RAILROADS CORNER MONEY OF COUNTRY

WILL ACCEPT ONLY CASH IN PAYMENT OF FREIGHT AND THEN REFUSE TO PUT IT BACK IN CIRCULATION—BANKS CONTINUE TO CASH PAYROLLS OF CITY IN COIN, BUT WAGES ARE BEING REDUCED

Portland, Nov. 4.—Today was the first of the day-to-day holidays declared by the governor. The Evening Telegram will say that the railroads are not accepting checks as payment for freight, but demand coin and that the coin is not being put back into circulation.

Work on the board of trade building was stopped today on account of a reduction in the wages of the workmen, who then quit.

The banks continue to cash payroll checks in coin.

PALMERS BUY BRADEN MINE AT GOLD HILL

A press dispatch from Gold Hill, Or., reads: "The current talk on the streets is that the Braden mine at this place has been sold to Mrs. Potter Palmer and sons, Honore and Potter Jr. It is a well-known fact that the property has been examined by their agents, and the workmen on the mine have been laid off, pending the completion of negotiations. The verification of this report means much for the mining industry of this section, as the purchasers, it is reported, will immediately install a hoist sufficient to sink a 1000-foot shaft or more. This property has been paying very handsomely under the recent management."

ROGUE RIVER APPLES BRING FANCY PRICES

Balfour, Guthrie & Co. have purchased a majority of the Newton Pippins from Rogue river valley orchards not yet shipped to Eastern markets, paying \$2.50 a box, f. o. b. Medford.

Nearly all the big growers are in the pool, which was engineered by F. H. Lewis, and it is variously estimated that from 35 to 50 cars have been secured. Fruit from the Lewis, Burrell, Hopkins, Findley and other orchards is included, though nearly all these growers have already shipped fancy Newtons on which they expect to net \$4 a box.

A number of other growers have sold to Balfour, Guthrie & Co. a number of cars for \$2.50 f. o. b. Medford. The Rogue River Fruitgrowers' association has received word that a car of Jonathan apples shipped to New York grossed \$3.50 a box. H. T. Findley has heard from a car of Newtons shipped to New York which reached New York at the time the financial crisis was at its height, and, considering the panic, brought good prices.—Medford Tribune.

GOVERNOR TELLS WHY BANKS ARE SHORT IN WEST

"People generally do not understand this banking situation and this fact is at the bottom of all the flurry so far as Portland and Oregon banks are concerned," said Governor Chamberlain to a Portland Journal reporter Saturday night in discussing the banking conditions and the probable outcome of the present flurry.

Conditions were understood there would be no cause for worry, the people would be calm, there would be no danger of a panic, no one would lose their heads and the banks would be able to transact business just as usual without danger either to themselves or to the depositors.

"In my opinion the banks of Portland and throughout the state never were more stable than now. They have larger clearances and larger reserves, but they have been forced to their present attitude because of the unrest of the people, which is in turn due to the conditions in New York. I do not anticipate any trouble if the people keep their heads and I am sure they will do so once they understand the situation. This has never been explained by the bankers and perhaps is not known or at least not thought out by one man in ten unless he is in the banking business or closely connected with it.

Situation Explained. "For instance," continued the governor, "take one particular example. Suppose I were in the hop business with headquarters in Salem. Suppose I had a crop this year worth \$10,000 and that I sold it for that sum to Brown Brothers, of New York. Now I could do one of two things, either the buyer at Salem could give me a check for \$10,000, drawn against the account of Brown Brothers in a New York bank, or I could draw a draft against them and take it to my bank at Salem. In the latter case I would take my shipping receipt showing that I had consigned my crop worth \$10,000 to Brown Brothers. I would give this shipping receipt to the Salem bank and on its evidence I would be given a draft against Brown Brothers for \$10,000, payable to me in New York by the firm. On the strength of this draft I would be credited with an account of \$10,000 by the Salem bank and that institution would send the draft, in the latter instance, or the check in the former, to its Portland correspondent in Portland, because all the state banks clear their drafts and foreign exchanges through the Portland banks.

