**TELLS HOW TO
AVERT PANIC**

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 7.—Not Wall street, but individuals who are hoarding money are responsible for the present financial stress, according to a statement made by James J. Hill. He says:

"There is nothing in the actual business conditions to cause or to account for the financial stress. Crops were good, and until the money began to disappear prices were higher than for many years. Neither is there an insufficient volume of money in the country. The notion that Wall street absorbed it is with-

out foundation. A year ago there was enough money for current needs. The trouble clearly comes from hoarding of money. The impairment of public confidence is the real fault. It has already done much damage, and will do more unless speedily corrected. This popular distrust, as far as it leads to hoarding, is foolish and hurtful. The people should put an end to it by releasing the money whose withdrawal from circulation means business starvation. The financial interests are doing their part. The people must put away their misgivings and do their part. Then the crisis will end."

TRAMP SHOT AND KILLED AT YONCOLLA

Yoncalla, Nov. 8.—While running away to avoid arrest an unknown tramp was shot and killed by Night Watchman Frank Lundy in this city late last night. The authorities at Roseburg were notified and Justice Meizner, of this place, was authorized to hold an inquest by Coroner Hammitte. Owing to this being pro-

claimed a legal holiday by the governor, Justice Meizner is deterring the inquest pending advice from the district attorney.

During the evening of yesterday the dead tramp and two companions were overheard planning a holdup. Lundy was promptly notified and he accordingly kept a close look-out for the trio during the night. About midnight he discovered one of the men acting in a suspicious manner, and arrested him. Starting toward the jail with the prisoner the officer had proceeded but a short distance when the tramp suddenly jerked himself loose and ran. Lundy called to him to stop, adding that he would shoot if he didn't. The fugitive shouted back that Lundy did not dare to shoot and kept on running.

Lundy thereupon fired at the man from his revolver and brought him down. The bullet entered the tramp's left side and he expired in a few minutes.
