MRS. MARY JANE HUSTON DIES AT PORTLAND

RESIDENT OF JUNCTION CITY
FOR MANY YEARS EXPIRES OF
LA GRIPPE--BURIED TODAY

Mrs. Mary Jane Huston, for many years a resident of Junction City, died in Portland November 25 at 8:10 a. m. from a complication of la grippe and congestion of the lungs, after an illness of only nine days' duration. The remains were brought to Eugene last night and interred in the Oak Grove cemetery west of the city today. Rev. G. A. Blair, formerly of Eugene, but now of Portland, conducting the services.

Mary Jane Taylor was born April 7, 1832, on Chesapeake Bay, Maryland. She was married to Rev. Wm. M. Huston May 2, 1852, at Trenton, Mo. They started across the plains for Oregon in company with Mr. Huston's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Huston, and Rev. C. A. Wooley and wife, now of Eugene, but owing to the fact that their son, David, fell and broke his leg, they turned back, and stayed in the East until 1874, when they came to Oregon on the train, residing at Junction City most

TELLS STORY OF MRS. GOULD'S MISCONDUCT

HELEN MER'S CHAPTER OF SENSATIONS--SAYS SHE DISCOVERED TWO IN COMPROMISING POSITIONS--THEY QUARRELED--THAT COLONEL CODY ALLEGED ATTEMPTED POISONING

New York, Nov. 24.--Helen Mer, who came from England to testify in the Howard Gould divorce case, revealed today for the first time the details of the testimony she gave on Thursday behind closed doors in the office of David McClure, the referee appointed by the supreme court to hear the evidence in the suit for separation.

At the Continental Hotel in New York this afternoon Miss Mer said: "I testified before Mr. McClure that once in the Hoffman House in this city and once in a residence on First avenue, in Chicago, I discovered Miss Katherine Clemmons, who is now Mrs. Howard Gould, and 'Buffalo Bill' Cody in compromising positions. I testified also that Colonel Cody once accused Katherine

line Clemmons of having tried to poison him.

"I would not give her money," I told the referee that Miss Clemmons, with whom I lived in Chicago, in New York and in London, told me that although Colonel Cody made \$200,000 with his Wild West show in Chicago during the World's Fair, he refused to give her money enough for household expenses. She told me she was afraid he was trying to cast her off.

"At the close of the World's Fair the three of us came to New York and stopped at the Hoffman House. Colonel Cody's room was directly across the corridor from the room which was occupied by Miss Clemmons, and upon one occasion, upon going to our room, I found Colonel Cody and Miss Clemmons there together. Soon after I arrived Colonel Cody went back to his own room.

"I accused her of poisoning him. He and Miss Clemmons quarreled continually. He was bitter toward her. Once when he was very ill after eating dinner, he accused Miss Clemmons of trying to poison him. She protested her innocence, but she was always afraid he would leave her penniless. He went away from the Hoffman House leaving us there and Miss Clemmons was fearful that the manager of the hotel would eject us because we could not pay our bill. 'If he does,' she said to me, 'I'll sit on my trunk in front of this hotel

EXPERT SAYS MRS. BRADLEY WAS INSANE

HYPOTHETICAL QUESTION OF DEFENSE CONSUMED MOST OF TODAY'S SESSION OF TRIAL--AT CONCLUSION OF READING DR. PARTON DECLARED THAT MRS. BRADLEY WAS INSANE WHEN SHE SHOT AND KILLED EX-SENATOR ARTHUR BROWN

Washington, Nov. 25.--The morning session of the Bradley trial was occupied by the reading of a hypothetical question for the defense to Dr. Wilfred Barton, an insanity expert. Asked regarding the effect of frequent pregnancies and abortion on the nervous system, witness said they had a tremendous effect and often produced insanity. Mrs. Bradley appeared more depressed than usual, and occasionally seemed on the verge of fainting during the reading of that part of the question referring to her close relations with Brown and his declarations of love.

The hypothetical question was finished at 2 o'clock.

After hearing it Dr. Barton declared that he believed Mrs. Bradley was insane when she committed the act of murder. Her particular ailment, he said, was "puerperal insanity."

There were three questions which were only propounded after Judge Powers had presented a complete analysis of the case, bringing out specially the points indicative of mental unsoundness on the part of the defendant. The questions were as follows:

1. Assuming all these facts to be true, what do you say as to whether or not at the time the fatal shot was fired the patient understood the nature of her act, was able to choose and distinguish right from wrong, and was able to control herself to choose the right and avoid the wrong?

2. Assuming all these facts to be true, what do you say as to whether or not when the fatal shot was fired the patient was mentally responsible for what she did?

3. Assuming all these facts to be true, what do you say as to whether the fatal shot was fired by the patient or by some other person?

The statement of the case was read from typewritten data and was deliberately and carefully presented. Mrs. Bradley's name was not given, but the facts were given as applying

to a woman 35 years of age, which is the age of Mrs. Bradley. "We will assume," said Judge Powers, "the case of a woman now 35 years of age, who at the age of five years was struck on the head about two inches back from the frontal bone a severe blow, which rendered her unconscious, confining her to her bed for two or three weeks. Thereafter she suffered from headaches until 16 or 17 years of age, when after an attack of smallpox and pneumonia combined the headaches became less frequent. Her grandfather on the maternal side was at times insane. Two of her aunts upon her maternal side became insane. Both had delusions of persecution and both developed homicidal tendencies. One died insane, one is now living and is much improved mentally. The father of the patient is living, but is suffering from paralysis and is unable to travel without assistance, and is gradually growing worse."

He proceeded then to relate the story of a supposititious woman's childhood, young womanhood, early life in Colorado, and employed in Utah, and passed to her participation in political and club life in Utah, through which and because of her political affiliation with him, Mrs. Bradley became acquainted with Senator Brown. The particulars of her intimacy with him from 1898 forward were recited minutely.

Much was made of the varying moods of Senator Brown; of his extreme kindness at one time and his bitterness and upbraiding another. It was shown how, in 1905, Mrs. Bradley was plunged into quite utter despair by his refusal to keep his promises, and even was on the verge of suicide. The story of Brown's efforts through mutual friends to get Mrs. Bradley to accept a money settlement and how she repelled it was pathetically set forth. Mrs. Bradley declared

ing even then that she knew Brown would marry her as soon as he could.

A great deal of space is devoted to the testimony given by the Salt Lake witnesses, all of them friends and most of them associates of Senator Brown's, concerning Mrs. Bradley's eccentricities and hysterical conduct during the latter years of the woman's relationship with him.

Almost all the particulars of Mrs. Bradley's associations with Brown during the latter half of November, 1906, less than a month before the killing, when he would promise her one day that he would set her up in business in Goldfield, Nevada, and the next would withdraw the promise, was given, evidently for the purpose of showing that he played with her trust and affection.

After the following summing up the questions above mentioned were put:

"The patient was not naturally of a vicious nature; she was not angry when she fired the fatal shot; she was not animated by jealousy; she was not animated by any feeling of revenge; she had not formed previous to the shooting any purpose to kill or injure Senator Brown."
