**PROFESSOR SUTTON WRITES
HE INTENDS TO PUT UP A
BRICK AT FIFTH AND MAIN
STREETS—CONTRACTOR CHIEF
ZEM HAS PLANS FOR A NEW

In a letter received from Professor W. M. **MISS ELLEN GEARY
INJURED IN PORTLAND**

**FORMER RESIDENT OF EUGENE
KNOCKED DOWN BY A TRANS-
FER WAGON AND BADLY
BRUISED.**

The following from the Portland Journal of yesterday tells of an accident to Miss Ellen Geary, daughter of Rev. Edward Geary, for whom the Geary school in Eugene was named and who was a resident here for many years, as follows:

"In attempting to cross the intersection of First and Morrison streets at 11:30 o'clock this morning, Miss Ellen Geary, a sister of Dr. E. P. Geary, county physician, was knocked down by a transfer wagon and seriously injured. The injured woman was conveyed in a hack to her brother's office in the Oregonian building and later removed to her home at 739 Irving street.

"From witness it was learned by the police that Miss Geary ran in front of a heavy truck, traveling west on Morrison street at a slow rate of speed, and had just crossed safely when a transfer wagon going in the same direction struck her. She fell under the horse's hoofs and was trampled.

"Patrolman Riley reached the scene within a few minutes after the accident and summoned a hack, in which Miss Geary was taken to Dr. Geary's office. The number of the license tag on the transfer wagon was ascertained to be 265, and the arrest of the driver may follow.

"At Dr. Geary's office it was stated that Miss Geary, although badly bruised and suffering from the shock, is not thought to be dangerously injured."

**HOP GROWERS WILL
FORM SELLING POOL**

Steps are being taken to form a hop pool of a magnitude never before attempted in this or any other state, says the Oregonian. It is proposed to withdraw all the unsold hops of the Oregon crop of 1907—over 100,000 bales—from the market until they can be sold for a certain price considerably above that now current. What this price will be is not stated, but it is probable the growers will fix upon 15 or 20 cents as the minimum.

The object is to create a shortage of supplies in the market at the beginning of the season that will compel the dealers to pay the growers a price profitable to the latter if the traders wish to fulfill their contracts made with the brewers. In cases where a grower is not able for financial reasons to carry his crop and will not sign up, it is proposed that the members of the pool buy his crop at the current price to prevent it being sold.

Another object of the movement is to restrict production next year, which project, it is thought, will also help the present market. It is proposed that the members of the pool bind themselves to cultivate none, or only a part of their acreage in 1908, excepting those who have made term contracts, and these few are to produce only enough hops to fill their contracts.

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CONVENTION ENDS WITH GRAND GOLD MEDAL CONTEST

At the election of officers at the state W. C. T. U. convention this forenoon, Mrs. Henrietta Brown, of Albany, was elected president to succeed Mrs. Lucia Faxon Addison, who has served in that capacity for the past three years. Mrs. Addison, before the election, announced that months ago she had decided to retire permanently from the presidency on account of pressing literary work, and asked that her name not be placed in nomination. Nevertheless she was given a complimentary vote. Mrs. Brown, after her election, appointed Mrs. Addison vice president, but this was declined, as she feels that she ought to have a rest from active duties after serving so long. Mrs. Addison has been a prominent W. C. T. U. worker for the past many years, and has accomplished more during her three years' incumbency as president than perhaps could be done by several women. It is with intense regret that she decided to retire from active work.

Other officers elected were as follows: Mrs. Ada Wallace Unruh, of Portland, corresponding secretary; Mrs. Ida Masters, of Roseburg, recording secretary; and Mrs. Hattie Shane, of Portland, treasurer. President-elect Brown appointed Mrs. Ida Barclay, of Portland, vice president.

The election was entirely harmonious. The new president is the retiring correspondent, and has been a prominent worker in the W. C. T. U. for years.

