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WM. H. BABER PIONEER MERCHANT DIES AT JUNCTION

William H. Baber, a pioneer merchant of Oregon, died at 8 o'clock p.m. at his home at Junction City, Oct. 18, 1907. Mr. Baber was born at Niles, Michigan, on July 29, 1830, and when six months old his parents moved to Platt county, Missouri, remaining there until April 19, 1852, when his parents located at their earthly possessions in the old covered wagon drawn by oxen and joined the procession bound for the far Western state of Oregon, arriving at Junction City on the 25th day of November, 1852. This family endured all the hardships of the early settlers on their way West. One brother died just five miles west of Fort Hall, and was buried at that place.

In the spring of 1853 William Baber started out to "rustle" for a living, and went to the gold mines of Southern Oregon. Returning in the fall he stopped at Albany and accepted a position with Louis Flesher, Melt & Co. of Portland. In company with Mr. Flesher he traveled all up and down the entire Willamette valley selling goods, which were carried on pack horses. Mr. Baber finally resigned his position and accepted a situation clerking in a store at Harrisburg, where he worked for two years, resigning to accept a position with Moore & Norcross in their store. In the spring of 1862 they packed their goods in wagons and with their old ox teams set out for the mines in Baker county, at Auburn. Remaining there one year they sold their stock of goods to the miners, mostly on credit, and when the excitement of the new rich find of gold at Boise reached Auburn the miners flocked for the new Eldorado and left bills to the amount of \$75,000 uncanceled. In the summer of 1863 Mr. Baber was sent by the firm to the Boise mines to collect all he could from the miners, and he collected \$25,000 the first trip and \$40,000 on the next trip, all being in gold dust. At that time there was an effort made by robbers to hold him when they knew he had a large collection, and it was on his return to Auburn with the gold dust that they followed him, and by cutting across the country they beat him to the camping place near Weiser, Idaho. As soon as Mr. Baber arrived there his good judgment told him that it was best to appear careless, and throwing his saddle and bags carelessly on the ground he deceived the gang, thinking he had left the gold dust behind, and they made no effort to molest him. Mr. Baber, getting an early start next day, made his trip and delivered his gold to his employers without the loss of a cent. He returned to the valley late in the winter of 1863, and forming a partnership with K. B. Moore, he engaged in the mercantile business at Harrisburg, Or. Two years later he sold his interest to his partner and started a store of his own, which he conducted successfully until 1878, when he traded his store for the one of Smith & Brassfield at Junction City, conducting this with great success for several years. Having built a large elevator, he became a heavy grain buyer, but unfortunately he was caught with a large lot of grain on his hands in 1897 which he had bought at a high price, and the bottom dropped out of the market, causing him a loss of several thousand dollars. He was again caught in the year 1899 and lost heavily, which crippled his finances to such an extent that he was compelled to retire from active business.

Mr. Baber leaves to mourn his loss his wife, three sons, two daughters, two brothers and one sister. He had been a member of the A. O. U. W. for twenty years. His old friend, Rev. W. R. Bishop, of Portland, who was with him the last day on this earth, and preached his funeral service, when the remains were taken to the I. O. O. F. cemetery for interment.

Arrangements were made Monday Miss Colvin, one section of the fourth and sixth grades of the public schools, to the C. P. church. This leaves the ninth and tenth grades to the principal, seventh and eighth to Miss Colvin, one section of the fifth and the fourth to Miss Schell, and all the first section of the third and all the second to Miss Marquis. P. church, the second overflow room has been neatly arranged with new seats and blackboards and will prove a very satisfactory school room.

The Junction City high school student body finished their organization, adopting their constitution and electing the following officers: Claire Lee, president; Edith Mann, vice president; Mabel Hayes, secretary; Willie Perman, treasurer; Bishop Moorhead, editor.

The entrance colors were also selected, and they are Garret and lemon. Mrs. Charles Klingensmith and daughter, Mildred, came up from Portland Wednesday of last week to be with Mrs. Klingensmith's father,

SOUTHERN PACIFIC FILES ITS REPORT

According to the annual report submitted to the railroad commission Saturday morning, the total income of the entire lines of the Southern Pacific Company was \$52,946,397.65, deducting \$35,489,087.99 for operating expenses, etc., leaves a net income of \$17,457,309.66. The surplus from operations for the year ending June 30, 1907, was \$4,300,344.59, and the total surplus on hand at the close of the report was \$22,206,585.94. The company paid two dividends during the year, 4 per cent on common and 7 per cent on preferred stocks, upon a capital stock of \$300,000,000, which aggregated \$13,156,965.07.

The report is a voluminous affair, and the tabulated statements given are somewhat complicated and involved in every instance where special data was asked by the commission and there is provision made all through for separate data covering lines in Oregon, the company studiously avoiding giving such information and the report, as a whole, is apparently merely a duplicate of that furnished the Interstate commerce commission. Wherever the words "State of Oregon" or "lines in Oregon" are used they are scratched out and only general details are dealt in.

