TEACHERS' INSTITUTE HELD AT FLORENCE

The local teachers' institute opened at Florence Thursday morning, with County Superintendent Dillard, Professor Traver, of Monmouth, and the following teachers of this vicinity in attendance: Misses Hamble, Spire, Gurney, Schneider, Smith, Colter, Dablin, Mrs. Gurney, Mrs. Crayton, Messrs. Peter Schneider, Wilkie Yost, and E. W. Jordan. Quite a number of the pupils of the public school and several young people who expect to teach later on were also present.

Professor Traver then gave an interesting address. After a short recess Miss Elsie Raymond played an instrumental solo.

Professor Jordan then read a paper on the subject of "Child Study." A reception was given at the school house last evening to which the visiting teachers, parents and friends of education were invited.

The program for the rest of the week includes a lecture at the Presbyterian church by Professor Traver on Friday evening, and one on Saturday evening by Professor Alderman.

KIDNAPING PLOTS PROBED BY JURY

San Francisco, Oct. 15.—More details concerning the history of the various kidnaping plots and the underhand methods of detectives, thugs and founders in the employ of Patrick Calhoun were developed during a long afternoon investigation by the grand jury today.

E. T. Newsome's account of the desperate scheme to abduct Abe Ruef through the forcible overpowering of his guard, and of the plan to take another important witness to a miner's cabin in the mountains, 25 miles from Chico, was verified through the testimony of several witnesses, and evidence was obtained of more recent attempts to suborn perjury in the case of witnesses called before the grand jury and to place these witnesses in hiding outside the jurisdiction of the authorities.

Frank Deadmond has begun suit in the circuit court against M. L. and Carl Ryckman to recover \$166.80 with interest at 6 per cent from September 24, 1907, alleged to be the balance due on a contract to get out piling for the defendants. N. E. Markley and C. A.
