. The results will be gratifying both to the grower and buyer."
