CERTIFICATES WILL CIRCULATE HERE

BOOTH-KELLY COMPANY WILL PAY \$25,000 IN WAGES WITH NEW MONEY.

MEMBERS OF MERCHANTS' PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION AGREE TO ACCEPT THE PAPER AS CASH—IT BECOMES REDEEMABLE IN THE FIRST OF FEBRUARY NEXT YEAR

The Eugene Merchants' Protective Association held a meeting last night at which time the Booth-Kelly Lumber company announced that it would pay \$25,000 in wages during the next few days in San Francisco clearing house certificates, it being unable to secure the cash from the banks to pay off their several hundred employees who have been laid off pending the betterment of conditions in the freight rate matter. After a general discussion, the merchants agreed to accept this paper as cash from the employees, and hereafter it will be in general circulation here. The certificates are redeemable on the first day of February, 1908.

This is the same kind of a medium of circulation that is being used in Portland at present and which is being taken there as cash until the banks are opened for business again. Other matters pertaining to the present financial uneasiness were discussed at the meeting last night. It was the general opinion that there was no cause for alarm and a feeling that everything would come out all right and that normal conditions would prevail pervaded the meeting.

MADE MANY TRIPS TO IOWA AND BACK

GOLD COMING TO PORTLAND BANKERS

Gold to the amount of \$750,000 will leave England today for Portland direct. The shipment was secured in London for the First National bank by its president, A. L. Mills, and will be available here by the last of next week. The specie will leave England by the steamship Oceanic, which is due in New York Thursday, November 14. Secretary Cortelyou has notified President Mills that upon the arrival of the gold in New York it will be placed in the sub-treasury there, and the San Francisco sub-treasury directed to the London, Paris & American Bank, the First National's agent, an equal sum in gold coin, which will be shipped direct to Portland.—Oregonian.

Presidents of national banks—For extra session, 30; against, 39.

Summary—For extra session, 37; against, 86.

CROSSING HENDRICKS' FERRY WAGON BRIDGE

STRUCTURE SO LONG NEEDED IS ABOUT COMPLETED—WILL BE GREAT CONVENIENCE TO TOURIST TRAVEL

A new wagon bridge across the McKenzie river at Hendricks' Ferry has so far been completed as to allow the passage of teams over it, and Contractor W. W. Inman expects to have all the work done within a few days. The opening of this bridge to public travel is a great convenience to the people living on the upper McKenzie, and will be a still greater convenience to the hundreds of tourists next summer. Heretofore teams going to and from the upper McKenzie valley have been compelled to cross the river on the ferry boat and often in the summer there have been delays for several hours and sometimes half a day on account of the large number of teams to cross, the boat not being able to handle the traffic fast enough to keep the road clear. Then again, whenever the river has been swollen by heavy rains the boat has been out of commission, compelling travelers to go miles out of their way to cross.

The bridge which is now being completed is one of the best in the county and reflects credit upon the contractor.
