Seattle, Oct. 29.—Seattle banks so far have taken no notice of the action of Governor Chamberlain, of Oregon, in declaring a five days' holiday in that state. They will make no request upon the executive of the state of Washington for similar action, as no such aid is required by the local banks.

SPOKANE HAS MORE MONEY THAN REQUIRED

Spokane, Oct. 29.—The banks of this city have more cash on hand than the law requires, but the banks of other large cities where Spokane money is deposited have refused to cash and decided that checks must hereafter be paid by clearing house drafts, except where actual cash is needed. This will keep money from shipping money out of Spokane.

Los Angeles, Oct. 29.—The clearing house association decided to issue certificates, but payment of checks in amounts up to \$100 will be continued. The general transmission of business, however, will be by means of checks backed by clearing house certificates.

STEADY BUYING OF OREGON WOOL IN EAST

The latest advices from Boston note steady buying of Oregon wools. Movement in valley stocks has continued and the market is now practically bare. Recent sales were at unchanged prices, from 27 to 27 1/2 cents for No. 2 and 25 to 26 cents for Nos. 1 and 3. Aside from a few small holdings of Eastern fine staple, that grade is sold up. Small lots of No. 1 clothing have sold at 20 to 21 cents.

THE SITUATION STILL IMPROVES IN NEW YORK

IMPORTS OF GOLD, CROP MOVEMENT TO EUROPE, AND FOREIGN DEMAND FOR COPPER ASSIST BANKERS OF METROPOLIS—SEVERAL SUSPENDED BANKS ARE PREPARING TO RESUME BUSINESS SOON

London, Oct. 28.—The United States secured all the bar gold offered today, totaling nearly \$5,000,000. The price paid was \$19.50. Both Paris and London bid against the United States.

New York, Oct. 28.—Lazard Freres engaged \$2,000,000 in gold for import from London today. This makes \$11,000,000 gold engaged since Friday.

New York, Oct. 28.—Fortified by the remedial plans adopted Saturday for the protection of New York's supply of currency, the financiers began the new business of the week in a hopeful frame of mind. They were especially encouraged by the precautionary measures taken by other cities in the issuance of clearing house certificates, which will be effective in carrying on the business of the country. The greatest danger throughout the country is the tendency of small depositors to withdraw their funds from the banks and place them in safe deposit vaults. The importation of gold is expected to assume large proportion and thus aid greatly in providing funds for the banks.

The Lincoln Trust Company opened for business this morning as usual.

Precautions at Boston.

Boston, Oct. 28.—The Boston Clearing House Association today decided to issue clearing house loan certificates bearing interest at 7.5 per cent.

Nevada Is Solid.

Reno, Oct. 28.—Every bank in Reno opened for business today with confidence restored.

Pittsburg Still Closed.

Pittsburg, Oct. 28.—At a meeting of the board of directors today it was decided not to open the stock exchange. The date of opening has not been determined.

GOVERNOR CLOSES BANKS OF OKLAHOMA

Oklahoma, Oct. 28.—On demand of the bankers of the territory, Governor Frantz has issued a proclamation closing the banks of the territory for a week. This action was taken because the banks of St. Louis and Kansas City refused to forward cash to the banks of the Southwest. It is said the bankers of Oklahoma, Indian Territory, Arkansas and Northern Texas have taken similar action. There is no uneasiness in this city, but the banks here are carrying many small banks in the territory, and are arranging to issue clearing house certificates to carry them until conditions are improved.

The banks are further embarrassed because of the demands for cash to move the cotton crop. It was necessary to get cash from the East to meet the demands.

TRUST COMPANY FAILS AT KANSAS CITY

Kansas City, Oct. 28.—The Bankers' Trust Company of Kansas City, with deposits of \$800,000, closed this morning. Cashier Hughes said it was decided to close temporarily because the Clearing House Association refused to extend them the privilege of clearing house certificates, extended to thirty other leading banks.

CHICAGO BANKS TAKING PRECAUTIONS

Chicago, Oct. 28.—The banks of this city today are largely on a checking basis. Commercial depositors are allowed to draw the full amount of their balances, but must accept the bank's checks instead of currency.

Savings depositors must give thirty and sixty days' notice of withdrawal.

Run on Hibernal.

There was slight run on the Hibernal Savings Bank shortly after noon. The police were sent for but there was no disorder. A hundred persons were in line.

Certificates at Baltimore.

Baltimore, Oct. 28.—The Clearing House Association has decided to issue clearing house certificates.

Berlin, Oct. 29.—The discount rate of the Imperial bank of Germany was raised today from 5 1/2 to 6 1/2.

The change was due to New York's demand for gold.

MARKET DEPRESES BY RAISE IN RATES

London, Oct. 29.—The discount rate in Germany had a depressing effect on the markets here and consols declined 7/16, but recovered slightly at noon. Operators here expect the discount rate of the Bank of England to be increased Thursday, possibly earlier, from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2. Americans opened fairly steady, one to three points above parity.

PARIS WILL RESIST MOVEMENT OF GOLD

Paris, Oct. 29.—Careful inquiry made in banking circles indicates that there is no immediate prospect of gold exports to New York from Paris. The rate of exchange is unfavorable, and besides, the Bank of France is inclined to resist the movement. Nevertheless the disposition of the Bank of France is to help New York indirectly by assisting London in the event the demand for gold embarrasses the situation there.

Exchange Still Closed.

Pittsburg, Oct. 29.—The stock exchange remained closed today.