Now as soon as the draft reached the Portland bank it would give the Salem bank credit for \$10,000, and would send the draft to its correspondent in New York for collection. The New York bank in turn would go to Brown Brothers, collect the \$10,000 either in cash or by check against their cash account, and would deposit it in the vault. It can be seen therefore that up to the time the New York bank collects the cash from Brown Brothers, there has not been a cent of money passed from one hand to another, yet I have credit of \$10,000 in the Salem bank, that institution has a credit of the same amount in its Portland correspondent, and the Portland bank is credited in New York.

Now the \$10,000 cash is in the vault of the New York bank, but under normal conditions would not be shipped to Portland unless especially requested. Instead when payment to Portland was made it would be through a draft, in like manner Portland would pay Salem by draft and I would draw checks against my own account for the \$10,000. No actual gold would be passed, but evidences of credit would pass as coin or legal tender, in settling the balances or other obligations.

"Suppose now," continued the governor, turning to present conditions, "that I for any reason wanted actual cash for my account and went to the Salem bank to get it. I would give my check and in return be paid in coin. Suppose the Salem bank then needed to replace that amount in its vault. It would send to its Portland correspondent a request for the cash, drawn against its account, and the Portland bank would send it. Suppose then the Portland bank wanted the money and sent to its New York correspondent that had collected the money and deposited the \$10,000 in its vault and that latter institution had refused to pay it. The result would be, of course, that the Portland bank would be shy \$10,000 in cash until such time as the New York bank did pay. If the Portland bank needed the cash to meet demands for cash the draft of the New York institution would not satisfy, and nothing but coin would do.

Crops Create Balance. "That instance multiplied by just as many times as there are individual transactions throughout the state is what has caused the present banking situation in Oregon and throughout the West. The vast crops, lumber and other shipments from this state have created great credit balances or accounts due the farmers, stockmen, and others from the country banks all over the state. These evidences of credit have been sent to Portland banks, the clearing centre of the state, for collection in New York, where they have been collected and the cash put on deposit. Now the New York banks refuse to ship the money to Portland when it is demanded.

"As a result of this condition it would be impossible for the Portland banks to pay in cash all demands that could be made upon them through out the state until the New York banks send the cash due local institutions. This they refuse to do at just this time. Therefore the Portland banks are compelled as protection to themselves and their depositors to take the course they have. Because they have taken this stand the country banks are compelled to follow suit."

BANK CHECKS TO CIRCULATE IN NORTHWEST

In order to supply the temporary need of currency and furnish means for marketing the crops of the state, the Portland Clearing House Association has authorized the issuance of bank checks in denominations of \$5, \$10 and \$20 for general circulation. These checks, or clearing house certificates, will be based upon deposits of notes, bills of exchange and other negotiable instruments that are secured by wheat, grain, canned fish, lumber actually sold, and other marketable paper approved by the committee that has been appointed by the association, and by which the certificates will be issued.

This plan for circulating a temporary circulating medium was adopted at a conference of representative bankers of the cities of Portland, Tacoma, Spokane and Seattle, held in the last named city yesterday. A supply of this emergency currency is now on the press, and if the work of the printer is not delayed, the first installment will be placed in circulation tomorrow.—Oregonian.

STREET RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION FORCE LAID OFF

LINE TO MASONIC CEMETERY COMPLETED YESTERDAY EVENING AND CREW QUITS

WORK ON LINE TO SPRINGFIELD POSTPONED UNTIL PRESENT UNEASINESS IN MONEY CIRCLES HAS PASSED AWAY—CARS SOON TO RUN ON CEMETERY LINE

The Eugene & Eastern Railway Company's street car line was completed to the Masonic cemetery yesterday evening and the construction force has been laid off for the present on account of the uneasiness in the money market. It was originally intended to at once commence on the line out East Thirteenth street, and on to Springfield as soon as the cemetery line was completed, but orders came from headquarters at Portland to lay off the crew and cease operations until further instructions are received. The local management of the company thinks that the work will be resumed soon, as the material is on the ground for the extensions mentioned, although it is hard to determine how long the present stringency in the money market will last.

The line out to the Masonic cemetery is well built and will be ready for the operation of cars over it as soon as the work of setting the trolley poles and stringing the wire is completed. This work is now well under way, and it will be only a matter of only a few days till cars will be able to operate clear through to the cemetery.
