The scene of the accident is next door to the place where John Stewart fell out of an apple tree and received fatal injuries a few weeks ago.

CRACKSMEN DYNAMITE SAFE AT ROSEBURG

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 31.—Cracksmen dynamited Isadore Abraham's store safe at 3 o'clock this morning, and the fire following the explosion caused a total loss of the building with a loss of \$30,000; insurance, \$9,000.

Twenty-five hoboes have been seen in the neighborhood and the city council today ordered several extra police on duty because of the large number of tough characters in town of late.

The cracksmen were probably experienced in the business. The safe contained \$250, but it has not yet been found in the debris of the burned building, and its condition is not known.

HOUSE ENTERED AND BICYCLE STOLEN

A few days ago the residence of Thomas Orr, who owns a small sawmill at Hale, west of Eugene, was entered by some one and a good bicycle stolen. The thief entered the house through a window and filling the lock chain on the bicycle in two took the machine and left the house by way of the back door. Nothing else in the house was molested.

Mr. Orr was in Eugene at the time and did not know of his loss till he returned home a few days later. A young man giving his name as Geo. Hutton and having the bicycle in his possession stayed all night at Pearl Courtwright's house and left there for Mapleton, where he "sleaked" the machine for a night's lodging.

From there he said he was going down the river to work in one of the sawmills. A warrant has been sworn out for his arrest and he will probably soon be caught.

In the football game on Kincaid field this afternoon between the Eugene high school team and the husky boys from Hill Military Academy, of Portland, the latter had the best of it in weight and experience, and played a superior game all the way through. In the first half Hill scored 12 points to Eugene's nothing. The first touchdown was made after ten minutes of play and the second a minute before the half was ended. Both goals were easily kicked. Eugene failed to handle the punts well and fumbled frequently. Hill excelled in punting and was heavier than their opponents. Some sensational plays were made on both sides, a number of long end runs being made by both teams.

In the second half Hill repeated the performance by making two touchdowns after twelve minutes of play. After the last touchdown Eugene took a brace and did better defensive work than during any part of the game.

The afternoon was ideal for football and the grounds on Kincaid field were in good shape despite the heavy rain of yesterday. The Hill Military Academy team arrived up last night and went through a few formations to get used to the ground. The crowd this afternoon, while not very large, was noisy, and enthusiasm was manifested nicely at the proper moment.

OREGON WINS FROM WILLAMETTE

IOWA DOES NOT COMPARE WITH OREGON

W. D. Washburn, of Brownsville, returned last night from a trip to Iowa and other Middle Western states, and pronounces this valley so far ahead of that country as to offer little comparison. There was about half a crop of corn and oats, and dairying there does not equal Oregon. Lumber was \$40 for rough and \$100 for clear, odd looking stuff compared with \$60 to \$200 per acre, and for rental the prevailing price was \$2 an acre with nothing to justify it. He found people everywhere were anxious to come to the Northwest, and looks for a big immigration from Iowa.—Albany Democrat.

SCHOONER WRECKED IN TERRIFIC GALE

Seattle, Nov. 1.—News has been received here of the wreck on Protection island, in the Straits of Juan de Fuca, of the schooner Willie R. Hume, from San Francisco to Everett, in ballast. There was a terrific gale blowing, but it is not known whether any lives were lost. Tugs have gone to the scene from here.

DIED

In Portland, Oct. 29, 1907, John W. Williams. The deceased was born in New York in 1831. He came to Jacksonville in early life, and his young manhood was spent at that place. He crossed the plains in 1853, and settled at Corvallis. Later he moved to Eugene, where he spent many years. He married Miss Loretta Goltz. Mr. Williams was the founder of the Odd Fellows' Lodge at Corvallis, and was noble grand for a number of years. He was also grand warden for the state and was very prominent in I. O. O. F. circles. He leaves a son, Edward Lambert Williams of Portland, and a daughter, Mrs. F. G. Thayer of Wendling.

The funeral was held in Eugene this afternoon and the remains interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. D. H. Trimble conducting the services.

BIG VERDICT AGAINST RAMSEY IN NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 1.—A verdict of \$589,000, against Joseph Ramsey Jr., former president of the Wabash railroad, in a suit brought by John S. Jones, financier and coal land operator, was handed down today by the supreme court.