EXHIBIT OF APPLES ATTRACTS ATTENTION

The Guard's exhibit of apples and potatoes has attracted a great deal of attention since it has been placed in our office window. Most of the apples and the two huge potatoes came from the Staslaw country. J. M. Kille, of Chickahominy creek, and his Hilar, of Point Terrace, furnished most of the apples, and W. M. Blachley, of Blachley post-office, the potatoes. There is also on exhibition a Gloria Mandi apple that weighs 30 ounces and is 16 1/2 inches in circumference. This was grown in the Willamette valley. Many people from the East have admired the exhibit and made inquiries as to where they can obtain samples of the fruit so they can send them to friends back home.

Berlin, Oct. 29.—Maximilian Harden, the editor, was acquitted today in the suit brought against him by General Count Kuno von Moltke, formerly military governor of Berlin, for defamation of character. Von Moltke was condemned to bear the costs of the trial. The verdict was greeted with cheers for Harden.

MORE BANKS FAIL BUT SITUATION IMPROVES

New York, Oct. 29.—The United States Exchange, a small bank in the Harlem district, did not open for business today. The Brooklyn bank and the Borough bank, both in Brooklyn, did not open today. The International Trust Company, a small concern which had business connections with the Borough bank, closed its doors at 10:40.

New York, Oct. 29.—A much calmer tone was apparent in business circles this morning. The success of the relief measures undertaken by J. P. Morgan, John D. Rockefeller and other financiers, together with the ability of the officials of the Trust Company of America to meet the demands of the depositors of that institution gave great encouragement to bankers and business men.

The secretary of the treasury is continuing to give financial assistance in a large way, and is doing everything possible to allay apprehension. Another large supply of small bills is being rushed to New York from Washington. Secretary Cortis said today:

"There is nothing to say on the situation now, except to reaffirm my former expressions of the belief that matters are steadily improving."

Cash amounting to \$4,300,000 was sent to the Trust Company of America this morning through the sub-treasury.

The run on the Trust Company of America has about spent its force today.

Upon application of State's Attorney Jackson temporary receivers were appointed today for the Knickerbocker Trust Company, which closed its doors Tuesday.

Providence, R. I., Oct. 29.—The Union Trust Company, on which a run was started yesterday, did not open at the usual hour this morning. As early as 6 o'clock depositors formed in line at the entrance to the bank and the following notice was posted:

"This bank will not open today owing to the stringency of the money market."

At East Greenwich.

East Greenwich, R. I., Oct. 29.—The East Greenwich branch of the Union Trust Company of Providence did not open for business today.

At Central Falls.

Central Falls, R. I., Oct. 29.—The Central Falls branch of the Union Trust Company of Providence opened this morning, but as a run started closed its doors after ten minutes' business.

COPPER STOCKS ADVANCE TWO POINTS

New York, Oct. 29.—Operations on the stock exchange were irregular and weak. Copper stocks advanced from one to two points. Canadian Pacific fell 5 1/4.

Papers in a suit have been filed by the Postal Telegraph & Cable Company against the Oregon & California railroad and the Southern Pacific for the right to lay a telegraph wire from Portland to the Oregon state line along the railroad track. The Postal desires to parallel the track upon the side opposite that on which the Western Union has its wires. There are 266 miles of telegraph wire to be strung when the Postal obtains the right to install the line. The Postal announces it is willing to pay damages in the sum of \$2100 for the right of way.

WILL WORK FOR BETTER FRUIT IN LANE COUNTY

FRUIT AND VEGETABLE GROWERS' ASSOCIATION PLANS NEW METHODS.

WILL SEE THAT NOTHING BUT BEST OF FRUITS AND VEGETABLES ARE SHIPPED OUT OF COUNTY—LANE WILL ADD TO PRESENT SPLENDID REPUTATION.

If the Lane County Fruit & Vegetable Growers' Association carries out its plans to see that nothing but the best quality of fruit is shipped out of Lane county in the future and it is cared for in the most modern way, Lane will add to her present reputation for the best berries to be found anywhere, and a record for pears and apples as good as Southern Oregon or Hood River now enjoys.

The pear crop of Lane county, wherever care has been given it, has brought as good results, say practical fruit growers, as any section of the United States, but this like most every other crop of the county, has been generally neglected, and a few people who have given it attention have not been organized so that they might secure the recognition that comes only through co-operation of the growers and shippers. Pears can be grown to splendid advantage in many parts of the county and there are a number of orchards in bearing at the present time which will make a remarkable showing at the next harvest.

Western Lane, and especially that part known as the Staslaw country, is at the present time raising as good apples as have ever been exhibited in Oregon. No attention has been given to the marketing of this fruit, most of it having been brought to Eugene in miscellaneous boxes and packed so poorly that the fruit shows in a short time the effects of bruising and indicates the hard roads over which most of it is hauled. The apples raised along the Staslaw river bottoms and tributary streams would, if properly arranged, make an exhibit as far as it goes the equal of any. Because of the newness of the country the apples have not been infected by pests, although the first traces of codlin moth and scale are to be found occasionally.

The varieties grown most successfully are the King, Spitzenberg, Gloria Mundi, Gravenstein, Baldwin and Belle Flower. Many other varieties raised by the pioneers of the county are to be found in the orchards, but little systematic attention has been given by the growers to the varieties most demanded in the market, except the above, which have been raised along the Staslaw river and neighboring country for a good many years.

MISS MARIE BRADLEY GETS APPOINTMENT

Miss Marie Bradley, of Portland, a graduate of the University of Oregon in 1903, has just been appointed a special agent of the government for the investigation of women and child labor in this country. She was one of one hundred contestants, hence the honor is a flattering one. Miss Bradley is now on her way to Washington to begin her duties. She will receive \$1200 a year and \$3 a day for expenses.