President's Report.
This morning's session began with prayer by Mrs. Richmond. Reports of the following superintendents were then read: Mrs. Lizzie Hoskins, anti-narcotics; Mrs. Hattie Wolfe, school savings banks; Mrs. Catharine Melton, parliamentary usages.

President Addison read her report for the year, which was full of interesting statistics on the amount of work accomplished during the year. The president traveled 2446 miles in the state during the year and made a 2000-mile trip to the national convention, making 10,646 miles traveled altogether. The total number of letters written was 1890, and postal cards 102. She held three conferences with the governor, met with ministerial associations, state teachers' associations and addressed the Eugene Divinity School this morning. She has addressed 1500 school children and upon special invitation addressed the state Sunday school convention and conferred with the state grange in regard to legislation. She has used \$190 in various ways over receipts.

The credentials committee reported 105 delegates present at the convention.

During the meeting this forenoon the retiring president presented the token of their love for her and appreciation of her work. The Irving union is small, but took the banner this year for the amount of work done.

Mrs. J. T. Wilson, of Lane county, was presented with a life membership in the union.

This afternoon conferences were held, reports of state papers and reports of state headquarters were read and pledges for state work were made.

Resolutions Adopted.
The resolutions committee reported as follows:

"Whereas, The sanctity of the home, where one wife reigns a queen, is the foundation of a stable government, be it

Resolved, That we stand unreservedly against the baneful teaching and practice of polygamy, and work for an anti-polygamy amendment to the federal constitution.

Resolved, That we use our earnest endeavors toward the elimination of liquor ads in our metropolitan journals.

Resolved, That each local union be recommended to compile, aside from the regular records, a special and separate history of their work.

Resolved, That we pledge ourselves to use our influence to secure men and women on our school boards who will pledge themselves to enforce the scientific temperance instruction law of Oregon, and furthermore we pledge to secure teachers and directors free from the use of tobacco.

Resolved, That the hearty thanks of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Oregon in convention assembled be heartily tendered the Eugene union, the entertaining hostesses, the Christian church, the music committee, the press of the city, the mayor, Frederick Campbell, superintendent Alderman, the Baracca quartet, the male quartet, Miss Barber, the department store which gave ribbon, The Guard, which printed badges free, and all others who aided in making the stay of the delegates pleasant and the convention a success.

This is the third day of the big W. C. T. U. convention at the Christian church. The sessions today were all largely attended and full of interest.

The feature today was the address of Mrs. Lizzie Roper on the sailor work. She is connected with the American Seaman's Institute at Portland. Her talk was listened to with rapt attention and the delegates and visitors present learned much of the work of the institute from the address.

The annual memorial service for the departed ones was held this forenoon. Addresses were given by different ones and the service throughout was impressive.

This afternoon a county president's symposium was held and the other exercises were carried out according to the program.

President's Address.
In the state president's address last night at the W. C. T. U. convention the great cause of prohibition was best stated.

Fact after fact did the speaker bring up until every listener was

convinced that there is only one kind of prohibition, and that absolute.

The address showed how in every way the country was loser by permitting even high license saloons, and showed how the prohibition cause is spreading over the whole land.

In opening the address a great compliment was paid to Oregon as follows:

"We have reached another milestone. It does not seem as though it has been nine years since we met in this 'Athens of Oregon'."

"There was a blot upon the beautiful picture of this lovely city. Now the voters of Lane county have wiped out the blot, and Eugene (fair as a rose, has taken on new activity, new beauty, and has made itself a safer, cleaner and better city to send the Oregon young manhood and young womanhood to be educated in."

All hail, fair city of Eugene! Why are we here? To count our victories, note our losses, to formulate new plans to meet the new conditions every year presenting themselves, and to praise God for the continued mercies and manifold blessings."