PETITION CONGRESS FOR SIUSLAW HARBOR

At a meeting of the Siuslaw River Improvement Club held Monday evening, after some discussion it was decided to draw up a petition asking congress to grant an appropriation for improving the bar at the mouth of the Siuslaw river. The president and secretary were elected a committee to prepare the petition and have it circulated.—Florence West.

COTTAGE GROVE LOCALS OF INTEREST

The annual stockholders' meeting of the LeRoy Mining Company recently elected as directors to serve for the ensuing year: E. O. Tobey, Mrs. M. J. Tobey, Dr. L. W. Brown, J. L. LeRoy and W. A. Wann. At a meeting of the board of directors E. O. Tobey was chosen president, Dr. L. W. Brown vice president, and H. V. Veatch secretary. No other business was transacted at the board meeting.

Andy Nelson came down from Black Butte last Saturday and continued his trip to Eugene, where he met his father and mother, who are in Oregon for the winter. The old folks are eighty and eighty-one years of age and came West this fall to escape the cold winter weather of the northern Mississippi states. They have lived in Oregon before and knew to what they were coming. Andy returned to Black Butte yesterday morning.

A warrant was sworn out early in September charging Martin Valeo with selling alcoholic liquors in Cottage Grove without first securing a license. The accused either got a tip or suspected that he was in danger, so he took leg bail, but supposing the storm had passed, he returned last Saturday evening. Monday morning Marshal Snodgrass arrested him, but at the instance of the recorder released him when he deposited \$100 cash bail.—Western Oregon.

ROADS AND TRAILS BEING BUILT—AUTOMOBILE EXCURSION ON BEACH

School opened last week in the Upper Indian Creek district with Charles Beers at the helm.

The steamer Roberts returned to Florence Saturday afternoon after a two weeks' absence at Coos Bay.

The schooner Hugh Hogan came in last Friday and is taking on a cargo at the Oregon & California Lumber Company's wharf.

As the launch Alberta was making her regular trip down the river yesterday her crew captured a deer which they noticed swimming in the stream.

Donald Stevenson, a son of Ex-County Superintendent Stevenson, was in Florence last Saturday. He now holds a position in the coast geodetic service of the government.

A crew of men and teams are at work opening the road over the divide between upper Sweet creek and Maple creek. The county court has granted another appropriation to be expended for this purpose.

The settlers of upper Sweet creek have opened a new trail to Point Terrace. Its course follows down the creek and avoids all the steep grades. The old trail crosses a high grade, making it very steep and hard to travel.

C. M. Hall, of Eugene, has rented Mrs. Jessie Boughton's ranch at Swishome. He intends to stock the place with cows and run a first-class dairy. We understand the postoffice at Swishome will not be discontinued, as was reported, but that Mr. Hall will look after the business of the office.

An automobile excursion on the beach between the Siuslaw and the Umpqua rivers was given last Sunday. Some of our people took the opportunity to have a rapid ride in the car and one round trip was made, but on the way back from the second trip the machine became disabled and was left near Ten Mile creek. It was put in order next day and went to Coos Bay.

The schooner Sausalito, which had been lying off the mouth of the river several days, crossed in over the bar last Friday and loaded with lumber at the Oregon & California Lumber Company's mill. Her centreboard was damaged on the way up from the city, leaving the vessel in poor condition for beating against the wind. This was the reason the flag was displayed at half mast. After arriving here the damage was soon repaired and the schooner is in good order for another trip.—Florence West.

BALLOON RACE NOW FAIRLY ON

St. Joseph, Mo., Oct. 22.—A special dispatch to the News-Press from Jower, Mo., 20 miles southeast of here, says that four balloons were sighted there at 9:45 this morning moving slowly northeast.

St. Louis, Oct. 21.—Drifting along in a direction just west of north when lost to view in the haze of the falling night, and with a freshening southwest breeze behind them, nine big balloons are competing tonight for the honor attached to the winning of the second international aeronautic cup race. A brilliant moon is shining throughout the Middle West, and conditions seem ideal for a record-breaking flight. A stiff wind would have been more welcome to the occupants of the wicker cars, which hung like tiny specks beneath the great globular balloons, but the five-mile breeze of the lower air strata gave promise of splendid racing currents in the higher altitudes.

STEINER MADE SUPERINTENDANT

Salem, Oct. 21.—At a special meeting of the asylum board this morning Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner was appointed superintendent of the asylum on motion of Secretary of State Benson, seconded by Treasurer Steel. Governor Chamberlain dissented, voting for J. F. Calbreath, the present superintendent, saying his work had been satisfactory.

The governor appointed Mrs. E. B. Cowell a delegate to the Mothers' congress at Washington, D. C., to be held in March. He also appointed John E. Lathrop a delegate to the convention of the National Drainage association to be held at Baltimore, November 25 to 27.
