MEETING OF COURT AGAIN POSTPONED

DECEMBER 11 DATE SET, BUT MAY NOT CONVEY TILL AFTER FIRST OF YEAR

IF HOLIDAYS LAST LONGER THAN LAST OF WEEK COURT WILL CONVEY ON FIRST MONDAY IN JANUARY—MEETING OF BAR HELD TODAY

together at the courthouse this forenoon at 11 o'clock for the purpose of considering the matter of again postponing circuit court. At a recent meeting it was set for Monday, December 2, but as it now appears that the holidays will last longer than this week, it was decided to set another date. It was agreed to instruct the jury, which had been told to report for duty next Monday, not to come until Wednesday, December 11, and if the holidays are to extend over that date the convening of the court will then be postponed until the first Monday in January.

It was the general belief among the attorneys present at the meeting this forenoon that the holidays will not extend before the first of the year, although if they should and with the last of this week or the last of next they and the jury will be ready Wednesday, December 11.

ALIENISTS BATTLE IN BRADLEY CASE AT WASHINGTON

Washington, Nov. 26.—The battle of the alienists in the Bradley case was well launched today when Dr. Britton D. Evans, of the New Jersey hospital for the insane, was placed on the stand to corroborate the statements made yesterday by Dr. Barton that Mrs. Bradley at the time she shot Brown was insane.

The district attorney was aided in his questions by Dr. Smith Ely Jelliffe, of New York, and Dr. Edward S. Brush, of Baltimore. The standing of Evans and the fact that he testified in favor of Harry Thaw was sufficient reason for the attracting of a large crowd.

Dr. Isaac Rich, of New York city, was the first witness. He described Mrs. Bradley's peculiar actions in the hotel on the day of the tragedy. Mrs. Bradley appeared in better spirits today, and was provided with a comfortable arm chair, for which she was profuse in her thanks.

Evans' testimony was dramatic. He spoke sympathetically of Mrs. Bradley, and referred contemptuously to Brown for his inhuman treatment, all of which, he said, preyed upon her mind and unseated her reason. He declared Brown, by his own hands, destroyed the children he had begotten. His reference to Brown was so pointed and vigorous that Justice Stafford admonished him that Brown was dead and could not answer for himself, and further, that Brown was not on trial.

As Judge Powers read extracts from the letters of Mrs. Bradley, found in the hotel, expressing love and devotion for Brown, Mrs. Bradley sobbed and wept and nearly fainted.

Mrs. Bradley was recalled to the stand and stated that while she and her husband cohabited she gave him no excuse for a divorce.

The defense finished its testimony at noon.

At the afternoon session Judge William King, of Salt Lake, testified that at the instance of Senator and Mrs. Brown he made Mrs. Bradley an offer of a \$5000 home and \$100 a month until her youngest child was twenty-one. The offer was indignantly spurned, Mrs. Bradley saying she wanted to marry Brown to get rid of "the old lady on the hill," meaning Mrs. Brown.

BIG ELECTRIC SYSTEM CENTRES AT EUGENE

A larger plan of electric railway development in the Willamette valley and central Oregon than has ever before been undertaken is being launched by A. Welch, and the Willamette Valley company, owners of electric light plants at various points, and builders of the Eugene street railway and other projects, says the Portland Journal.

With a nominal capital of \$1,000,000 they today incorporated the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway company, for the purpose of building an electric road from Portland to Salem, Eugene, Yachima, Prineville and Ontario, with branches to numerous towns.

The total mileage contemplated in their undertaking is in excess of 800 miles. They propose to develop from the McKenzie, the Santiam and the Deschutes rivers and streams in Central Oregon the enormous power necessary for operating the system planned.

Papers were filed today in the Multnomah county clerk's office by Attorney John A. McNary and C. L. McNary, of Salem, acting for the company, completing its incorporation and setting forth an outline of its purposes. The incorporators are J. O. Storey, J. C. Bracher, George Bracher, A. Welch, E. W. Hall and John McNary.

According to the incorporation papers the following lines of electric road will be built: From Portland to Salem, thence to Eugene, from which point they will branch out in several directions. A line from Eugene via Springfield and the McKenzie valley will extend to Prineville and thence across the state to Ontario.

Another line from Eugene will tap Yachima Bay points, and lines will also connect Eugene with Florence, Cottage Grove, Corvallis, Wendling, Mehama and Dallas, passing through Lane, Polk and Lincoln counties.

This is the most ambitious scheme of electric railroad development yet undertaken in Oregon. How long it will take to develop it is of course problematical. The backers say they have completed the nucleus, which is the Eugene electric railway, and that they have rights of way and water powers already secured for a large part of the lines.

They have been at work for more than a year on the preliminaries of the project. It is said their proposed line from Portland to Salem and Eugene will pass on the east side of the Willamette river.

WORST OVER SAYS WORLD'S RICHEST MAN

New York, Nov. 25.—"The worst is over," said John D. Rockefeller yesterday, when asked his opinion regarding the financial situation. It was at the close of the service at the Fifth Avenue Baptist church, which he attended, that Mr. Rockefeller gave his opinion to friends. "There was no necessity for the worst" ever to have appeared," he continued. "But, of course," we are bound to feel the effects of it for some time."