COMMENCE ON OREGON EASTERN RAILWAY SOON

**CHIEF ERECTING ENGINEER
GRIFFITH ESTABLISHING A
CAMP NORTH OF KLAMATH
FALLS AND WILL BEGIN FIELD
SURVEY**

Klamath Falls, Or., Oct. 17.—That no time is to be lost in the building of a railroad by E. H. Harriman through Central Oregon is evidenced by the fact that preparations are now being made for the commencement of work at the southern terminus of the Oregon Eastern at Klamath Falls. D. D. Griffith, chief locating engineer of the Southern Pacific Company, who has been relocating the line out from Weed, is now moving his camp to Naylox, ten miles north of this city, preparatory to completing the survey on the Oregon Eastern. Two big teams hauled here from Bray this forenoon loaded with supplies for the camp. They will immediately return to Bray for the tents and camp equipment, and on the next trip will be accompanied by Engineer Breck, who is in charge of a portion of Mr. Griffith's party. Employed in the party are about thirty men. Mr. Breck has charge of the preliminary work, while Assistant Engineer Wolfen is in charge of the permanent survey and Mr. Griffith has general supervision of the entire party. He is expected to reach Naylox within the next ten days, by which time everything will be in readiness for the beginning of the work of locating the line through Central Oregon.

Everything points to the prosecution of construction work on an extensive scale throughout this section of the very near future.

ASSESSOR REQUIRED TO MAKE TAX ROLLS

Only one case was handed down by the supreme court yesterday morning, that of John Waterhouse and George Kobach, Appellants, vs. Clatsop county and County Clerk J. C. Linton, respondents, in which the decree of Judge George A. McBride, of the circuit court, is affirmed by Chief Justice Bean.

This action was brought in a friendly manner to secure a judicial interpretation of the effect of the 1907 tax laws, as pertains to the extension of the 1907 taxes upon the roll, and particularly whether the 1907 taxes be extended on the roll reported by the assessor, or whether the county clerk would be required to make a new roll, and the supreme court, in harmony with the decision of the lower court, holds that the clerk shall extend the taxes upon the roll made by the assessor.

William C. Counter, of Lakeview, was admitted to practice before the bar of Oregon yesterday morning by the supreme court.—Salem Statesman.

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CLARENCE THOMSON ACCIDENTALLY KILLED

Clarence Thomson, a well-known timber cruiser, residing in this city, was accidentally shot in the left leg by his brother, Henry Thomson, yesterday, and he died in the Eugene hospital about noon today from the effects of amputation, it being necessary to perform the operation on account of the seriousness of the wound.

The two brothers were out hunting on Camas Swale, east of Creswell, yesterday, and were returning, walking single file. Henry had a long walking stick, and dropped behind, and just as Clarence had passed him, Henry's shotgun, which he was carrying in his hand was in some unexplained manner discharged, the load of shot entering Clarence's leg from the rear and just above the knee, tearing a great hole in the flesh and shattering the bone. The accident happened shortly after 4 o'clock.

Henry carried his brother to the house of C. F. Osment and the physicians at Creswell were sent for. They dressed the wound and the injured man was taken to Creswell, where the train was boarded for Eugene. The train arrived here about 6 o'clock this morning and Clarence was taken to the hospital, where the operation was performed by Dr. W. Kuykendall, assisted by Dr. A. V. Paine, about 9 o'clock. He never rallied from the shock and expired about noon.

Henry Thomson resides at Pendleton and was here on a visit to his brother and parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fayette Thomson, who reside up the McKenzie. He was the oldest of six children and Clarence was the youngest. He is a heart-broken over the accident. He and his brother hunted together since they were boys and were attached to each other perhaps more than they were to the other children in the family. Besides his aged parents and brother Henry, the deceased leaves a devoted wife and three other brothers, Winthrop, Theron and Carey, and a sister, Mrs. Lena Brownson. He was aged 33 years. He led an honorable and upright life and had hosts of friends in Eugene and in different parts of the country wherever his acquaintance extended.

The funeral arrangements have not yet been perfected.

NORWEGIAN LUTHERAN CHURCH DEDICATION

In the afternoon at 2 o'clock there will be a short address by the ministers present. Also Attorney S. P. Ness, secretary of the church, will speak.

