Enthusiasm throughout the game was intense, the Eugene rooters going almost wild with joy when the local score was made. Salem being the heavier team, it looked rather blue for the local at the beginning of the game on account of the muddy field, but it was soon apparent to everyone that Eugene was the better team and the score indicates about the relative strength of the teams.

COTTAGE GROVE WILL CLEAN HERSELF UP

Cottage Grove, Nov. 23.—Yes, a few of our sawmills have shut down. Those that are running have cut down the wages, but the camp is not played out. The people are optimistic and are confident that the little financial flurry will soon pass away. The mills will start up again, prosperity will be with us once more and confidence restored.

I will say that Cottage Grove could be improved along the line of cleanliness and unless we take steps to improve our sanitary conditions, and that soon, while we are free from any sickness of note, the time may come when it will be as some other towns have been—a camp of sorrow—work not only for the doctors but for the undertaker as well.

WHEAT CROP IS ON MOVE TO MARKET

Portland, Nov. 23.—The great

Northwestern wheat crop as being moved to tidewater at the rate of 80 cars a day, according to General Manager O'Brien of the Harriman lines in Oregon. At present the Harriman lines have about 800 freight cars in the grain service, and this number will be added to within a few days. The crop has been transferred to tide water at the rate of 70 to 80 cars a day for the past ten days.

By Monday Mr. O'Brien will have all the cars necessary to move the great wheat crop from the inland Empire to tide water. The railroad is now exerting every energy to assemble all the cars possible, and in a few days there will be fully 1000 cars in the service, and they will be used exclusively in the grain trade until the last of the crop has been shifted from the warehouses in the west belt to the harbor at Portland.

This is the assurance which the exporters of Portland have been wanting for the past two weeks. They have been complaining of the lack of cars available to move the crop, declaring that they have not one-fourth the number necessary. This condition will be shortly relieved, and the long-looked-for much-hoped-for movement will be in full swing in less than three days.

London, Nov. 23.—Russia today wiped out the balance of her indebtedness to Japan arising from the late war, the Russian embassy handing over to the embassy of Japan a check for \$24,302,200.

Vienna, Nov. 23.—It is reported from Brussels that Princess Elizabeth, wife of Prince Albert, of Belgium, heir to the throne, has left her husband and will not return to Belgium. She is said to be with her parents in Munich. They have three children.

ELECTRIC LINE SURVEY COMPLETED NORTH TO ALBANY

The survey for the electric line from Junction City north has been completed, at least such was the information received here. The crew from Albany met the Eugene crew somewhere near Peoria, where the road will cross the Willamette. The survey out of town follows the old S. P. survey. Farmers along the line requested that the survey be run parallel to the old survey, as it would be very inconvenient to have land between the two tracks should the S. P. conclude to complete their line from Corvallis to this place. We understand that there will be no trouble about the right-of-way, as the farmers are alive to the great benefits to be derived from an electric line and are exceedingly anxious to have the line completed as soon as possible.

Church Dedicated. The South Methodist church was dedicated Sunday by Rev. McCausland, presiding elder. A large audience was present. There was no indebtedness against the church, consequently there was no money to raise. The church has been named "Olive Branch" in respect to the memory of Casper Rickard, who was one of the principal patrons of the church. The building is very neatly organ, and a voluntary collection was taken up for the purchase of an instrument and almost the necessary amount was secured.

Wilhelm are behind with their orders and the mills will be run to the fullest capacity to make up for the loss of time. The Harrisburg mill was run for some time, but as the supply of grain was exhausted it was closed down.

The original Junction City Dramatic Company, with the addition of several new members, have in preparation a drama which will be put on just as soon as the parts can be assigned and committed. The title will be "A Woman's Honor." This is

said to be a very interesting play and will doubtless attract a good house.—Junction City Times.

ENGLISH BRUISER DEFEATED NEIL

San Francisco, Nov. 22.—Owen Moran, England's premier featherweight, was given the decision over Frankie Niel, of this city, tonight, near the close of the sixteenth round after a remarkably fast battle. Neil, technically speaking, was not knocked out, but it was only the merciful action of the chief of police which saved him from being sent to the Land of Nod.

There was not a moment's slow work during the entire contest. Both lads fought with remarkable vim and stamina. Early in the fight Moran showed himself to be the superior boxer. He is a clever two-handed fighter, his most effective work in tonight's contest being an almost continuous play upon the Californian's head. Neil showed remarkable ability to reach the Briton's stomach, as several times during the contest he had his opponent greatly worried.

OFFICERS MAKE RAID AND GET TRUNK FULL OF WHISKEY

Chief of Police Farrington and Sheriff Fisk made a raid on the lunch counter in the north room of the Fraser building at the corner of Sixth and Wilamette streets this forenoon and found in the back room a big trunk full of whiskey and other liquor, together with a number of glasses and other appurtenances usually found at a "blind pig." "Layout" was confiscated by the officers and they are now looking for the owner. The lunch counter is conducted by a man named Steve, but his last name is not learned. An employee of the place has been on duty by himself all day while the proprietor seems to be in hiding some place.

As the officers entered the front room of the place they heard a number of men leaving by the back door, but they got out before the chief and sheriff could effect entrance to the rear portion of the building. The door was locked and it took some little time to get it open.

For some time past this place has been a rendezvous for drinking men and the officers have had their suspicions that liquor was being illicitly peddled there. They concluded to raid the place with the result as mentioned.

FOREMAN KILLED BY ANGRY WORKINGMEN

St. Louis, Nov. 23.—In view of three thousand workingmen at the American Car Company's plant in East Hazel today shot and killed William Schrauek, foreman of the plant, and with a revolver defied arrest until he was overpowered. He claimed Schrauek abused and discharged him without cause.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY IN NEW ROCHELLE

New York, Nov. 23.—A double tragedy was discovered today when firemen were called to extinguish a blaze at the home of Nik Smith, a wealthy manufacturer of New Rochelle. When the firemen burst into the house they found Smith and his young wife dead, each with a gaping bullet wound in the body. Mrs.

Smith had been shot in the breast and apparently instantly killed. On the floor beside Smith's body was found a revolver with which the shooting was probably done. That Smith killed his wife and then fired the house to hide his crime was proved by a note left by him. He was undoubtedly insane.

Two women servants locked in a room were rescued by the firemen, and these women state that the Smiths quarreled violently last night.

PAVING OPERATIONS CEASE FOR WINTER

Paving operations in Eugene are over for the winter and the Warren Construction company is housing its machinery and apparatus until spring. The steam roller has been taken to the city hall's back yard and other appliances and fixtures used in the work on the streets have been taken to the mixing plant on Lincoln street. Just as soon as spring opens up the company will go back to work again and finish up the several contracts which it has with the city and perhaps by that time several other contracts will have been made. The company expects to keep the plant in operation all of next summer.

TRYING TO GET GOLD FROM BANK OF FRANCE

Paris, Nov. 21.—The international houses which have been trying for several days to induce the Bank of France to sell its gold for shipment to the United States have received indefinite answers. One of these bankers said today that he believed the Bank of France was holding off, pending the result of the negotiations which he says he has reason to believe are progressing at Washington directly between the two governments.

This banker expresses the opinion that a direct transaction on the basis of United States Treasury notes was impossible, as the Bank of France can only discount three months' paper. At the same time the transaction could be accomplished indirectly by accepted bills drawn upon Paris banks, as J. Pierpont Morgan proposed last week, using possibly treasury notes as collateral with a government guarantee.