Jones sued George J. Gould, William E. Guy and Joseph Ramsey, as individuals, to recover \$460,000 alleged to be due him for securing 50,000 acres of coal lands in Southern Ohio. He claimed money advanced, commissions, expenses and interest. Justice Goff held that neither Gould nor Guy were liable, and a verdict was rendered only against Ramsey.

HURLBURT SELLS PART OF HIS STOCK

JUNCTION MERCHANT WILL DEVOTE ATTENTION TO DRY GOODS—OTHER NOTES

C. F. Hurlburt has sold his stock of groceries, crockery, queensware, etc., to Millhorn Bros., the sale being consummated Thursday. Mr. Hurlburt will devote his entire attention to the exclusive lines of dry goods, clothing, hats, caps, boots, shoes, etc. He will increase his stock in all these lines. But few stores in the valley will have a larger stock and none will handle a higher grade of goods. He will make a number of changes in the present arrangement of his lines, and will make them still more attractive.

One of the surveys for the electric road from Eugene to this place has been completed. This survey comes down the river road to Aubrey's corner, diverges northwest and strikes the prairie road at the Woodcock farm, better known as the Butler place, and crosses the S. P. track on Judge Christman's place, and follows on north across the Ed Bailey farm to the limits of the city. We are not informed as to the time other surveys will be made.

The Farmers' and Merchants' bank of this city closed its doors Tuesday by request of the Eugene banks, but was open for business Wednesday morning as usual.—Junction City Times.

Oklahoma City, Nov. 2.—The banks opened today on the limited payment plan, and deposits greatly exceeded the withdrawals.

PILOT ROCK ROAD WILL BE FINISHED

Pendleton, Or., Nov. 1.—Following the offer of Pendleton and Pilot Rock citizens to complete the Umatilla Central into Pilot Rock, a telegram was received today from General Manager O'Brien, acknowledging the receipt of the offer and stating that the necessary instructions had been issued that would insure the continuation of the Pilot line work. The message was immediately followed by orders to Engineer Brandon, who is in charge of the work, from G. W. Boschke, chief engineer at Portland, to arrange to complete the track on the Umatilla Central as quickly as possible. The order stated that if there were no men here, after the force being laid off, that men would be sent from Portland and other points.

ILLINOIS CRIMINALS TURNED OUT OF PRISON

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 1.—The doors of the Joliet penitentiary swing open tomorrow and the first batch of nearly one hundred murderers, highwaymen, burglars and other criminals will be turned loose as a result of a recent decision of the supreme court, which held that the municipal courts of Chicago could not legally try cases in which the indictments were returned by a Cook county grand jury. The situation is one of the most serious that ever confronted Chicago. If the decision of the highest court is to stand, it means that on the eve of winter footpads, murderers and criminals of all classes are to be turned loose on the streets of the city.

OCCUPATION TAX FOR BUSINESS MEN OF SPRINGFIELD

COMMERCIAL CLUB TAKES MATTER UP AND THOROUGHLY DISCUSSES IT

COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO MEET WITH CITY COUNCIL AND URGE PASSAGE OF ORDINANCE—JOHN WINZENREID WILL CARRY MAIL TO AND FROM JUNCTION

The Springfield bank closed its doors like all other Oregon banks for a five days' holiday, but will be opened again to the public Monday and will do its usual rushing business.—News.

WORK RESUMED AT BLACK BUTTE MINES MINERS BEGIN QUARRYING ORE—ELECTRIC LIGHTS TURNED ON THIS WEEK

John Nokes, who has been doing cement work at the Black Butte quicksilver mines for the past six weeks, came down a few days ago. He states that the electric lights from the new plant are to be turned on this week. Miners commenced quarrying ore on the afternoon of the day he left. This is the first ore that has been mined for several months. Fire in the furnaces is to be lighted in a few days, after which the mine is to be classed as a producer.

R. Crocker, \$250,000 of the order's funds. The directors and officers of the order are expected in Charleston tomorrow to investigate. It is stated that the order is fully protected by bonds several times in excess of the sum on deposit. Crocker was former head banker for the order.