ORVILLE GREEN, OLD SOLDIER, DIED TODAY

Orville Green, one of the best known old soldiers in Eugene, died at the Eugene hospital today at noon after a long illness. He was aged 70 years. Funeral announcements and a sketch of his life will appear later. Mr. Green was well liked by all who knew him, as he always had a pleasant word and a happy smile for everybody.

His daughters, at Roseburg and Brownsville have been informed and the funeral arrangements will not be made until they arrive.

OLD HAMBURG HOUSE GOES BROKE

Hamburg, Oct. 17.—The failure of Heller, Soebble & Co., an old banking house of this city, was announced today. Their liabilities are estimated at from \$3,000,000 to \$7,000,000.

ANOTHER TOWN THAT WANTS PURE WATER

Aberdeen, Wash., Oct. 17.—The council has decided to submit the question to the people of issuing bonds to the amount of \$200,000 to secure a water supply from the head waters of the Wynoochee river. It is thought the proposition will pass inasmuch as the city has suffered considerable loss, its manufacturers going elsewhere because of a limited supply of water.

EUGENE BECOMES JOBGING CENTER OF CONSEQUENCE

**NUMBER OF FIRMS WHO SELL
TO OUTSIDE MERCHANTS—BIG
DISTRICT ALONG CERTAIN
LINES—MEANS MUCH FOR FUTURE**

Eugene bids fair to become a jobbing center of importance to Southwestern Oregon and in some degree has already assumed her rightful position. The district in which she now operates extends from Benton, Lincoln and Linn counties to even Eastern Oregon, as Crook, Lake and Harney counties, along certain lines.

Properly speaking the district which belongs to Eugene is Lane county. The merchants of the county towns depend upon those of this city for their stock, since they can get their goods in such short order and buy in such small lots. Grocery, dry goods, clothing and furniture stores in this city all have out of town retail customers.

Eugene also has one cigar factory which does a wholesale business. Fred C. Potts owns the enterprise and produces a high-class cigar. Julius Goldsmith does a very large jobbing business in Lane county in tobacco, besides selling goods as far south as Roseburg and north as far as Lebanon, Corvallis, and even the Yaquina Bay country. He keeps one man on the road—S. H. Jackson—besides traveling himself at intervals. He believes that his jobbing business covers three-fourths of the county's tobacco trade.

The three Eugene produce firms also do a big business, and ship much to the establishments of the upper valley. The three firms are Geo. H. Smith, commission merchant, Seattle Produce Company and the Oregon Produce Company.

Eugene also has the district agency for two important sewing machine concerns, the Singer and the White. The Singer Company has a regular office and manager. The district includes the following counties: Lane, Douglas, Crook, Lake, Harney, Klamath, Jackson, Josephine, Curry and Coos. The White is in the hands of the Campbell-Feltman Company. Their district includes the northern part of Douglas county, all of Lane, and Lincoln counties.

Altogether the jobbing business of Eugene is a great factor in the city's prosperity, and will become more and more important with its growth.

COLORED BISHOP DINES IN HOME OF THE SOUTH

Richmond, October 19.—Mr. and Mrs. Potter, of New York, who leased a residence here during the general convention of the American Episcopal church, last evening entertained at dinner Bishop Perazuma, of Africa, the only negro entitled to a seat in the house of bishops at the convention. A dinner in honor of the African bishop in the heart of the South was the occasion of considerable comment.

GAS MACHINE EXPLODES KILLING TWO MEN

Hartford, Conn., Oct. 19.—A machine used to manufacture gas from petroleum on the banks of Farmington river in the upper village exploded today, killing Thomas O'Connell and Michael Donovan and seriously injuring George Gogon, who were operating the machine.

COUNTY FRUIT GROWERS MET THIS AFTERNOON

An enthusiastic meeting of Lane county fruit growers was held at the courthouse this afternoon for the purpose of taking further steps toward forming a fruit growers' union or association. Articles of incorporation will be filed early next week and stock subscriptions are now out. The organization will be perfected at once.
