APPOINTED BATTALION ADJUTANT

FIRST SERGEANT W. L. COPPERNOLL NAMED AS BATTALION COMMISSARY AND QUARTERMASTER WITH RANK OF SECOND LIEUTENANT—LEAVES VACANCIES

The appointment of Second Lieutenant John M. Rennie, of Company A, as battalion adjutant with rank of first lieutenant, and of First Sergeant W. L. Coppernoll, of the same company, as battalion commissary and quartermaster, with the rank of second lieutenant, was announced at the meeting of Company A last night. This leaves vacancies in the first and second lieutenantcies of the company which will probably be filled soon.

led by appointment by Captain Babb next Tuesday night. The appointment of First Lieutenant Babb to the captaincy a few days ago left a vacancy in the first lieutenantcy, and now Second Lieutenant Rennie's advancement leaves both positions unoccupied.

Lieutenant Rennie and Sergeant Coppernoll are both old guardsmen and have been members of Company A for the past eight or ten years. Rennie was advanced to second lieutenant from the ranks November 24, 1903. Coppernoll was promoted from private to corporal a short time after he enlisted, and afterward advanced to duty sergeant, finally being appointed first sergeant, which position he has held for the past two or three years.

Just who will be Captain Babb's appointees for the positions of first and second lieutenant of the company is the subject of much speculation by the militiamen, but it is reported that the favorite candidates are W. W. Branstetter and W. G. White respectively. Both are veterans of the Spanish-American war and have been members of Company A since it was organized soon after the Second Oregon volunteer regiment returned from the Philippine Islands. Both are thoroughly qualified for the positions and are popular among the members of the company.

GOVERNOR TRYING
TO RESCIND DECREE

The East. The banks here are all in a normal condition and there was no idea of their closing until the governor's proclamation was announced.

After the closing hour this afternoon President T. G. Hendricks, of the First National Bank, reported to the Guard that the bank had had a pleasant day, more so than was expected, and much more money was taken in than was taken out. He confidently expects normal conditions to return shortly, and ascribes the Eastern stringency, Western banks being unable to get the money due them in the East. He received a wire from Vice President Eakin, who is in Portland, stating that everything is quiet there and the banks are today doing business in the same manner that the Eugene banks are.

W. W. Brown, assistant cashier of the Eugene Loan & Savings Bank, stated that business was entirely satisfactory, and that almost the normal volume was transacted today. There were no unusual features in the day's business, and money paid in exceeded the amount paid out. Mr. Brown shares the optimistic view of other bankers that the unexpected flurry will soon pass into history without affecting materially the unexampled prosperity of the Northwest.

No Courts in Session.

No business in the circuit, justice or county courts can be transacted while this holiday is on. The adjourned term of the Lane county circuit court was to have convened this morning, but court will not convene until next Monday, the date of the opening of the regular November term.

There are several cases pending in Justice of the Peace Bryson's court, but nothing can be done until the holiday is over. County commissioners' court does not convene until next Wednesday, hence

this holiday does not affect that body.

Business Dull Yesterday.

The postoffice is observing regular hours and every other line of business is open the same as usual. Merchants reported business very quiet yesterday on account of the closing of the banks. Many people who keep all their money in the banks were unable to draw anything, therefore put off their daily shopping until their cash becomes available.

Work Affect Building Operations.

It is thought that the present flurry in the financial situation will not affect building operations in Eugene. Those who have brick buildings in the embryonic state are going right ahead with their plans and it is thought, therefore, that there will be no delay whatever in the beginning of construction work. Lester Hullin has the architect's plans for his two-story brick on East Ninth street, nearly completed, and announces that the old frame building on the lot will be moved away within a few days and excavation will begin immediately thereafter. The Eagles are going ahead with their building project, and now announce that the proposed structure may be three stories high instead of two. The work of excavating for the new Chambers block will be resumed as soon as the ground becomes dry again and the contract for the erection of the building will soon be let. The promoters of the new hotel project are still working on the matter and something concerning the enterprise may be given to the public within a few days. Announcement of other new buildings may be made soon.