"What do you think was the real cause of the panic?" he was asked. "Oh, there were a number of causes. They all happened to combine and come to a head at one time. All of these combined forces created uneasiness and a lack of confidence. When you remove confidence from the business world, trouble is bound to ensue. Confidence will be restored gradually and we will resume our normal condition. This is too great a country to be held down."

"Do you believe President Roosevelt's policy in attacking the trusts contributed to cause the financial ditto?"

"I believe President Roosevelt to be actuated by the best of motives, and have no criticism to make of any kind. This financial condition was foreseen long before it was felt. Several well-known men pointed out that it was bound to come unless measures were adopted to stop it."

CLOSED POUCH MAIL SERVICE ON FREIGHT TRAINS

The postoffice officials have ordered a closed pouch mail service on freight train 221 between Roseburg and Ashland to connect with trains 11 and 12 at the former place. This is a poor makeshift, and will not at all satisfy the people of Southern Oregon, whose service has been so badly demoralized by the discontinuance of trains 11 and 12 through this region. Train 221 is called the fast freight, but it is so irregular as to its time that it is scarcely to be depended upon to help the situation any. Once within a week the Portland papers arrived at Jacksonville on this "fast freight," but we usually get the Oregonian the "day after."—Jacksonville Post.

Chicago, Nov. 26.—Weston started on the last stage of his record-breaking journey from Portland, Me., at 11 o'clock from Chesterton, Ind. He expects to arrive at the Chicago post-office in the forenoon tomorrow.

MORGAN CONFERS WITH CORTELYOU

Washington, Nov. 23.—J. Pierpont Morgan had a short conference with Secretary Cortelyou late today and at its conclusion he left for New York. Nothing was disclosed as to the object of the conference.

Morgan seemed to be in the best of spirits. A feeling of confidence of the success of new loans prevails in the treasury department and was apparently heightened by the assurance of Morgan as to the improvement in the financial situation in New York. The visit of Morgan is generally accepted to mean that the leading bankers of New York intend to co-operate with the treasury department in making a success of the new loans. It is known that Morgan has long favored some modification of the existing currency system, but has not undertaken to prepare a detailed plan of his own.

CRITICIZES FINANCIAL POLICY OF ADMINISTRATION

New York, Nov. 23.—Charles N. Fowler, chairman of the committee on currency and banking, today gave out a statement regarding the issue of the Panama canal bonds, criticizing the policy of the administration.

The general tenor of his statement is that when the New York bankers, on November 15, had successfully passed the crisis in the present currency panic, the government steps in, and by issuing the canal bonds, has taken action that must be a most disturbing factor, although the bankers of the country may prevent any serious consequences.

PENDLETON SAVINGS BANK AGAIN OPEN

The Pendleton Savings bank, after observing legal holidays for the past two weeks, opened Monday and is doing business as usual. No withdrawals have been made and deposits are being received. It is estimated that two-thirds of the checks issued in Pendleton pass through this bank. It is one of the strongest private banks in the Northwest and carries deposits amounting to almost \$1,500,000.

PRUSSIAN DIET OPENED IN BERLIN TODAY

Berlin, Nov. 26.—The Prussian diet opened today in the white hall of the palace. Prince von Bulow, the imperial chancellor, in the emperor's absence, read the speech from the throne. The address stated the growth of the permanent expenditures had increased the budget to more than \$25,000,000. The speech also foreshadowed a bill authorizing the government to acquire Polish estates by condemnation proceedings under the law of eminent domain. This measure is expected to reopen the agitation of the Polish question in an acute form.

MORE TRUST OFFICIALS UNDER INDICTMENT

New York, Nov. 26.—The Kings county grand jury returned indictments against three men today, whose names are withheld, but detectives arrested John Jenkins, Jr., president of the Jenkins Trust Company. He was released on bonds.

SHOOTS WOMAN WOUNDS HIMSELF

Cleveland, Nov. 26.—Mrs. Ida Walker, aged 22, was shot three times today by Bera Freund, and probably fatally wounded. Freund is aged 20 years. He fired two shots at himself, but will probably recover. The couple eloped from Lehigh, Pa.

New York, Nov. 26.—"President Roosevelt and the United States government are fostering anarchy" was the startling announcement today of Rev. Dr. Mutchter, at the annual meeting of the International Sabbath Alliance, of which he is president.

The denunciation of the president and government is based on the fact that the sailors at League Island navy yard, near Philadelphia, are allowed to play baseball on Sunday over the protests of the alliance.

VENEZUELAN REBEL AMBUSHED AND SLAIN

Caracas, Nov. 26.—General Rafael Montilla, for several years a persistent insurgent and bandit, was ambushed and killed last night at Barquisimato. Montilla had waged war against the Castro government ever since it came into power.

MORMON MISSIONARIES WILL BE EXCLUDED

Hamburg, Nov. 26.—The police of this city have been informed that 37 Mormon missionaries sailed from Boston on the steamer Cymric. It has been decided that any German subjects among the missionaries will be allowed to enter the country, but all others will be refused admittance.
